Got 'R Done 181 Grads leave KHS armed with education

Kewaskum's class of 2010 totaling 181 made their way out of the steamy gym into the scary and exciting yet refreshingly cool real world on Saturday, time for one last memory together, the traditional photo on the bleachers and dangerous hat toss.

Two student speakers told graduates to focus on just that: each other.

"We have spend our high school careers as a group, as a team as a family," said Kyle Wenger, who considers at least one memory from every classmate "a gift."

"I know that I personally will never forget any of you," he said.

Especially the offensive lineman and astrophysicist who "writes gangsta rap on the side."

Wenger reminded his now former classmates it is time to move on but not forget their roots. "We must embrace our lives as adults," he said. "When you're all rich and famous ... do not forget where you came from and do not forget forever you are a Kewaskum Indian."

Class President Monica Dehler compared life to pin the tail on the donkey, or the game she played, pin the nose on the clown, and referenced the book, "All I Really Need to Know I Learned in Kindergarten."

In both life and the game, it's easy to fall down and go in the wrong direction; support from others is important.

"The game is so much easier when you have somebody behind you," she said.

Since it's human to make mistakes, laughter along the way doesn't hurt, either.

And Dehler had to mention the beloved Jason Last.

"Mr. Last is not yelling. He just talks louder," she said.

But back to life.

"We make a living by what we get but we make a life by what we give," Dehler said. "You can get all A's and still flunk life."

Her closing advice came from the book.

"It is best to watch out for traffic, hold hands and sit together," she said.

Saturday was the last time choir director and music teacher Dave Bertelsen sat together with his students. After 33 years, Bertelsen is retiring. The Concert Choir sang "The Star-Spangled Banner" and Journey's "Don't Stop Believin."

High school teacher Tiffany Zarling referenced another book, "Oh the Places You'll Go," by Dr.

Wellness program to be taught at KHS, KMS

Middle and high school students next year will be taught health and physical education in a blended technique after the School Board this week approved the different format.

Farmington and Wayne elementary schools Principal Janet Molebash said the format uses a "comprehensive type model where you're dealing with the whole body."

"We're already teaching it. We're just putting it in a different format," she said.

Elements of the new format include "awareness of major health components and issues" that provide the ability to "make rational and educated choices," according to the proposal.

Other elements include health resources, preventative care, consumer services and various physical activities.

"A major part of this holistic approach is to have the student assess and interpret their personal health/fitness status. The student will assess their nutritional level and their fitness level and design a personal fitness plan based on this assessment. The student will then implement this plan and periodically assess its effectiveness," the proposal said.

Freshmen will take 18 weeks (one credit) of wellness class instead of nine weeks of physical education and nine of health. Sophomores will have nine weeks of wellness and nine of nutrition. Instead of the elective foods class, students will learn "more about food in general and how it ties into the body and affects you physically," Molebash said.

Juniors will take half a credit of wellness. Seniors may take an elective advanced wellness/senior wellness course.

Kewaskum Middle School is switching to the blended format as well.

The School Board unanimously approved the program.





Milwaukee teen drowns in Mom who threw booze Mauthe Lake during school trip party pleads guilty



Members of the Kewaskum Fire Department who are part of the Washington County Dive Team responded to the scene shortly after 1 p.m. and located the boy within a few minutes of entering the lake. The diver located the student about 25 yards from shore in 10-feet of

Flight for Life Helicopter responded from Fond du Lac just as a diver removed the boy from the water and emergency personnel started resuscitation efforts. The student was then airlifted to Theda Clark Medical Center in Neenah.

At 2:36 p.m., doctors at Theda Clark pronounced the victim dead. He was identified as Kamonie Slade.

Approximately 80 stu-

dents from Roosevelt Middle School, which is part of the Milwaukee Public School system, were at Mauthe Lake Recreation Area with eight teachers and staff. They were on a class trip for their last day of school.

A group of six students were swimming in the posted swimming area when they realized Slade was missing. Staff cleared the water of students and entered the water themselves to begin a search.

Deputies from the Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Office responded along with Forest Rangers, Kewaskum Fire Department, Campbellsport Police Department, Wisconsin State Patrol and the Washington County Dive Team.

A Kewaskum woman has changed her mind and pleaded guilty to providing alcohol to several preteens at a birthday party for her 12-year-old last

Sarah Shay, 36, now has to pay eight municipal citations totaling \$4,881. She had faced 10 but two were dropped and two more amended to a lower fine given the guilty plea.

