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Beine is lone place winner in state track competition

LA CROSSE - It's not easy for high school athletes to qualify for the WIAA State Track and Field Meet, and it's even harder to place in the big show held on the UW-La Crosse campus.

Every inch counts ... every split second is important ... every miss in the field events factors into who makes the victory stand. And it always helps to have nerves of steel.

Kewaskum High representatives would certainly attest to that fact after competing in the Division 2 event on Friday and Saturday. Only one, senior Candace Beine, placed. She took eighth in the Division 2 triple jump with a leap of 34 feet, 6 inches (34-06).

"She did well," KHS coach Jerry Gosa said about Beine, noting, "Coach (Jason) Meinen and she had agreed on the first goal to make finals, and she was fifth after the preliminaries."

Just 4.25 inches separated fifth through eighth places in the triple jump, and Gosa reported, "She did have one jump where she scratched by the smallest of margins. That was

the jump that would have been over 35 feet."

Haley Gregoriou, another senior, made the finals, but missed placing among the top eight. Her times of 48 and .73 seconds (48.73) gave her ninth overall.

In Friday's preliminaries, Gregoriou turned in a time of 47.22 to put her in the finals.

"She didn't get off to a very good start (Friday), but she had a nice finish," Gosa said, adding, "Saturday, it started to rain (just before her event)," and put quite simply, "it didn't look like she had what it took."

Kewaskum's other representative, Kassie Legate, did not make the opening height of 9-0 in the pole vault. Normally the bar is placed a little lower, but at state, it is set one foot below the mark of the eighth best height from all the sectionals.

Nine feet had been Legate's best jump this year.

Both T.J. Schlice and the boys 4x100-meter relay struggled against the stronger competition.

Schlice cleared 5-10, but that was the best he could do on Saturday. "He was 14th out of 16," Gosa said.

Gosa went on that Schlice missed his first two jumps at 5-8, then made that height on his third try and made 5-10 on his first jump but faltered at 6-0 where eventually there was a logiam of athletes.

In the relay, the foursome of Eric Perkins, Teddy Wollner, Brandon Zolp and Mat Toles combined for a time of 44.77 after qualifying with a season-best time of 44.61 at the Whitewater Sectional.

"Eric ran really well. He actually gained on the stagger," Gosa said, but from then on the Indians started falling back and wound up with the 14th time out of the 16 entrants.

"I don't think people realize how difficult this is," the coach said, looking at the fact places are separated by hundreths of a second..

Gosa said the two days were pretty long for the athletes and for him, especially considering he had a bad cold. He summed up the experience by saying, "The kids weren't as good as I would have liked them to be."

Raises given to teachers, administrators

The Kewaskum School Board on Monday approved a 2009-2011 teachers' contract and raises for administrators and nonunion support staff.

The teachers' contract calls for a 1.25-percent raise for each of the first and second years.

The teachers will keep their existing health insurance plan with the Wisconsin Education Association Trust.

The total percentage increase for salaries and benefits is estimated to be 3.81 percent the first year and 3.82 percent the second year, according to a district statement.

The statement said settlements of teachers contracts in Wisconsin have been averaging approximately 3.8 percent, according to the Wisconsin Association of School Boards.

The Kewaskum Education Association (KEA) ratified the contract June 2.

Negotiating teams for the Board and KEA worked out an agreement for the new contract during a six-hour bargaining session on May 25. KEA has been working since July 1, 2009 under the terms of the old contract which expired on June 30, 2009.

The contract comes nearly two months after the board approved laying off six teachers, citing stagnant enrollment, a justifiable budget to community members and contract negotiations.

This is Kewaskum's first contract agreement since the state government's elimination of the qualified economic offer (QEO), which allowed school districts to



Much discussed at Village Board meeting, new TIF plan approved

Kewaskum's embattled and empty tax incremental finance district No. 2 took another step toward a development landing there Monday night as the Village Board approved two certified survey map (CSM) for two parcels.

One is for a 3.67-acre parcel at 770 Prospect Drive known as the Remmel property

The Plan Commission last month passed along a recommendation to approve the CSM.

