What's in a nickname?

A bill that would force a school district to change its race-based nickname if someone found it offensive and the state superintendent agreed is awaiting debate in the State Senate

Local politicians, school district leaders and some students say it's ridiculous, especially in the case of Kewaskum School District, which has the Indians as its nickname and an Indian as its logo.

Kewaskum presents a unique case in that it already carries an Indian name, nickname aside.

"We're named after Chief Kewaskum. There's nothing else we would
be called," said high school senior
Elissa Miller. "I think it's showing
we're proud of our history."

The bill, AB 35, calls for the complaint over a nickname, logo or mascot from one resident of a district to superintendent in front of the state board must prove the nickname, logo ination, harassment or stereotyping.

If the superintendent rules against the school board, the school must change the entity within one year or face a daily fine of between \$100 and \$1,000.

The Democratic-controlled Assembly passed the bill last week in a party line vote: Democrats for, Republicans against.

Senator Glenn Grothman (R-West Bend) said he expects the same vote should the issue reach the Senate floor.

"Polls have shown an overwhelming number of Native Americans don't mind Indian nicknames.
They even like them," he said. "We
are allowing the opinions of a few
politically correct Native Americans
to outweigh the majority. I intend
to vote against the bill and use the
Kewaskum Indians as a primary ex-

Chief Kewaskum, he said, was helpful to settlers in the area and that's something students should be tought.

Senior Haley Rauch said the bill

is "ridiculous."

"There's been, like, Indians who

have come to our school and they said we're not offending them in any way," she said. "I think they're just kind of taking it overboard. There's been studies with the Indians and they do not have a problem," said high school senior Haley Rauch.

Senior Anna Butler said she understands in some cases how someone might be offended, "but it's not like we do anything that makes us disrespectful to the Indians or anything."

Superintendent Michael Krumm said he has heard no complaints from anyone over the nickname.

"Our position is pretty clear on that. We have stated over and over we are not going to change our name unless it's a legal requirement," he said.

That could strike a nerve.

"I believe the community would be very upset to lose the Indians name," said Athletic director and head football coach Jason Piittmann. "It has been a part of Kewaskum for many years. I think the name does carry nostalgia, especially for the

'10-'11 School budget reveals \$418k deficit

Reichert says teacher layoffs 'a possibility'

KEWASKUM- After a balanced budget this year, the earliest version of the Kewaskum School District's 2010-11 budget is carrying an estimated \$418,000 deficit thanks to expected flat revenues and higher employee salaries and benefits.

District Business Manager Paul Reichert said revenues are projected to increase by about \$432,000 while expenditures are up \$850,000.

\$750,000 of that is slated to come in employee salaries and benefits, but Reichert said that number isn't out of range.

"It's not that much higher than in the past," Reichert said.

The increase occurs as teacher negotiations for a 2009-2011 contract are ongoing. Teachers have been working with the old contract in the meantime. Reichert said the two sides are continuing to meet for mediation and arbitration but have not yet been able to reach a deal.

Finding money coming into the district is another problem, Reichert said.

"The problem with the budget is more in the area of revenues," he said, and added he is hearing the same problems with other districts.

The state this year allowed a \$200 increase in per-pupil spending, down from the usual \$285 to \$290 bump. With Kewaskum's 2,000 students, the \$85 per-pupil aid loss totals around \$170,000, Reichert said.

Other revenues, mostly state and federal grant money as well as student fees and admission to events, are slated to be flat with little to no increase, he said.

Next year will also be tighter since the district's 2005 referendum runs out, meaning \$430,000 ear-





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Schmidts of Kewaskum allegedly sold baby for \$6,000

Trial set for unlawful adoption

WEST BEND - The Kewaskum residents accused of selling their newborn to a Missouri couple more than five years ago will be tried this summer in Washington County Circuit Court.

David J. Schmidt and Angela M. Schmidt appeared in the courtroom of Judge Patrick Faragher on Feb. 25 – with their respective attorneys William Mayer and Ryan J. Hetzel – and a final trial date was set.