A Mid-Moraine Municipal Court trial set for July 16 has since been canceled

Shay served the minors champagne and Mike's Hard Lemonade on the way to and at a party held Dec. 18 at West Bend's Hampton Inn & Suites, according to the West Bend Police Department. Police began investigating after parents of party attendees contacted authorities.

Shay was issued a \$681 citation for each child, the department said. The parents had been unaware their children would be given alcohol, according to Police Chief Ken Meul-

"The children include one 11-year-old, three 12-year-olds, four 13-yearolds, and two 14-year-olds. None of these children's parents had any prior knowledge that alcohol would be served to their children," a police department statement says.

Shay has until Oct. 10 to pay the fines or face a warrant for her arrest. She would serve one day in jail for every \$25 due.





Breakfast on the Farm goes organic in St. Michaels

TOWN OF KEWASKUM— The rain, heat and humidity held off at last Saturday's Breakfast on the Farm at KT Organic Farms.

The crowd, as a result, did not.

A total of 4,884 people were served in five hours, not a record but above average, said Mike Strupp, co-chair of the event and treasurer of the Washington County Dairy Promotion Committee.

The event came off without a hitch.

"Outstanding. Everything just moved right along," said Kevin Thull, owner of KT Organic Farms.

"It hums right along," Strupp said. "It's amazing how that group can do five hours of serving that amount of food. You're moving a lot of stuff in a short period of time. Nine hundred people in an hour."

Jeff and Candy McChain and their two children of Boltonville beat most of the crowd as they sat down to breakfast around 7:30 a.m. They had never been to Breakfast on the Farm and came because it was close and they know Thull.

"That's why we came early. I knew there'd be a lot of people," said Jeff.

Jared and Melissa Polzin and their two children from Kewaskum were surprised at the crowd.

"I really didn't expect it to be this big," Jared said.

Perhaps it was the sausage. Both Jared and Melissa said the sausage was the most tasty part of the breakfast.

Wagon rides from the parking lot in the adjacent field sometimes were cut short.

"Some people got on the wagon and got off 150 yards farther. That's where the food line started," Thull said.

At one point, the food line went all the way down the driveway, up the road to the west and 100 to 200 feet to the north. Going through the entire line only took an hour, Thull said.

Thull did get a chance to stop and eat during his busy morning.

"Everything was very tasty, very good," he said.

Beyond breakfast, several tents offered information organic farm education and agriculture, one sold sundaes and another had a petting zoo with chicks, ducks, goats, kittens, dogs, horses, rabbits and chickens.

This was the first time a Washington County Breakfast on the Farm was held on an organic farm. The eggs, cheese, milk, butter used in cooking and on the tables were all organic, Strupp said. Organic Valley Co-op of LaFarge made a large donation toward the event, he said.

The farm has about 250 dairy cattle and pigs and chickens. KT is primarily a dairy farm with male cattle used for beet, Thull said.

KT's crops include corn, oats and pasture. Cows rotated to different pastures every 12 to 24 hours, Thull said. Including rented land, KT has 425 acres.

Thull runs the operation with his wife, Lynn, and her 12-year-old son, Brent, and some part-time employees.

His family farm has been certified organic since 1992 but was organic decades earlier – "organic before organic was cool," Thull has been told.

Thull's father who grew corn for Lakeside Foods had developed boils in the late 1960s whenever he sprayed his crops. He thought there was a connection.

"When he quit spraying, he didn't get boils," Thull said. The family never sprayed again.

"It's just very simple. A simple approach," Thull said. "Nothing artificial on crops or injected into animals. Plenty of people are interested in our products because of that."

During barn tours, patrons learned that how newborn calves are instantly separated from their mothers and isolated in a 17-pen calf barn because they are born with no natural immunities. Any illness or virus the mothers are carrying could kill their young.

For six weeks, calves are given fresh grain and water daily, then moved to a group area and fed hay and a different grain formula.

Thull agreed to host the event in Jaunary 2009. He completed a few building projects like a calf barn, landscaping around the house and some other small jobs in preparation.

"It's a good promotional thing. I thought it would be a good way to introduce people to organic products," he said.

Production didn't slow before or during the event.

