## Village disputes fee structure in ad

The Kewaskum Village Board disputed the cost of impact/building permit fees that were recently advertised in The Statesman. The ad was taken out twice by Gary Gavin announcing a meeting of TEA party advocates.

Trustee Harry Roecker asked Zoning Inspector Chad Cook about the actual costs of impact fees in the village.

Cook stated that in October 2004 the board set a sewer impact fee of \$2,089.29; the park impact fee was set at \$1,223.43 He went on to say that in July of 2006, the water connection impact fee was set at \$3,360.91 Grand total \$6,673.63

Roecker went on to clarify that the ad taken out by Gavin a few weeks ago in The Statesman was incorrect.

Cook stated that he could not think of a case were it would ever reach \$17,000 as advertised by Gavin. "Maybe a very large house but that's unlikely. Most recently, the highest impact fees paid were around \$8,000," stated Cook.

Cook stated that Kewaskum is in the ballpark of neighbors in Washington County. He also noted that some communities do not call them impact fees, they are also referred to as connection fees.

Cook also noted the village saw it's first new home start in a great length of time a few weeks ago. That new construction is taking place in Kettle Country Estates.

While the downtrodden housing market have placed a significant decline in new home construction in the village, impact fees have been a point of contention for developers in the village. Gavin is not the only real estate developer to quash subdivision plans in the village since water connection fee was added in 2006.

Neighbor Slinger who has a similar population to Kewaskum does not have a water impact fee. However their sewer fee is \$5,560; their park fee is \$705 and have a facility fee of \$780 making their total \$7,045.

## School Taxes hinge on property values

Property values will determine whether or not school district residents will see an increase in their mill rate this year.

School district business manager Paul Reichert said at Monday night's annual meeting he estimates an 18-cent decrease in the mill rate to \$8.48 per \$1,000 of equalized value, provided property values see a modest, 1-percent increase. A 1-percent decrease and the mill rate would stay at last year's level, \$8.66.

"Somewhere in that range is what we're probably going to end up with," Reichert said.

An \$8.48 mill rate would mean the owner of a \$120,000 home would pay \$1,017.60 in taxes, down \$22 from last year, and the owner of a \$170,000 home would pay \$1,441.60, down \$30 from last year.

Should the \$8.66 mill rate hold, the owner of a \$120,000 home would pay

\$1,039.20 and the owner of a \$170,000 home would pay \$1,472.20.

The district will learn the property values around Oct. 1, Reichert said. Local taxes support a tax levy of \$10,710,771, down \$110,000 mostly due to Kewaskum's referendum running out that allowed spending \$430,000 per year for technology and textbooks.

Reichert anticipates state aid to be slightly increased to just less than \$10 million.

Last year's total budget came in with a \$135,684 surplus as revenues of \$20,423,765 were down by \$143,210 but expenditures of \$20,288,081 were down by \$278,894, according to Reichert's unaudited results.

That allowed the fund balance to be bumped from \$2.1 million to \$2.2 million, or 10.6 percent of the district's overall budget. Board policy calls for no less than 10 percent and no more than 15 percent. Fund balance is a school district's account used for emergencies like boiler replacement

or flood damage (such as at Nicolet this year), special projects, budget shortfalls, cash flow purposes and to improve a district's bond rating.

Other budget highlights include

- A \$599,268 savings through a decrease in staffing. 7.67 teaching positions were cut through layoffs, non-renewals, retirement and reducing support staff by \$45,000, saving \$663,317. A middle school Spanish teacher was added for \$64,049. It was the first time this millennium the district had to lay off teachers to help balance the budget.

- Increasing the breakfast and lunch fees by 10 cents each to avoid running a deficit in the food service fund

- The Community Service fund to add the Kewaskum Theatre operating costs to its already covered fitness center costs. Money from fitness center memberships are not covering its staffing and money from the general fund will be used to cover

the shortfall. A portion of admission prices from theater events will be put toward the fund.

Kewaskum will receive \$550,000 of the \$180 million allotted to the state from federal sources as part of an emergency aid package. Reichert said the money may be spent over two years and only on existing or laid-off staff. Administration will look into the details of the spending rules before deciding what to do with the money. He said he thinks if the \$550,000 goes to staff, the district could pull the \$550,000 from its budget it would have spent on staff and spend it on something else.

Superintendent Michael Krumm ran down the district's recent highlights and its strategy for enhanced

performance.

The district has a fitness center, auditorium, media center, Career Academy for an alternative high school and started a community pantry with help from community organizations in the past few years.

He said the overall appearance of the schools has improved, thanks to Reichert and Director of Buildings and Grounds Jim Palmer.