The trial begins July 27, at 8:30 a.m., according to online court records, and a jury status hearing will be held July 7 at 9:45 a.m. The Schmidts have separately pleaded not guilty to unauthorized placement for adoption, as party to a crime. It is a Class H Felony that carries a maximum fine of \$10,000 or six years in prison.

Angela Schmidt, now 34, gave birth to a baby girl on Dec. 20, 2004 at Aurora Medical Center on E. Sumner Street in Hartford, according to a criminal complaint detailing the matter.

A social worker at the hospital advised Hartford Police Det. Randall Abbott that Angela Schmidt had told her it was a surrogacy birth and, though she was the natural mother, the natural father was the husband of Denise E. Novotny of Clinton, Mo. He was later identified as Scott Novotny.

lice Schmidt refused to share documentation that proved first att the surrogacy with the hospital. The Schmidts had asked and Scotthe hospital to release the collect schild to Denise Novotny, but Schmidt the social worker said they would only discharge the The

child to the Schmidts.

The social worker reported to police that at 9 p.m. on Dec. 22 she observed the couple turn the child over to Denise Novotny, who reportedly took the child back with her to Missouri.

A doctor at the hospital who treated Angela Schmidt during her pregnancy told police she had also asked to see surrogacy papers on numerous occasions but never saw them.

On March 3, 2005, the Schmidts were interviewed by police and said the birth of the girl was caused by artificial insemination, and that they had given the child to Denise Novotny. The couple said they were given \$5,500 in exchange for the girl's parental rights.

According to the report, the Bureau of Vital Statistics in Madison had no birth certificate for the child on file as of Sept. 5, 2008. A representative at the office told police the Novotnys had filed multiple requests for a birth certificate but never followed through on them.

On March 3, 2005, Denise Novotny spoke with an official from the Division of Family Services in Missouri and said that she and her husband had used a home kit to send semen through UPS to the defendants in March 2004. Novotny said the insemination was successful and the child conceived. She said she paid the Schmidts \$6,000 for the surrogacy.

Novotny later stated the first attempt through UPS was not successful and her and Scott visited Wisconsin to collect semen, which Angela Schmidt inseminated with a syringe.

The Schimdts were again

interviewed by police on Dec. 16, 2008 and state the child was in fact their marital child.

The Schmidts provided a written statement that in early 2004 they found out Angela was pregnant with a marital child and Denise Novotny had indicated a willingness to acquire the child through a surrogacy contract.

The Schmidts received a surrogacy contract from the Novotnys and signed it, according to the criminal complaint. The Schmidts told police the Novotnys had never sent donor sperm because they knew Angela was already pregnant.

In early 2006, the report says, Angela Schmidt contacted the Novotnys via e-mail for a status update on the child. She was told the Novotnys needed a copy of the birth certificate so they could register the child as a surrogate birth.

After performing buccal swabs of the involved parties, the Wisconsin State Crime Laboratory determined that Scott Novotny was eliminated as a possible biological father of the child. David Schmidt, now 39, is considered a likely father, the report states.

marked for textbooks and computers will be lost. Funding must come from the district's operating budget.

The \$418,000 deficit already included that lack of funds, Reichert said, which could lower the district's mill rate. Not being able to levy \$430,000 drops the rate by 34 cents.

But state funding levels and the district's equalized property value will impact the mill rate as well. This year's rate of \$8.66 per \$1,000 of equalized value rose 52 cents from the year before, partly because of state funding cuts and because equalized property value fell by 1.7 percent, the first decrease in 35 years.

The School Board could approve an unbalanced bud-

get but Reichert said the district won't recommend that. The district has until the end of June to present the board a balanced budget for approval. "We've got time to work on it and we'll be looking at what we can do to reduce those expenditures," Reichert said.

Laying off teachers could be considered.

"It's a possibility," Reichert said.

The Kewaskum's teacher's contract calls for layoff notices to be given by June 15.