"It was just extra work. We had a lot of family and friends that helped out, Thull said. Thirty to 40 family members chipped in.

"It would be great to get back to just working 16 hours a day," Thull said with a laugh. He praised Strupp and Washington County Dairy Promotion Committee President Bernie Wolf, who co-chaired the event for overseeing everything.

"Just such a well-oiled machine, from beginning to end from setup to cleanup. Tents were cleaned up, tables cleaned up, everything falls in line," he said.

Strupp was happy with how the organic farm pulled off the event.

"It was kind of unique. I thought it was neat to have it done out there. Little different venue," he said. "It worked out real well. I was very pleased."

Strupp said the event used

6,500 half pints of milk, 290 pounds of strawberries, 75 gallons of ice cream, 825 pounds of sausage, 594 dozen eggs and 15,000 pancakes.

Next year's location is yet to be determined. Organizers have it narrowed down to a few farms.





His World War II museum that was open to the public stands out because "he was trying so hard to get our work noticed that we did our best."

Rieden called Steers "one of the most dedicated" teach-

ers in the school and he taught her that "what is important is the effort you put in."

High School Art Teacher Rachel Hassler, selected by Samantha Aycock

With an initial "down to business attitude," Aycock soon realized Hassler is a "big softie at heart." She helped her develop artistically and while she laughs, yells and cries for her students, it's because of her passion and caring for them. Hassler helped Aycock make her first ceramic pot, sell her first piece of art and "ignited a passion for art she never knew she had."

Farmington Fifth-grade Teacher **Julie Wenzlaff**, selected by Elissa Miller

"I was not interested in science but she made it interesting," Miller said. During fifth grade, a difficult year as the last at elementary school with the same friends, she remembers Wenzlaff's smile and that she took time to make each student a scrapbook. Miller still pages through it today to walk down memory lane.

High School Science Teacher **Carla Schmitt**, selected by Kyle Wegner

The prairie outside her home enhances her teaching, he said. Because of Schmitt, Wegner will major in biology at the same university Schmitt attended.

High School Science Teacher **Charles Komp**, selected by Daniel Laska

Komp has a "smile remi-

niscent of a mad genius," Laska said. "It's scary sometimes." But Komp is "always jubilant" and "makes class enjoyable." He provides help and gives every opportunity to succeed. Laska said he wouldn't ask Komp and English question but he would bring him an engineering question.

Music Teachers **Eric and Terry Christie**, selected by Karla Stoffel

Terry, an elementary school music teacher, let Stoffel play piano accompaniment in second grade for "Send in the Clowns." In fifth grade, recognizing her musical ability, the husband and wife team started the school's first gifted and talented music program, bringing Stoffel to middle school once a week to learn the instrument of her choice under middle school band director Eric. Stoffel played French horn with the sixth-grade band as a fifthgrader and will be studying music in college, working to become a music teacher like her two role models.

Wayne Third-grade Teacher **Mary Ann Wagner,** selected by Sadie Hennig Wagner taught Hennig "never to give up and never to be discouraged," always encouraging her to wnter an annual book writing contest since the third grade. Hennig continued to enter each year and in eighth grade won the contest's highest award. She also completed a 3-D puzzle and was so proud she brought it to class. Wagner encouraged her and Hennig soon filled the entire back table of her classroom with 3-D puzzles.

Retired Wayne Fifth-grade Teacher **Daniel Beske**, selected by Heather Schmitt

Seven years later, Schmitt still remembers Beske teaching her about "responsibility and respect." A fun teacher, Beske maintained a sense of authority that earned him respect, she said. She still remembers two of his key phrases, "It's nice to be nice" and "Mary had a little lamb," the latter he would whisper and all students in class could hear it as a way to discouraging yelling.

Kewaskum Elementary Third-grade Teacher **Curt Casetta**, selected by Brooke Waala Waala always looked forward to gifted and talented class. They would play charades, do mysteries, write poems and learn astronomy. She later realized she wasn't just having fun; Casetta used these as tools to build character and encourage creativity. He encourages thinking outside the box and brings optimism to the group, allowing Waala to be more positive and build her confidence.

High School Art Teacher Mary Forstner, selected by Elizabeth Shrejer

Shreier had Forstner for art in elementary school and painting as a junior, despite not being sure if she wanted to take another art class. Forstner pointed out Shreier's good work in painting even when Shreier herself didn't see it. "I nominated her for inspiring me in a different way," she said. Shreier also has fondly her lemur from a rain forest project in elementary school.

