First Kewaskum Relay For Life this weekend at KHS

If anyone was ever going to start a cancer fundraiser in Kewaskum, Sadie Hennig could be the most logical choice.

The high school senior's greatgrandparents died from cancer, her grandparents had it, her mom had it and the disease even took her dog.

This weekend, the work of Hennig, her friends and the community comes to fruition with Kewaskum's first American Cancer Society Relay for Life event.

Relay for Life, the society's signature fundraiser, consists of teams that walk around a track, ideally at least one member from the team walking the entire time, a survivor lap of cancer survivors

to kick off the event, a luminaria announcements. ceremony to honor those who have been lost to and are still fighting cancer. Food and entertainment of various kinds are often included.

An American Cancer Society representative e-mailed several Milwaukee-area schools about starting a Relay last year, and Kewaskum answered the call. Hennig began in November on the event. Since then, a committee of about 13 - mostly Hennig's friends, including her younger sister – did the bulk of the work.

"I just took the initiative," Hennig said, citing cancer's impact on her family.

Committee members contacted businesses and kept the school updated through newsletters and

"All the committee members are really dedicated which is really helpful," Hennig said. "Everyone who has been involved has been really excited. Even the teachers here have been support-

Nineteen teams and about 180 people are signed up, but Hennig said she knows several more people who said they will come. Signup is not required to attend. 'I didn't think people would go for it this much. Cancer affects everyone. They've really taken it to heart," Hennig said.

Nobody more so than Hennig. Her mom survived a bout with skin cancer and Hennig feared the worst when she found a lump in her German shepherd not long





Wayne man injured in Dodge County train crash

An Allenton man remains hospitalized after the vehicle he was driving collided with a train in the Village of Rubicon Tuesday morning, June 1

shortly before 7 a.m.

The full size Dodge truck was driven by Nathan Janz, 31, southbound on County Highway P in the village of Rubicon. Dodge County Sheriff's Deputy Kevin Homan, reported the truck failed to stop at the railroad crossing just north of Rome Road.

"The lights were flashing and the bell was ringing to signal a train on the tracks," he explained. The eastbound Wisconsin Southern train collided with Janz on the tracks. The vehicle was pushed down the tracks for 1,651 feet.

Janz was taken by helicopter to Froedtert Hospital in Milwaukee.

Deputy Homan also stated in a press release the train did activate its horn prior to the crossing and believed to be traveling at 40 MPH.

Alcohol and weather are not believed to be a factor in the crash.

Janz was wearing his seatbelt at the time of the crash and at the time of this release his injuries are believed to be non life threating.

KHS student injured in rollover crash



A Kewaskum High School junior was seriously injured in a single vehicle crash on Wednesday, May 26, at 2:34 p.m. on County Highway H, west of Salisbury Road (north) in the Town of Kewaskum. Kewaskum Fire Department and EMS were dispatched to the scene to treat the lone occupant and driver of the vehicle, Andrew R. Schreier, 17, of Kewaskum. West Bend EMS Intercept and Theda Star Medical Helicopter were requested to assist and transport Schreier to Children's Hospital in Milwaukee. Lt. Bruce Theusch, of the Washington County Sheriff's office stated the initial investigation indicated Schreier's vehicle was eastbound on County Road H prior to the crash. The vehicle then left the north side of the road and impacted a tree before overturning. "Speed appears to be a factor in the crash," he explained.

Black bear causes uproar in Kewaskum

An adult black bear has been the topic of many conversations in the area around the Village of Kewaskum. The 250-300 pound bear has visited many rural residents on a sight seeing tour of the area that began on Highway 45 in the town of Auburn and most recently, Fredonia.

The bear is believed to have been first seen by a homeowner in Oakfield and then in Ashford Thursday and Friday. On Sunday, May 30, at 8:00 a.m. the Washington County Sheriff's Office was notified by the Fond Du Lac County Sheriff's Office they had several sightings of a black bear in their county.

Before making his trek into Washington County, Highway S resident, Mary Lynn Ellis reported seeing the bear around 8:15 a.m. Another resident in that area, Fred Seefeldt also reported a sighting.

A short time later a Village of Kewaskum Police Officer spotted the bear on State Highway 28 on the East side of Kewaskum. The bear at that time was observed running into the Kettle Moraine State Forest.

He or she must have enjoyed the forest as the bear remained there until the evening when travels led to Doug Gonring's home on Highway 28 and than continued to Harvey and Kathie Ramthun's home on North Mill Road.

Kathie Ramthun reported her family was visited around 8:30 p.m. The bear came up to the patio to check out the bird feeders.