The district has developed "deep and meaningful partnerships" with local churches, private schools, service organizations and government entities. Other help comes from school booster clubs.

"We benefit from the generosity of our taxpayers," Krumm said.

He boasts that more than 80 percent of the district's staff has master's degrees or higher.

"We emphasize professional development

here," he said.

Krumm outlined the district's biggest hurdle.

"We do have a challenge and that challenge is to increase our standardized test scores," he said.

Scores the past few years have been flat though Krumm is quick to remind the public standardized tests do not necessarily predict student success. They are a measure of factual-based learning and scores can vary from year to year for various reasons.

Krumm said the district will not set numerical targets for short-term gains, won't fixate on the tests, teach to the tests or dumb down its curriculum to get better test scores.

"We need to focus on long-term sustained growth," he said. "Performance is hard to define but I think we know it when we see it."

He outlined a few district strategies to help see that sustained growth:

- Reading, writing and relationships is everyone's responsibility;
- Emphasize performance in grading and assessment;
- Maximize academic learning time in class; most study halls eliminated;
- Raise expectations for preparation and practice outside the school day, i.e. have students read a book outside of class and emphasize performance during class.

Krumm wants to ignite students' passion for reading outside of school, which

is why last year the district started sustained silent reading, allowing 10 minutes nearly every day for students to read on their own.

"Our kids know how to read; our challenge is our kids don't read enough," he said.

This year, another focus will be writing, one of the "most cognitively deep activities you can be involved in," Krumm said. Sustained silent writing will be implemented. Work on relationship building continues as the district addresses character education, bullying prevention, has an advisement program, student-led conferences, service learning and customer service learning.

In building on community partnerships to engage the community, Krumm said a public affairs forum will be held in which speakers from various industries will talk to students and be available to the community.

Another goal is to have every graduate be going "somewhere," he said, either some kind of college or the military.

"It's not acceptable just to get a job today," he said.

"Overall, we're trying to create an environment that is academically friendly to our community," Krumm said. "We are the community and the community is us. The school can only be as good as the community and the community can only be as good as the school."

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## Lakeshore Symphonic band in concert

In the spring of 1976, several Ozaukee County residents sought an outlet for their musical talents. Existing community bands in the area rehearsed and performed primarily during the summer because they included student musicians among their ranks. LSB organizers decided they would form a community band that would rehearse and perform primarily from September through May. Its purpose then, as it is now, was to provide an opportunity for adult participation in a musical organization, as well as cultural enrichment for the community at large.

The first director was Clyde Brehm, the band director for the Kewaskum school district. The band held its first rehearsal on September 22, 1976. Not knowing who or how many musicians would show up, organizers were delighted when 30 musicians answered the invitation. Many of them had not played their instruments for years and were a bit rusty, but they were persistent and were pleased to have a venue for their musical talent. Together with a few music teachers and six band directors as mem-

bers the band began to take shape.

In 1978 Albert "Bud" Asch became the second director of LSB. Asch was professor of music at the University of Wisconsin- Washington County. He was also director of the Moraine Symphonic Orchestra of West Bend. For the next 19 years, Asch led the band through weekly rehearsals and four to seven concerts per season. Venues included high school gymnasiums and auditoriums, community centers, churches, even shopping malls and outdoor parks. Concerts have been performed in Grafton, Cedarburg, Port Washington, Saukville, West Bend, Mequon, Slinger, Kewaskum, Fond du Lac, and Door County.