Board approval didn't come until one motion was defeated, however, as the devil remains in the details.

Developer Gary Gavin submitted a CSM that engineering firm Rueckert/Mielke examined and sent a letter back requesting more detail and resolution to some issues. On Monday, Gavin's engineer, Tim Hayes, submitted an updated CSM that he claimed took care of those issues except one: a new concept plan. Village staff recommended a concept plan to show how the development would fit in with the rest of the TIF District. Zoning Administrator/ **Building Inspector Chad Cook** said at last month's plan commission meeting the idea is to have a "general understanding" of traffic flow and how utilities get from point A to point B, although he understands concept plans may change depending on what prospective buyers want to do with properties.

Gavin's attorney, Karen Christianson, told the board on Monday submitting a new concept plan is "very impractical to deal with at this time given the economic conditions." It's most practical, she said, to get at least one lot sold and utilized.

Village Administrator Mathew Heiser said "With all due respect, our attorneys have recommended otherwise."

A motion to approve the CSM provided all the conditions, including the concept plan, are met failed 4-3. Craig Garbisch, Harry Roecker, Mike

A motion to approve the CSM provided all conditions be met except the concept plan then passed unanimously.

"I'd like to see this go ahead and get moving ... so we can have some income coming in, too," said Berger.

The second parcel, a 2.5acre lot along Prospect Drive called the remnant parcel that borders wetlands, was approved in a similar fashion.

Hayes provided an updated CSM and the board unanimously approved it provided Rueckert/Mielke and village staff's considerations are met.

Jaws of Life needs new life

Kewaskum Fire Department's jaws of life unit that had something go wrong with its hydraulic unit at the Every 15 Minutes program's mock drunk driving accident April 22 is in need of bigger repair than first thought.

Fire Chief Mark Groeschel told the Village Board on Monday the pump is shot. The unit is 19 years old and no longer manufactured, hence parts are not available.

"So our only option is to replace the hydraulic power unit," he said.

It will cost \$7,050.

"It's a piece of equipment that's vital to our operation," Groeschel said.

Heiser said without that piece of equipment the department would have to call for mutual aid and accident victims would have to wait for the response.

Former Trustee and Kiwanis member Kevin Scheunemann said he would check with Kiwanis about making a donation to help pay for the new unit.

Public Comment added to meetings

A public comment session will soon be added to Village Board agendas similar to that of the School Board.

Public comment used to be part of the agenda until it was dropped years ago and not added back on – until now. Village President Andrew Pesch said he would like to see the item at the end of the agenda, and the trustees agreed.

New smoking regulations could be added to code

The Village Board is considering including the new state smoking regulations in its own municipal code. The ordinance was introduced on Monday night and could be approved at the next board meeting.

The new law only allows tobacco use in an outside area that is a "reasonable distance" from the entrance of the bar, restaurant or business.

While smoking can be done outside, Police Chief Richard Knoebel said patrons may not take their drinks outside.

Business owners with customers violating the new law and people themselves may each be fined \$177 for a violation. But business owners may only be fined once per day. People may be fined multiple times, said Knoebel.

Violations may not be used in determining whether or not to allow a business a liquor license, Knoebel said.

"It's going to be interesting to say the least," he said of the new law.

Beyond that, Heiser said municipalities may not regulate "reasonable distance." The businesses themselves do that.

Scheunemann argued against putting the law in the municipal code. He said the issue is not about smoking but about property rights.

Scheunemann said he

used to be able to just ask smokers to leave without legal repercussions. Now, he could ask them to leave or call the police and get his customers cited and risk getting cited himself. If he doesn't call and just asks them to leave, another customer may call the police and citations may ensue.

"With this mandate ... there's an extra duty now," he said.

Scheunemann said he will now have to train people in charge, some as young as 17, in the new law as well.

The board may act on putting the law in the village's municipal code at its next meeting, June 21.



National City to become PNC Bank on Monday

On Monday, June 14, Kewaskum's oldest bank along with two dozen other National City branches in the Milwaukee area will open their doors as PNC Bank, just as PNC begins to embark on a \$50 million investment in the region.