A referendum is not being discussed, Reichert said.

The district's Finance Committee will see the numbers at Monday's meeting, beginning at 6 p.m. in the high school library.



alumni of KHS. The intent has always been to portray the most positive traits of the Indians."

Rep. Dan LeMahieu (R-Cascade) who represents Kewaskum, said versions of the bill has been around before he took office in 2003, but when Republicans had control of the Assembly, the bill never made it out of committee to the floor for a vote. He has opposed it all along.

"A local school dist should have the control over this issue, not a state superintendent," he said.

In a time when student achievement scores aren't improving at MPS and we've got thousands of students there falling by the wayside and we have problems funding education ... That we're going to make them spend money on something like that is just ridiculous," he said.

Beyond that, LeMahieu said Kewaskum has a good



reason it chose Indians as its nickname. Chief Kewaskum settled along the Milwaukee River. The village hall even has a carved Indian statue.

"It's not like this was an arbitrary name. It was because of the heritage of Kewaskum," LeMahieu said.

If the bill doesn't come up for a vote in the Senate by the end of the legislative session in several weeks, it would have to start from scratch again next January, LeMahieu said. He has his fingers crossed.

"All we can hope is the leadership in the Senate is smarter than the leadership in the Assembly," he said.

Grothman said other pri-

orities need to be addressed.

"I think it is a foolish waste of time and the Legislature ought to be focusing more on jobs and improving the business climate," he said.

Some students won't budge on the issue, whether the school is legally forced to change its nickname or not.

"We're always going to be the Indians and we're always going to call ourselves the Indians," Butler said.

"In our hearts everyone's going to know who we are," Rauch said.

Village police officers using new technology on the job

KEWASKUM - Call it going green or technologically savvy but Kewaskum Police Officers are doing their job a bit differently than they were six months ago. The new-year ushered in change as the Kewaskum Police Department became the first law enforcement agency in Washington County to use the state's TraCS (Traffic and Criminal Software) Electronic Reporting system for completing accident reports and issuing citations.

Kewaskum's Chief of Police Dick Knoebel recently informed the Village Board that most of all the bugs have been worked out and his officers are now using the Badger TraCS system on a daily basis for completing accident reports and issuing citations or warnings. Officers in Kewaskum began using the system in January on laptop computers already outfitted in each patrol car.

The program is provided by the State of Wisconsin at no cost to police departments in the state. The only cost to the department was printers that are outfitted in each of the village's two patrol cars. Inkjet printers are located in the headrest of the passenger seat. The printers cost a combined \$600.

By using a wireless Internet air card (a device plugged into laptop computers to receive an internet connection through cellular phone networks) the system allows officers to complete an accident report, citation or warning electronically. With the program an officer does a record check on the driver and vehicle with the Department of Transportation and this information is then automatically loaded into the proper form.

"This will save a lot of time

and paper and also help eliminate mistakes," Chief Knoebel stated as he and officer Mark Steiner demonstrated the program on Monday at The States, man office.

When an officer has completed inputting the information, they print the citation or warning on the printer and issue it to the driver. At the end of their shift, the officer transfers the information to the police department's main computer via a memory stick. Chief Knoebel stated the department is working on a way to transmit the data wirelessly to the main computer at the police department. The information is then transmitted to the State of Wisconsin via the Internet.

The wireless air cards cost about \$45 a month. While the technology is somewhat new to the village, it opens a whole new realm of possibilities making a patrol officer's job easier. With the air card, an officer can get information from the local police department's main computer right from the squad as well as look up information from the county and state eliminating having to use a county dispatcher for such items. Chief Knoebel has also said the village could set up cameras in the parks and school areas that an officer could monitor from the patrol car.

In the future, officers will also be able to complete crime scene forms and information via the program as well.

Campbellsport Police Department also uses the Badger TraCS system. Chief Knoebel stated the state started working on writing the program in 1992.