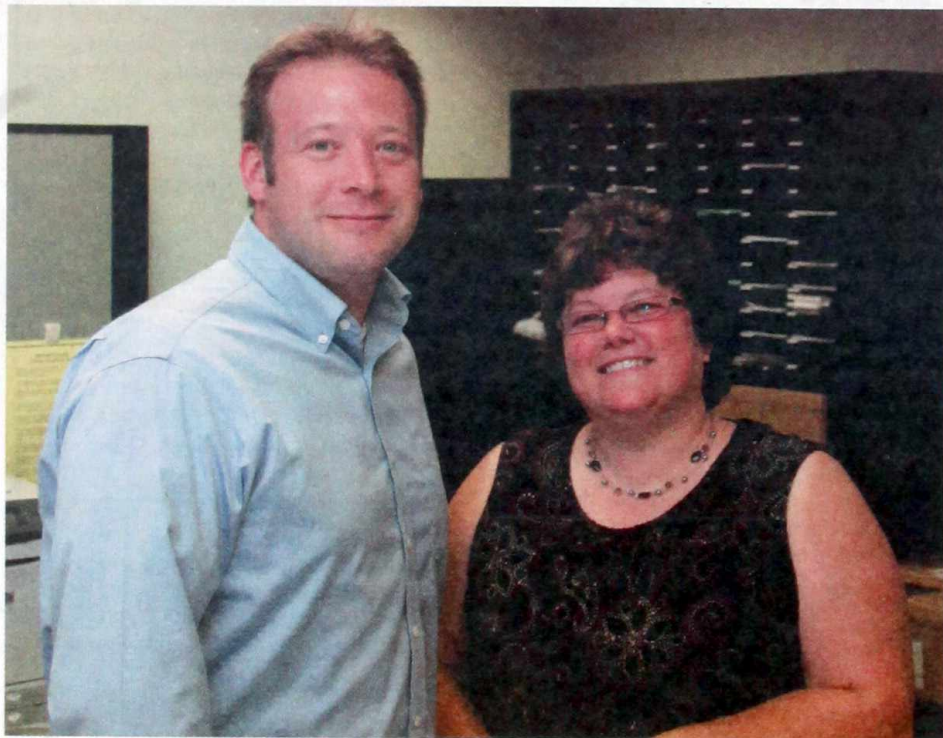

## Fischer heads back to high school, ready to start new school year

## Many changes await KMS students next week

A familiar face returns to the Kewaskum High School this year, this time as principal.

Former assistant principal Tom Fischer has moved from Kewaskum Elementary School Principal to head the high school.

"The transition has been going very smoothly. 95 percent of the staff I already know and have worked with," he said. He even knows most of the support staff and some of the students.

Fischer will help implement a couple of new programs, including the Distinguished Student Program in which participants earn more credits, complete service hours and attend academic events like speakers. Upon completion, they graduate with a certain distinction.

"Service hours will be on the transcript. That's the main focus here," Fischer said.

Candidates for valedictorian and salutatorian must complete the program. The school has ways of helping those who sign up late catch up, or for those who move into the district.

"If you come in late we're going to have some ways to still take part in it," Fischer said.

Students were told about the program last year. Ninety are already enrolled, but there is no due date, Fischer said. Students may sign up at any time.

In addition, Fischer wants to improve advising.

Four days per week, a group of about 15 students will meet with an advisor, who is a teacher, and discuss grades and builds relationships with the students. The advisor will run parent-teacher conferences, reporting on all a student's classes.

The new program does not replace guidance counselors and instead serves as a way to support the guidance office.

"Another step to prevent kids from slipping through the cracks," Fischer said.

The high school will continue the district's initiatives started with last year's sustained silent reading. This year, silent writing will be done four times per week. Topics may run the gamut and are mostly chosen by students.

"We're going to try to keep it independent. There will be prompts for them to use," Fischer said.

Students will be given a journal and expected to have it with them every day. They won't receive a grade on it but teachers will monitor their work and students will be asked to share their writing from time to time.

Besides that, the high school office has been redesigned to use space more efficiently.

"Everything feels more open and it looks a lot better," Fischer said.

strategy - it's almost got that new school smell of paint and tile floor.

Christine Horbas takes over as principal, coming from the high school to spell Ken Soerens, who retired after 36 years with the district. Horbas had been high school principal for seven years.

"This transition has been much easier because I've known teachers. Worked with them - at least I could put a name to a face," she said.

Teachers will be putting more names to faces as the school's population is up 10 percent to about 400.

The schedule shifts from an eight-period day to seven. Teachers will teach six of the

seven periods rather than five of eight, including multiple grades in the same subject.

The schedule eliminates study halls and offers new classes like communications and drama, Horbas said.

"Basically, our kids will have no down time," she said. That's not a problem since "kids don't always apply themselves in study halls."

While teachers pick up a period, they lose having to teach multiple subjects. The majority will teach one subject "which means they can get immersed in that subject and become more of a specialist in that," Horbas said.

Some teachers will teach multiple grades in the same subject and could have some of the same students for two years in a row, known as looping. Kewaskum isn't implementing a looping system, but it could happen by chance.

Horbas said looping commonly occurs in elementary schools to help reading growth. In Norway, students loop for 10 years - same teacher for the same subject.