Starting Friday, the two banks will undergo changes ending with PNC opening Monday. National City branches will be closed on Saturday. Customers will also see those changes as online banking changes and use of check/ debit cards are changed.

This week, PNC is mailing customers new debit cards to replace their National City cards, said Richard Kellmann, regional manager for Waukesha Washington county region. Customers may activate their new cards on Friday. A grace period allowing them to use their old cards runs through July 13.

Customers' account numbers will be the same and they can continue to use their checks without complications, he said.

National City's rewards program called Points that allows customers to build up points by how they do their banking and redeem them for tickets, merchandise, gift cards or cash, will carry over and operate exactly the same, Kellmann said.

No staffing changes will be made at Kewaskum's seven-employee branch at 1225 Fond du Lac Ave.

they've "The people grown to know are the same people they will continue to work with," Kellmann said.

"For our customers, we've learned the importance of making this transition easy for them," said Linda Morris, executive vice president of PNC Bank. "We started communicating to them three months ago and are confident based on eight integrations during the past five years that we are ready for a successful conver-

PNC plans to upgrade its 24 branches in the Milwaukee

Morris stated, "Our plans include an investment of more than \$50 million in this region over the next five years, including hiring, new branches and community support. Our goal is to become one of the top three banks serving Milwaukee. We've long been a leader in this community, and now that we are PNC, we're even stronger."

PNC does offer a different set of products, one being Virtual Wallet that will roll out next week for Kewaskum's customers. The online program, a hybrid between electronic banking and the old paper system, allows customers to build a budget, simplify bill management, automatically save money or schedule a plan to build up a nest egg, and provides check accessibil-

"If anything, it's an enhancement to some of the things we had previously," Kellmann said.

Pittsburg based PNC purchased National City on October, 24, 2008 for \$5.6 billion. The sale created the nation's fifth largest U.S. Bank. At the time, it was reported PNC would exchange \$5.2 billion in stock and \$384 million in cash for National City.

This is the final phase of the PNC/National City conversion that began last November







25 Years Ago

April 12, 1985

Quiet little Beechwood Lake, located along Sheboygan County Highways S and A, is rapidly turning into a creeping monster, rising almost an inch every other day, invading the basements, wells and septic systems of its defenseless neighbors. How, why and who, if anyone, is responsible for the lake rising almost a foot a year for the last four years is a mystery. The lake has grown from its 1964 recorded size of 10.9 acres at 20 feet deep, to its present estimated 35 acres and 29 feet deep and still rising. This spring the lake has risen so high that it is now 10 inches over the north side of Highway S, and is standing about five inches deep in the middle of the road itself. Beechwood residents, some who have lived in the area for more than 50 years, and have never seen the lake so high, theorize water runoff, new springs, or even a combination of these things may be the cause for the lake's uncontrolled growth. The issue came up at Tuesday night's Town of Scott hearing, attended by approximately 120 people. The DNR and Sheboygan County Soil Conservation Department had been consulted with no help. A tavern, St. John's Church and nearly a dozen homes have fallen victim to the lake with water seeping into basements, wells and sentic systems. A temporary solution would be to pump the lake and lower its level but one resident stated another town had to pay \$10,000 to do this. State Representative Mary Panzer and Senator Scott McCallum, who were in attendance,, offered their assistance in resolving the matter. Panzer suggested hiring a professional to do a study and give an expert opinion. She stated they could contact a specialist through the University of Wisconsin at Madison. Residents stated they hoped the government could come up with some funding to help resolve the problem.







On No. 15, the wheels started coming off, however, when Gonring drove into the rough, was short of the green on his second shot, pitched on and proceeded to 3-putt for a double bogey. Then on Nos. 16-18 he went 7, six, and five.

Last Thursday served as an unfitting finale as most of Kewaskum's big guns had an off day, an anomaly that closed the books on a recordsetting fast-pitch softball sea-

Grafton beat the host Indians, 6-2, in a WIAA Division 2 regional final game. The No. 2-seeded Warhawks went on to face Waupun, an Eastern Conference rival Kewaskum would have liked a third shot at after two narrow losses.