UW-WC Tuition Frozen for 2010-11

The University of Wisconsin System Board of Regents approved tuition rates for the 2010-11 academic year on Thursday that will freeze tuition at the UW Colleges freshman-sophomore campuses, including UW-Washington County (UW-WC), for the fourth consecutive year. Tuition will increase by 5.5 percent at the four-year UW System universities.

"This is encouraging news for students and the Washington County community," said Dr. David Nixon, campus executive officer and dean of "UW-WC offers a UW-WC. solid University of Wisconsin education, with highly qualified faculty and small classes for the lowest cost in the UW

"The UW Colleges are the gateway to the UW System for thousands of students and families in Wisconsin who might not otherwise be able to afford college," said Chancellor David Wilson, chancellor of the UW Colleges and University of Wisconsin-Extension. This tuition freeze means the UW Colleges will continue to be the most affordable access point for anyone who wants to start, continue or complete a degree within the UW Sys-

The tuition for one academic year (two semesters) at the UW Colleges will remain at \$4,268 for 2010-11. That is \$3,665 less than UW-Madison, \$3,001 less than UW-Milwaukee and \$1,391-\$2,541 less than the 11 other four-year comprehensive UW universities. Students and families can realize even more savings if students live at home during their first two years of college at UW-WC.

UW-WC is one of the University of Wisconsin Colleges. The 13 freshman-sophomore campuses of the UW System offer an associate degree in arts and science and prepare students of all ages and backgrounds for baccalaureate and professional programs. Approximately 1,081 students were enrolled at UW-WC in the 2009-2010 academic year.

47,539 turkeys registered in 2010 spring turkey season MADISON - Wisconsin was expected," said Sharon

MADISON - Wisconsin hunters registered 47,539 turkeys during the 2010 spring turkey season. The registration total was a 9.6 percent decrease from the 2009 harvest of 52,581 birds.

Zone 1 produced the highest overall turkey harvest at 15,120 birds, followed by Zone 3 with 10,953 turkeys. The best hunter success rate appears to be in Zone 2 with a preliminary success rate of 28.5 percent, followed by Zone 4 at 22.4 percent success.

A total of 217,444 permits were issued for the spring hunt, according to licensing officials. This was a decrease of 689 permits compared to the 2009 spring hunt.

"Despite a slight decline in harvest totals from 2008 and 2009, Wisconsin's statewide turkey population remains stable and resilient. The wet spring in 2008 and the cool summer in 2009 meant belowaverage brood production for turkeys during the past two years. When combined with more normal winter conditions, the slight decrease in the number of turkeys harvested

was expected," said Sharon Fandel, acting upland wildlife ecologist for the state Department of Natural Resources.

Hunter success rates also fell slightly to 22 percent in 2010 versus 24 percent in 2009, but were still quite good. As in past years, success rates were generally highest during the early and middle hunting periods.

"Hunters recorded a 31 percent success rate during the first period," says Krista McGinley, DNR assistant upland wild-life ecologist. "Success was 23 percent and 21 percent for the second and third periods, respectively. A decrease over the periods is expected but is still telling of good hunting conditions."

The preliminary results show that adult toms comprised 80.7 percent of the total harvest, which is higher than the long-term average of 74 percent but less than the 86 percent recorded last year. An increased proportion of adults in the harvest can be a sign of lower brood success from the previous year, although hunter selection can also play a role.



Riding abnormal power numbers from a sophomore and solid pitching, Kewaskum's baseball team remains undefeated in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference with no signs of slowing down.

Sophomore Brad Boegel (pronounced beagle) has been hitting the ball more like a rabid Rottweiler. On Monday, he clobbered his eighth home run in 13 games this season and the Indians beat Sheboygan Falls, 6-0, for their first shutout. Kewaskum is 5-0 in the EWC and 10-3 overall as it rides a three-game winning streak to Kiel on Thursday.

Cody Nuernberg pitched six innings and allowed six hits and two walks while fanning eight. Lucas Kopeschka pitched the seventh and allowed one hit. The Falcons got a runner to third base in the fifth inning and loaded the bases in the sixth with two outs before Nuernberg got the No. 9 hitter to ground out to first.

"Cody threw the ball well," Gonring said.