"This saves not only time and paper, but postage as well. You could say, it's the green way of writing a ticket," Chief Knoebel joked.



Assembly Fails To Override Veto On DNR Secretary

The Assembly fell six votes short of the two-thirds majority needed to override the governor's veto of legislation to restore the Natural Resources Board's power to appoint the agency secretary.

The body voted 58-38 to override the veto with 10 Republicans and independent Jeff Wood joining most Assembly Democrats in supporting the override. Three Democrats voted to sustain the governor's veto.

During the debate, the two sides clashed on whether changing who appoints the secretary would take politics out of the decisions the DNR makes and if the change would be in the best interests of the state's hunters, anglers and businesses.

The original Assembly bill called for the DNR Board to appoint the secretary to a four-year term after it lost that power in the 1995 budget. That bill was approved 61-32, but the state Senate amended the bill to add a provision requiring its confirmation of a board appointment. That Assembly signed off on the amended bill 49-44.

Gov. Jim Doyle said in a statement after the vote that having an appointed secretary has allowed the state over the past seven years to make "the most significant environmental achievements in a generation."

"We have also taken the most effective steps to streamline regulations, while maintaining the highest environmental standards," Doyle said.

Badgercare Care Plus Passes Senate

On a slim 17-16 vote, the Senate approved a stopgap health insurance program meant to serve

the 25,000 state residents on the waiting list for the BadgerCare Core Plus program.

Sen. Kathleen Vinehout, D-Alma, joined 15 Republicans in voting against the legislation, which the Democratic-dominated Senate amended to require monthly checks by the Department of Health Services to verify an individual continues to meet eligibility criteria.

Among other things, the amendment also requires quarterly reports by the DHS to the Joint Finance Committee about the financial condition of the plan, any changes in benefits or premiums, information about applicants and enrollees who have been ruled ineligible, and demographic information on enrollees.

Vinehout, D-Alma, said BadgerCare Basic is "ill-conceived" and "poorly funded." She offered a trio of amendments, including one to limit the plan to two years, which failed. Another amendment to require the Legislative Audit Bureau to do a comprehensive performance evaluation at the end of the year was eventually adopted.

Senate Minority Leader Scott Fitzgerald, R-Juneau, praised Vinehout for having "a very good grasp of what's going on here today ... Certainly I hope she reminded the rest of the members of her party that this is not the day to do this or the place to do this."

Sen. Judy Robson, D-Beloit, questioned those who opposed the proposal, considering they have a "very rich" health insurance plan.

"I can't believe those of you who have insurance would be denying at least 25,000 people in this state from having health insurance. Walk a day in their shoes," she said.

The Assembly approved a different version of the bill earlier this year. The two houses have to approve the same bill before it can go to the governor's desk.





mates also operate and maintain compressed gas producing plants.



Comeback efforts produce third place for Cody Seibel, fifths for Bo Seibel and Scoles

MADISON - The sport wasn't basketball, but rebounding was definitely the key to a successful conclusion to the WIAA State Wrestling Tournament for a good number of the six Kewaskum Indians participating in the event.

After stumbling in the Division 2 quarterfinal round Friday, Brett Scoles, Bo Seibel and Cody Seibel all bounced back to reach the victory stand in their

weight classes.

"(We had) the same number of placers as last year," KHS Coach Dennis Aupperle said about the performances of his athletes. "A couple of the (Friday afternoon) matches could have gone either way. After that, those three really picked it up and did a nice job."

Cody Seibel ended a very successful wrestling career with a 10-2 major decision over Alex Schleis of Kewaunee/Algoma to take third place at 215 pounds. As a sophomore, Seibel took fifth in his weight class, then last year he did not advance through the sectional.

Seibel finished with a record of 33-2, and for his career wound up with 131 victories, which is third highest in Kewaskum history. Only Scott Rhoads (134) and assistant coach Joel Dziedzic (132) rank ahead of him.

