Property values skyrocket in village after reassesment

Kewaskum's first reassessment in seven years has skyrocketed some property values when many can least afford it.

Property values went up an average of 21 percent, said Jim Young, project leader with Grota Appraisals of Menomonee Falls, the company that did the reassessment. He said Kewaskum has a smaller mix of larger commercial properties in village and in general has a fairly typical housing mixture.

Young said that is only an average of 3 percent per year dating back to 2003, "below what market did in good times." Twenty-one percent over seven years is not a high average increase for the area, he said.

The recession kept the increase down.

"Overall, the values are closer to about the values were in 2007," Young said.

Municipalities are required to do reassessments within five years if properties' assessed value to fair market value is more than 10 percent different, said Mathew Heiser, village administrator.

In Kewaskum, Young said the average commercial property was at 82 percent of fair market value and residential was closer to 85 percent. Commercial values rose at a higher pace than residential, mostly because they were behind in looking at sale prices of prior assessments, he said.

Some went up by more than 70 percent.

An open book session two weeks ago allowed property owners to dispute their values with Young. The assessor will send out notices notifying the owners if their property value was adjusted. If the owners still aren't happy, they may request a hearing before the village's Board of Review in which the assessor and

owner make their cases.

Young said he uses a hybrid valuation model to determine property values, following assessing laws in the Wisconsin Property Assessment Manual and standards of the International Association of Assessing Officers.

Young said most corrections are done because of updated records such as the composition of a basement finish or that a kitchen or bathroom was remodeled in the 1960s in a 1920's house – "not what we would call a good rating anymore."

Heiser said the open book session did draw a larger crowd than the last reassessment.

"This response is bigger than 2003 but we've had bigger increase since then," he said.

As far as people being upset at rising property values, Young said "that's fine because everything you hear in the news is about values going down."

Highway 28 project delayed until 2013

KEWASKUM- Village officials have learned the Wisconsin Department of Transportation has again pushed back a plan to reconstruct Highway 28 in the Village and Town of Kewaskum. Concerns over repaving the bridge over the Milwaukee River are the latest excuse.

Village Administrator Matt Heiser stated he received word from the DOT a few weeks ago. He explained that state engineers are concerned that simply repaving the bridge is not a sufficient fix.


Engineering for the sewer and water along the village's portion of the roadway has been put on hold. The village previously contracted with McMahon and Associates for the work.

Heiser says plans for streetscaping are also on hold. He says he was also notified the state was not accepting any grant applications at this time for streetscaping projects as well.

The project delay does allow the village to budget better for the project however, the condition of the street has Heiser and Department of Public Works Superintendent Jerry Gilles contacting state and county road officials about what repairs will be done in the interim.

If the project proceeds in 2013, Heiser expected work to start in February and finish in October of that year.

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
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

Jacobs guilty of two felonies in McKee crash

Ken McKee said he is happy "justice is starting to be served in the death of our son" with the conviction of Jason Jacobs last week in Washington County Circuit Court.

A jury found Jacobs guilty on both of the two felonies he was charged with: homicide by operating a vehicle while intoxicated and homicide while driving under the use of a controlled substance. Each carries a maximum fine of \$100,000 and 25 years imprisonment. Sentencing is set for

On Nov. 14, 2008, Tim McKee's two-door car collided with a sport utility vehicle driven by 35-year-old Lomira resident Jason Jacobs at the intersection of Orchard Valley Road and Highway H at 7 a.m. in the town of Farmington, according to the criminal complaint. Jacobs' vehicle had run the stop sign, according to the criminal complaint.

McKee, 25, was pronounced dead at the scene.

His family has been trying its best to cope.

"Tim lost everything. We're all hurting bad. Tim lost the most, and that's the rest of his life, and that really bothers me," Ken said. "We've got a conviction once there's a fairly substantial sentence at least we would feel justice would be served for our son."

A blood draw from Jacobs at 10:10 a.m. the day of the accident - about three hours after it happened - showed a blood-alcohol content of 0.072. The results indicate that his blood alcohol content at the time of the accident would have exceeded the .08 legal limit - likely around 0.11, according to the complaint.

The court ruled the blood

test was admissible, despite the defense claiming Jacobs was persuaded in agreeing to the test.

"We had to go through months more of court time," Ken said

A state law known as Tim's Law was passed in March to loosen restrictions on requiring a blood-alcohol test of those in accidents causing injury or death.