The Indians took a 1-0 lead in the second inning after three singles and a sacrifice fly by Brett Nuernberg. The Falcons' Cole Heili struck out seven in six innings of work.

"I was very impressed with him," Gonring said.

Against conference rival New Holstein last Friday at home, the Indians fell behind 4-0 as rain began to fall before a 17-pitch at-bat changed the tone of the game and a one-pitch at-bat changed the scoreboard.

Brett Nuernberg in the second inning walked on 17 pitches after fouling off several. A runner was tagged out at home to end the inning without scoring, but Gonring said the at-bat altered the entire game.

A wild pitch and two-run error cut the lead to 4-3 in the third inning. By the fifth, the rain picked up and the Indians were in danger of losing a one-run game called early. It didn't happen.

In the fifth, Cody Seibel reached on an error, and Cody Nuernberg followed with a

two-run bomb to left field for a 5-4 lead. Michael Schladweiler and Brett Nuernberg later hit back-to-back doubles for another run and an error brought in one more.

"I put a hit and run on just to see if we couldn't get something moving. That's the second time I've had a hit and run and people were moving and we had a home run so this isn't really a hit-and-run home run deal," Gonring said. The Indians were up, 7-4, a solid lead but not against the team they shared the conference title with last season that beat them three times.

Boegel put the game away in the sixth. A Bo Seibel single, a walk and hit batter loaded the bases. New Holstein

brought in a new pitcher.

Boegel didn't even take one pitch to check out the new arm. He smashed a first-pitch fastball down the left field line, a towering bomb that cleared the first fence, the second fence and stayed in the air long enough for Gonring to yell "Get in the pond!"

Sploosh!

The grand slam gave the Indians an 11-4 lead that would end up as the final score. It was Boegel's first homer that reached the Kiwanis Park pool.

"I talked to Brad prior to the at bat. I said you've got to start timing these pitchers in the batter's box. If you get a fastball, you're capable enough, you're big enough, you're strong enough. Just keep your head on it and put it in play," Gonring said.

He added some perspective.

"Made lily pads out there. That family's going to cost me money by the end of the year," he said. "I'm going to lose more money with balls out there in the pond."

"It was right down the middle. I just took advantage of it," Boegel said. "I actually thought it was foul at first and everyone started cheering. I looked and looked but I couldn't find the ball and then I seen the splash."

Gonring said it was the long at-bat, not the homers, that led to this comeback.

"The thing that turned the whole game around was Brett Nuernberg's at-bat. I think that definitely put a strain on the pitching staff over there and that wore them out. That had a positive for our side right there. That really turned. He wasn't the same pitcher after that," he said.

Besides hitting, Boegel pitched the final five innings of the game, moving to 2-1 on the year. He allowed one run

on one hit, walked two and whiffed nine, including seven in a nine-batter stretch.

"I've been struggling on the mound early in the season. I couldn't find my curve ball and they were hitting my fastball. I was looking for a game where I could find it and it just showed up today," he said.

At home against nearby rival Campbellsport last Thursday, the Indians won 11-1 in six innings.

Boegel hit one homer and two doubles and four RBIs, and Cody Seibel had two doubles and three RBIs. Steve Kudek was 3-for-3.

Cody Nuernberg pitched five innings and allowed one run and three hits and two walks while striking out three. The Cougars loaded the bases in the fourth inning but Nuernberg got leadoff hitter Tim Whitty to line to first for the third out.

Catcher Kevin Gonring hit a solo homer in the third for Campbellsport's offense.

The Indians scored six runs in the second, two in the fourth and three in the sixth. Two bases-loaded walks ended the game.

"My main thing is I get a first pitch strike and I was having a little trouble doing that tonight. I had a few walks and hit a batter," Cody Nuernberg said. "Defense played real well tonight. It feels good when you've got the defense behind you."

"If you're ahead in the count, good things happen," Gonring said. "You've got to pound the strike zone, not hit batters. When you've got the lead, you've got to just let 'em hit the ball and hope your defense makes plays."

The Indians made only one error in the field.

"We hit our cutoffs, we hit our relays, we communicated. When you do that, good things happen," Gonring said.

Kewaskum heads to Kiel 1-5 EWC, 6-5 overall) on Thursday before hosting second-place Plymouth (3-1, 6-2) on Friday. A rematch at Campbellsport (2-2, 7-5) looms Tuesday.