Bo Seibel came back from a devastating overtime loss in the quarterfinals to eventually top Noah McLay of Ellsworth 5-4 for fifth place at 160, one place higher than he finished a year ago.

The younger Seibel ended his year at 35-6.

The freshman Scoles drew the difficult task of going up against Campbellsport's Ryan Costello in the first round of wrestlebacks, and this time he was the better man, winning 6-4. After losing to Winneconne's John Roycroft 7-0 in the next match to determine who would wrestle for third and fourth places and the two for fifth and sixth, Scoles left no doubt of his superiority over Alex Hauri of Parkview, shutting him out by a score of 5-zip.

For the season, Scoles notched a record of 33-13.

Scoles opened the tournament with a win by injury over Josh Farr of Prescott.

In the quarterfinals, Scoles lost to Brett Buechler of Wrightstown 6-4 after leading 4-3 at the end of the second period.

That set up Match No. 5 with Costello, After a scoreless first period, both men scored two points in the second, then Scoles went ahead when his opponent was called for an illegal hold, and he took a 5-2 lead with a reversal.

Costello came back with a reversal with :36 left, then Scoles got away from the Cougar and held on for the win.

"I just stayed in good position and kept my head up," the

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young freshman beamed after the match and after receiving a hug from his grandpa, legendary Wisconsin Rapids coach, Lewie Benitz.

Bo Seibel was definitely the aggressor in his quarterfinal bout vs. Spencer Meinholz of Marshall, but each time he came close to a takedown in the first period, the two were off the

Meinholz managed on midway in the period and added an escape at the second for a 3-0 lead. Then Seibel stormed back to tie the score with a quick sit out and a takedown with 25 seconds to go.

The KHS wrestler looked fresh starting the overtime and went for another single, which Meinholz counted and turned into a takedown and a nearfall for the win.

"When I was riding, he kept balling up," Seibel said about the match, adding, "I thought I had the takedown (in OT), but he just rolled through."

Cody Seibel's match against Cody Endres of Lodi also came down to one big move at the end of the first period, giving Endres a 6-1 lead. After that, Seibel battled and worked to catch up, coming as close at 7-9 as Endres was whistled for a second stalling point, but he couldn't come up with two more to tie.

Seibel followed that match with a pin in 3:42 over Ryan Miesbauer of Northwestern. "I

knew I could win it. I knew I had to win it," Seibel said. "I have to at least make the best out of this (tournament) that I can."

When it was suggested he and his brother still had chances to win thirds together, Seibel said, "Yeah, that would be sweet, but I wish it would have been better."

Junior Rob Maertz fell just short in his wrestleback match, losing a tough 6-4 decision to Brandon Schisel of Valders. Maertz was down 5-0 going into the third period when he lifted Schisel and set him down on the mat but outside the ring. Schisel injured his shoulder when he came down but continued the match.

Maertz (33-12) shot in for a successful throw, closing the gap to 5-4, then let Schisel go to try for a 2-point takedown and the win but ran out of time.

On Thursday evening, Maertz won his opening match, a 2-1 thriller over Zach Reister of Ellsworth, so he does come away with valuable experience which should help him in a return trip to Madison his senior

Neither Jared Koffke nor Caleb Olla got the chance for a second match. Both lost in the first round Thursday, ending their seasons. Koffke (30-11) wound up dropping a 6-4 decision to Tomahawk's Sam Arnott, while Olla (27-11), making his first appearance at state,

came up short against Larry Masonick of Nekoosa/Port Edwards, losing 16-5. Both were integral parts of Kewaskum's successful season.

NOTICE TO ALL WASHINGTON COUNTY DOG OWNERS

Pursuant to Section 174.052, Wisconsin Statutes, notice is hereby given to all owners of dogs in Washington County that dog licenses and rabies vaccinations are required.

Vaccination by a licensed veterinarian against rabies is required of all dogs (Section 95.21(2)) within 30 days after the dog reaches 4 months of age and revaccinated within one year after the initial vaccination. The owner of a dog shall have the dog revaccinated against rabies by a veterinarian when the certificate expires or within three (3) years of previous vaccination. The certificate of rabies vaccination must be presented to the collecting official before a dog license may be issued.