According to the old law, an officer may request an intoxication test if alcohol or other drug use is detected before arresting a driver who is in an accident that causes death or great bodily harm or who is driving a commercial vehicle. The new law allows an officer to request a blood test for intoxication if the officer reasonably believes the driver broke a traffic law, regardless of the detection of intoxication.

If the driver refuses the test, the officer may arrest the driver and require the test. To read the law, go to http:// www.legis.state.wi.us/2009/ data/SB-303.pdf.

Ken said he can't believe a law like that wasn't already on the books. He said the thought it was unfair an autopsy and blood test was done on Tim right away while it took longer for a blood test to be done on Jacobs, who caused the acci-

'We rectified that problem," he said.

scholarship for \$1,000 was given out last week in Tim's name. Ken said he hopes the scholarship goes on for a long time and for donations to provide more money to be given

"Our family needs to keep Tim's name going," he said.



This event, which highlights the extent, quality, and value of undergraduate involvement in faculty-guided research projects, took place on Wednesday, May 7 in the State Capitol Rotunda in Madison. Their poster titled, "A Computational Chemistry Study and Natural Bond Orbital Analysis for NOx" was one of fourteen on display from 17 UW campuses across the state. More than 100 students and their faculty advisors from the UW System campuses participated. The UW-WC stu-

The four students worked on this research project under Dr. Ayoub's supervision while enrolled in the Independent Study in Chemistry course (CHE 299) in the fall semester 2009 and spring 2010 semes-

According to Dr. Ayoub, nitric oxide (NO), nitrogen dioxide (NO2), and dinitrogen trioxide (N2O3) play vital biochemical and environmental roles. Using modern computational chemistry techniques with natural bond orbital (NBO) and natural resonance theory (NRT) analysis, the students investigated their

electronic structures and patterns and produced 2d and 3d surface plots to demonstrate their reactivity.

Goeden cruises to clean sweep

Kewaskum sprint car driver Don Goeden has had some big nights racing on the Wilmot track but none more memorable than last Saturday when he posted "a clean sweep," winning the 10-lap heat race and running away with the 25-lap feature.

"We had a good night," Goeden said Sunday, a day after the opening race night at Wilmot, which is located near the Wisconsin-Illinois border.

For the past several years, Wilmot has skipped having time trials, according to Goeden, who said, "it saves the track and makes for a better show for the fans."

"I started sixth in my heat race by draw," Goeden went on, noting he took over the lead on about the seventh lap.

This alone would have made for a fairly successful night, considering it was the first time he had been in his black No. 11, 410 sprint car this year.

Car owner Bob Walldon, who is from Winthrop Harbor, Ill., was going to pass on racing for the 2,010 season but then later reversed his decision, which was good news for Goeden.

"We're just going to hit all the special, local shows," Goeden said. "Bob just got the motor back, so we were going to test it at Wilmot. It's just five miles from his house."

Goeden and his crew arrived early to get in a bit of hot-lapping to test the motor, and, "We just had to change the fuel setting ... By the time the heat race came along, we were ready."



Rising Up...No topping bluegill surface action

The heavy green flyline looped back before carrying Scott Heitman's hometied cargo imitating the Lost Lake hatch forward again to lie gently on the water. A few second later, another bluegill rose among its band of brothers rising here and there to the tiny dark flies scattered over the surface and met a sharp reminder that even panfish best watch what they choose for dinner. Heitman wrestled the gill in, returned the fish to grow up a bit, and reaffirmed what we had already discussed on the three hour ride from the Milwaukee burbs to Marinette County.

'We're early," Heitman said. "When the gills spawn on these lakes up here it's a riot. The fish are big and they're really aggressive. In a couple weeks it's going to be a lot of fun, especially catching them on a flyrod."

The early bird may get the worm. But, you can't hurry warming water temperature as the single most important factor when targeting spawning bluegills. No doubt about it, north and south in Wisconsin these 15,000 lakes are Mother Nature's kitchens. We have to wait until she warms the water to 'just right' to make those big, hard fighting, great tasting gills vulnerable.

It's worth the wait. When Heitman and I headed northeast Wednesday to his cabin near Crivitz in Marinette County, we knew we were early for gills. Especially when five inches of heavy, wet snow blanketed the area May 10th, delaying Mother's plans. You've heard the old saying; April showers bring May ... blizzards. But with flyrods packed, we also knew that we would catch gills and maybe a bonus bass or two and that this story would serve as a reminder to you, the reader, that now is the time to plan for your own trip, basically anywhere in Wisconsin. With fast action a promise when water does heat up, don't forget the kids. Spawning, cooperative gills and warm weather are the two most important ingredients to get kids hooked on fishing for life.