The No. 1-seeded Indians were a step off from their 1-0 win over Mayville the Tuesday before and that meant doom against a polished Grafton team. Kewaskum finished 16-8, a school record for wins (it had been 12), and advanced deeper in the playoffs than any team in program history.

'It was a good season. It was an awesome season for our ending for the seniors. We

played a good year, good history in Kewaskum," said senior pitcher Erica Heberer.

I think we had a good run. We kind of started a new path for the younger people underneath us," said senior shortstop Monica Dehler.

Nice season. Can't complain. I told the girls we're proud of them," said Coach Jeff Gosse. "They worked extremely hard. They blazed a new trail. No team in Kewaskum has been this far. They set a lot of records this year."

Heberer (11-2) allowed eight hits and one walk in seven innings. She didn't strike out a batter as she got behind in the count and Grafton hitters were patient and smart. Heberer was still thinking of Tuesday when she was being watched for letting her foot slip off the pitching rubber.

"I think, just overall, like, Tuesday was, like a better day for me. Just little things were off. I was really focusing on my foot because of what all happened on Tuesday by drag-

ging and stuff," she said.

She had a great season. Tonight she struggled a little here and there, maintained her composure," Gosse said. "Just wasn't her night tonight. And they hit. She got behind in the count and she had to throw some strikes and they were laying on them. They hit some shots tonight."

Warhawk southpaw Ali Bartel scattered six hits, struck out one and didn't allow a

free pass. She held the Indians' power hitters, Dehler and Abby Amerling, to a combined 0-for-6 and forced many hitters into pop-ups or onehoppers that took high, easy bounces in front of the plate.

Gosse said "she's got a nice rise ball" and "moved the ball up and down in the strike zone. She kept our hitters at

The Warhawks struck for one run in the first, two in the fourth, one in the fifth and two in the sixth. The Indians almost answered in the first after leadoff hitter Liz Schaller started with a bloop single to center. Michele Marquardt hit a sacrifice bunt that moved Schaller to second and she tried to take an extra base and beat the throw across the diamond from first to third, but was called out.

Kewaskum finally got a rally going in the fifth inning when senior Ashley Faber nailed a one-out single that ricocheted off Bartel's glove.

Courtney Krueger then smashed a line drive down the right field line for an RBI triple. Jennifer Beiswenger followed with a shot down the third base line to score a second run.

"Courtney's been a good hitter all year long, consistent going to right field, right center. They gave her the line and she hit it," Gosse said. "Jenny had a really nice hit down the third base line. Just being patient and letting the pitch come to you.'

Grafton answered with two runs in the sixth to make it 6-2 and the Indians went quietly, only putting one runner on in the sixth and seventh innings combined.

Gosse said the two teams mirrored each other.

"It was a good game. They're a good team," he said. "It was going to come down to little things in a game like this. They executed, they got timely hits, pushed runs across. We struggled."

I think we had a better game on Tuesday. On Tuesday we could tell during warmups everyone was just on and today it was just harder," Dehler said. "I think it kind of got to the point that we were, like, nervous that this might have been the last game so we were thinking about that a little more."

Not that the Indians weren't without their highlights. Schaller made one nice running catch in centerfield and made one for the ages for the second out of the seventh inning, laying out and belly flopping to her right to stab a line drive.

"That girl's got some wheels on her. That last catch she made, definitely a 'Sportscenter" catch. She laid out for that thing. That was a heck of a catch," Gosse said.

"That was awesome," Heberer said.

The catch unfortunately won't make it on ESPN as the station didn't send a camera crew to the game (perhaps a scheduling conflict or a fear of black bears).

A less-than-100-percent Faber gutted out a 2-for-3 effort with a double in her last high school softball game.

"She went out and she's a gamer. She went out and played in pain," Gosse said.

Kewaskum loses its three senior leaders - Heberer, Dehler and Faber - all of whom made all-conference, but returns five more all-conference players next season.



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