All dogs five (5) months of age or older require a license. The minimum license fee for neutered males or spayed females is \$3.00, upon presentation of evidence attesting to the same, and \$8.00 for the unneutered male or unspayed female dog or one-half of these amounts if the dog became five (5) months of age after July 1, of the license year. The governing body of any town, village, or city may raise the minimum dog license tax. Any person who keeps multiple dogs or operates a kennel may apply for a multiple dog license. The fee is \$35.00 for twelve (12) dogs or less and additional \$3.00 for each dog in excess of twelve (12).

Dog licenses may be obtained from your local town, village or city treasurer or designee during the course of any given year. Dog owners should notify their treasurer if their dog is given away or has died, so that you will not be considered delinquent. An affidavit of death is available.

PENALTY

Every owner of a dog 5 months of age or older who fails to obtain a license by April 1, will be assessed a late fee of \$5.00.

OFFICIAL NOTICE - VOTING BY ABSENTEE BALLOT

Any qualified elector who is unable or unwilling to appear at the polling place on election day may request to vote an absentee ballot. A qualified elector is any U.S. citizen, who will be 18 years of age or older on election day, who has resided in the ward or municipality where he or she wishes to vote for at least 10 days before the election. The elector must also be registered in order to receive an absentee ballot.

TO OBTAIN AN ABSENTEE BALLOT YOU MUST MAKE A REQUEST IN WRITING.

Contact your municipal clerk and request that an application for an absentee ballot be sent to you for the primary or election or both. You may also request an absentee ballot by letter. Your written request must list your voting address within the municipality where you wish to vote, the address where the absentee ballot should be sent, if different, and your signature.

Special absentee voting application provisions apply to electors who are indefinitely confined to home or care facility, in the military, hospitalized, or serving as a sequestered juror. If this applies to you, contact the municipal clerk.

You can also personally go to the clerk's office or other specified location, complete a written application, and vote an absentee ballot during the hours specified for casting an absentee ballot.



The girls' basketball team is taking momentum from its last three quarters of play against one of the best teams in state into Friday's regular season finale against conference champ Sheboygan Falls and into the playoffs.

Save for an 11-3 deficit after the first quarter, the Indians played a one-possession game with No. 3-ranked Lomira in Division 3 on Monday. Kewaskum lost 44-33 in the non-conference battle in which it had three players foul out. The Indians are 13-8 on the season, 10-3 in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference. Lomira got its 20th win of the year and stands at 20-1.

"It was a physical game so it really got everybody kind of pumped and wanting to play really hard," said senior forward Elissa Miller in anticipation of Friday's rematch with

the Indians for the week after, either, when the one-game tournament begins.

"It shows us what we're going to be coming up against because we know what's in our conference. Now that it's regionals we've got to see what's out there," said senior point guard Anna Butler.

"We're hoping it will prepare us for when we get to regionals, that it will help us learn how to compete with teams that are good," Miller

On Monday, Kewaskum got behind by as many as 15 points and could never get closer than seven. Twice in the first quarter after Indian defensive rebounds Lomira Buard Emily Neitzel stole the ball and scored to help put Kewaskum in a hole.

from 15 feet away, has faded. On Monday, the Indians went 6-for-13 to the Lions' 18-for-

"We're going to work on free throws," Kleinhans said.

On Friday, the Indians look to even the score with undefeated EWC champ Sheboygan Falls and avoid their only season sweep of the two games. On Jan. 12, Kewaskum had a cold shooting night in losing 55-46 to the Falcons.

Sheboygan Falls enters the game with a 13-0 EWC record. Kewaskum has solo second place sealed at 10-3.

The game pits Kewaskum's top-ranked conference defense, allowing 40.4 points per game, against Sheboygan Falls' top offense (57.8).