Gills also make some of us, like Heitman and me, kids all over again. Or, like Jaime Darge, the Director of Tourism for Marinette County who paid us a visit as we worked tiny, spring-fed Lost Lake with surface poppers and various

flies until we finally matched the hatch that were making the feisty gills rise frequently to ripple the surface and fill their bellies.

"I think the spawn is late this year because of the cold weather and five inches of snow we got up here last Friday," Darge said. "My husband (Dave) and I are usually catching gills along the shoreline on these lakes the second or third week of May. Usually, we're using ice fishing jigs; small black and white or dullcolored jigs that look like fly larvae or bugs. We'll cut open the stomach of a fish or two, see what they're eating and try to match the hatch."

We could relate. High winds riled little Lost Lake as I walked the shoreline in waders to find calm waters on the upwind side, and Heitman cut to the chase in his canoe. When we met, calm surface water protected by the tall, majestic pines of the northland was being pocketed by feeding fish. Closer observation verified that they were indeed gills, but our mini-arsenal of poppers and flies didn't initially trip the trigger. Even closer observation found that tiny, dark-colored winged flies scattered the surface. We too, tried to match the meal.

Heitman is a self-taught flyfishing enthusiast, right down to avidly reading to learn what trout hit where in Wisconsin and how to tie what to catch them. We benefitted this week because Scott had enough flies of various size and color in his box already tied in his basement that would enable us to closely mimic what we were watching on the water. "I'll bet you," I said before the dark fly in the palm of his hand ever hit the water, "that you will catch a gill within one minute."

I was wrong. He caught a nice largemouth bass that put up quite a fight on a light flyrod. The gills would soon follow. But the big gills, those protective bulls guarding nests crafted carefully to rear a new year class, will be coming a bit further down the line. "There are some great lakes for big bluegills up here," Heitman said. "And it is going to be worth it when they begin to spawn to make the trip again."

According to several internet sites found by googling "Spawning Bluegills", the feisty gill will begin to spawn in the spring and early summer as water temperatures approach about 70 degrees, with peak spawning activity in May and June. "In areas that are free from over-crowding, some fish will spawn again during the latter part of the season, according to one site. cause of this long spawning season and multi-spawn ability, bluegills have outstanding reproductive potential. In fact, they often spawn too successfully, which tends to produce overpopulation and stunted growth."

Males create nests in gravel or hard bottoms found in water one to three feet deep. Although northern Wisconsin lakes will be behind on the calendar with gills spawning later, some southern lakes, like Geneva, will also see late spawning gills in much deeper water, due to the vastness and depth of the lake and colder temperatures. Like so many angling activities in Wisconsin, it all depends...on geography, temperature, and individual l characteristics.

Gills often create spawning colonies with 50 or more nests. Heitman and I, in fact, were working a shallow bedding areas clearly made last vear and unattended. Males make the initial spawning action, creating the nests and later protecting the hatch from predators after the females have moved in and dropped up to 40,000 or more eggs.

It's those vulnerable big bulls quick to hit an intruding lure or fly that will be well worth your time on the water. They're also unbeatable in the frying pan. It's another nice thing about Wisconsin. If you live here, you're close...really close....to good gill water. Get

"Marinette County has 444 inland lakes consisting of 12,371 acres of water," Jaime Darge said. "We have 304 rivers and streams for trout, and the Bay of Green Bay for those anglers that like the really big fish." 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

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
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Indians unable to overcome Warriors in eight

On as close a play, she was called out at the plate.

The Warriors scored one run in the eighth on a walk and held on for a 3-2 victory. All the Warriors' runs were unearned as the first two came on a dropped pop fly.

Heberer allowed six hits and two walks. She struck out five, again with help from Marquardt at catcher, who is calling the pitches.

'She took control. I really thought her and Erica worked very well tonight," said Coach Jeff Gosse.

Kewaskum's three conference losses have come by a combined four runs.

"You just think about what could have been. The first game against Waupun (4-2 loss), last night against Waupun, blowing two, four-run leads against Plymouth the first time..." said Gosse.

But he is pleased with this

"Last year we were losing all these games. This year we won them. It's a give and take. We've won games we shouldn't have won and lost games we shouldn't have," he

He said the difference is chemistry.



The Athletics Department of UW-Washington County is hosting a series of summer sports camps, open to girls and boys grades 5 through 12, from mid June-through mid-August.



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
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