"One of the adults made a growl sound from the window of the house and the bear left the property crossed the road onto another home owner's property where a gentlemen got within 20 yards of the bear. He proceeded to chase the bear off the property and into the Kettle Moraine," reported Ramthun.

The Washington County Sheriff's Office reported in a press release that no reports indicated the bear acted in an aggressive manner towards humans or other animals and no reports that it has caused

any damage.

The DNR has been contacted and encourages people to leave the bear alone and not feed it. If you reside in this area you are encouraged to secure your garbage and not leave food outside. If you see

the bear you should maintain good distance and not confront it. According to the DNR the bear does not pose a great danger to humans. If the bear would be spotted in a heavily populated area you are encouraged to contact your local law enforcement agency.






Four car accident ties up Hwy. 45 Tuesday



A hot pitcher, air-tight defense and a successful squeeze secured Kewaskum's fast-pitch softball team a second home playoff game.

A pitchers' duel that didn't have a runner get past second base until the fourth inning had the game hang in the balance with every play. The No. 1-seeded Indians made nearly every one of them in a 1-0 Division 2 regional playoff victory against No. 4 Mayville Tuesday.

"I knew it was going to be a good game but they're a damn good team. Good pitching, good hitting. That was a good battle," said Coach Jeff

On Tuesday, it was shortstop Monica Dehler diving for a dusty catch on a bloop near third base; third baseman Jenny Reicher looking back a runner at second before gunning to first for the sure out; right fielder Caitlin Rinzel racing in to catch a short line drive; pitcher Erica Heberer catching a bunt and firing to first for a double play; second baseman Jennifer Beiswenger scampering backward to catch

an in-between popup over her shoulder.

Kewaskum made no errors and the Cardinals didn't leave much room for mistakes.

Heberer allowed two hits and three walks. She struck out four and didn't let a runner past second in the Indians' first shutout of the season. Danielle Case allowed six hits, no walks, hit one batter and struck out six.

With the welcome problem of two good pitchers on the roster, Heberer gets the nod throughout the playoffs over Reicher, a freshman who threw well all season who will pitch if Heberer struggles.

The game's only run came in the fourth. Dehler lined a single to right field and took second on a Reicher sacrifice bunt. She moved to third on a passed ball and Kewaskum's hottest hitter, Abby Amerling, stepped to the plate.

The squeeze was on. Mayville knew it. The junior catcher bunted one ball foul before another went airborne and landed fair.

The throw came home and so did Dehler. The ball seemed to slide out of the catcher's glove as the tag was put on in what would have been a tough call either way.

"As soon as Abby got it, it was kind of up, so I was kind of scared. I was just going,"

Dehler said. "I'm already half down the line and they knew I was coming anyways, so I figured I had to get my butt there. And Abby did an awesome job laying it down."

Heberer overcame a mental obstacle to keep the Cardinals scoreless. During her pitching motion, her back foot sometimes hops and loses contact with the pitching rubber and then replants, an ille-

She ultimately decided, "I can't worry about it. I've just got to pitch it. My fastballs were pretty good."

So was the defense behind her, not lost on Heberer.

They had some amazing catches. That was awesome. That brought all of our, like, enthusiasm up, too, so that was good," she said.

We've been practicing a lot of communication," Dehler said. "I think that's, like, the key to defense, knowing where everybody is. Talking is helping us a lot.'

So is chemistry, which Gosse has praised since day one. He saw it over the holiday weekend.

The Indians almost scored a second run in the sixth. Dehler singled and was caught stealing at second, one batter before Amerling clocked a triple to right center, her third straight game with a threebagger. Gosse was just as impressed with Amerling's work behind the plate.

'She's been calling a great game back there. She calls the defenses," he said. "And she's been a tear on offense."

Facing a fast pitcher like Case could help Kewaskum prepare for Grafton.

That's what we'll see in Grafton," Gosse said. "It's only going to get tougher from here on out. Grafton comes out of the North Shore. That's a darn good conference. They have good pitching, I know that."

Another pitchers' duel could be in the cards.

"Erica's going to keep us in the game," Gosse said. "The hitters just have to do their job, the defense just has to do their job. She's done that the last two years. She hasn't got blown out."

Grafton beat Brown Deer, 18-0, and Kettle Moraine Lutheran, 5-0, to reach the regional final.

Mayville finished the season 9-15. They beat Port Washington, 7-6, last week to earn a trip to Kewaskum.

If the seeds hold, a rematch with No. 1-seeded Waupun on the road looms. The Warriors beat Campbellsport, 10-3, on Tuesday and face No. 3-seeded Ripon on Thursday. The Warriors beat Kewaskum twice this season, 4-2 at Waupun and 3-2 in eight innings in Kewaskum.