Some of the EWC's top players face off as Butler is the third-leading scorer with 12.8 points per game and Falls' 5-foot-11 power forward Lauren Carman is second at 13.8. Butler leads the conference in assists (4.5) and steals (3.4).

On the boards, Carman ranks third at nine per game, behind teammate Eimilie Leffin at 10.5. Indian Candace Beine is fourth at 7.78.

Against New Holstein last Friday, the Indians reached double-digit conference wins and halted a two-game losing streak in a patient, 45-34 suc-

Ten EWC victories are more than the Indians had overall the past two seasons combined.

Kewaskum, namely its coach, set some lofty goals at the beginning of the season, "but I don't think that we imagined that we would be beating these teams that killed us in the past year, that we'd be beating them by this much," Miller said after the game.

Butler didn't even think about 10 conference wins.

"No, I didn't, actually, to tell the truth. Feels good, though," she said.

Kewaskum got contributions from several in different ways.

"We got a lot of help off the bench. I thought Haylie Hansen played great D again. That's three games in a row for her. She got a couple good shots off," Kleinhans said. "I thought Elissa Miller played great D on that (Chelsi) Cash." "Anna played real well again, she made some good plays, good passes," he said.

Miller and Butler each scored 12 and Rauch eight. Miller pulled down eight boards. Cash led the Huskies with 13.

Just like in its 47-35 win at New Holstein Jan. 21 in which the Indians got out to a 17-9 lead after one quarter, Kewaskum started hot again. This time the Indians took a 12-3 advantage.

In the second quarter, like on Jan. 21, the Indians failed to put away their opponents. Kewaskum held a 25-22 halftime lead in the first meeting and a 21-10 lead in the second.

The Huskies played the Indians even in the second half, 24-24. Kleinhans would like to see more killer instinct out of his team.

"We haven't learned how to put them away," he said.

But, after blowing a 14-point lead against Ozaukee on Feb. 23, the coach liked his team's patience.

"I thought we were patient. That guy (Huskies coach Tom Hau) had a great game plan. He wanted to really slow it down against us and he did a great job of it," he said. "At times again tonight we were real patient and then we scored. And then there were times we were so fast and then we don't score. You're playing with the lead. Protect it a little

"That game on Tuesday slipped away from us and we all know it. And we knew that patience would have helped us a lot," Butler said. "We didn't have it on Tuesday and we needed it tonight if we wanted to keep the lead, especially since our last game vs. New Holstein we had the lead and then let it slip away again." Against Ozaukee Feb. 23, the Indians tested out their village's upgraded wastewater treatment plant, sending a 14-point lead through the system into a 59-51 loss.

No word yet on whether the state Department of Natural Resources allows such things.

Kewaskum turned a fivepoint halftime lead into a 39-25 advantage with 3:00 to go in the third quarter before letting it slip away.

Miller scored 12 and had 11 rebounds. Rauch got in foul trouble early and scored seven. Jenna Buker scored five to go with seven rebounds. Butler, Beine and Christine Bohn each scored six, Hansen five and Rammer four.

The Kewaskum girls' basketball team has landed a no. 3 seed and home playoff game in its regional. The Indians on Tuesday will host Ripon, 3-14 in the Eastern Valley Conference, 3-18 overall.

The teams have played one common opponent this season. Ripon lost to Lomira, 41-33, on Dec. 1. Kewaskum lost to Lomira 44-34 on Monday.

Game time is 7 p.m. and Athletic Director Jason Piittmann provided the seating assignments.

Adult fans for each school will sit behind their team's respective benches. Students will sit across from the team benches. This divides Kewaskum's gym in half, the west end for home fans and east end for visitors. The pep band will be on the student side as well.

Should Kewaskum win, the Indians on Thursday would face the winner of no. 2 seeded-Kettle Moraine Lutheran (8-5 in the Flyway Conference, 15-6 overall) and no. 7 seeded-Campbellsport (3-10 Eastern Wisconsin Conference, 4-17). 