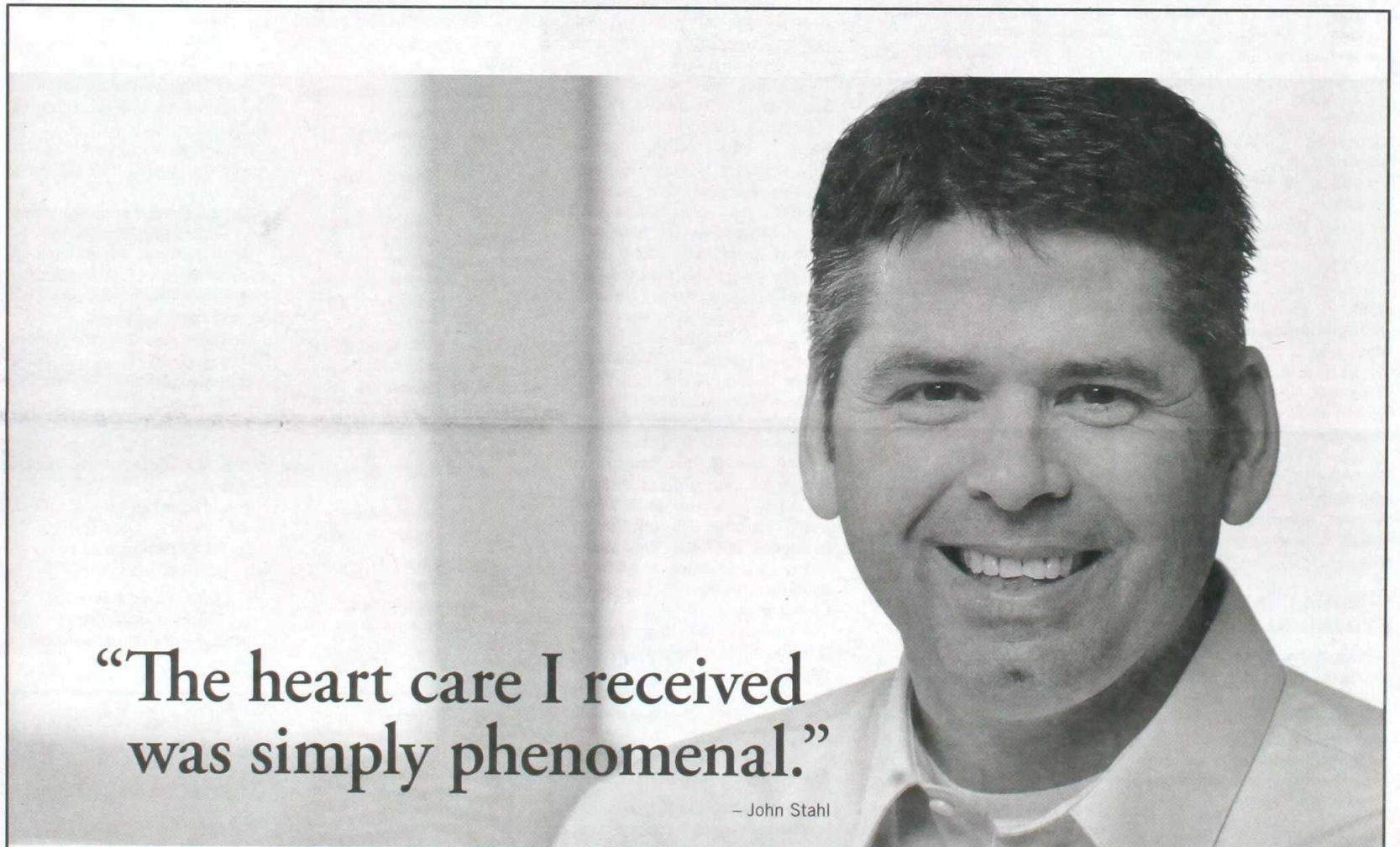
In Kewaskum, as a result of the new teaching strategy, teachers have been moved. The eighth grade hallway no longer exists. Teachers have been placed in pods by subject matter, allowing them to talk and learn from each other during down time like hall duty, Horbas said.

They will be stronger teachers because they are able to specialize, she said.

In addition, the middle school is implementing the district's sustained silent writing program, a takeoff of last year's sustained silent reading.

Students will write for 10 minutes in a composition book during their advisory periods. Teachers will provide some subject matter like a favorite movie seen over summer.

The idea is to strengthen students' writing skills "so it becomes more natural for them," Horbas said. "We're really trying to push in the Kewaskum district reading and writing."



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### Gun Safety....It is no accident



Armed with hearing protection and the safety rules of an experienced hunter and police officer, Taylor Ellis, 16, is ready to test her skills on the target range with a .357 magnum revolver Friday in northern Wisconsin.

"I've always expected everyone in my household to be familiar with firearms, because I like to hunt and there will be guns in my home, but also because I have several service handguns," said Scott Heitman, a hunting partner and Waukesha police officer with 27 years on the force. "I also want anyone in my family to know how to make a firearm safe if they do come across a gun anywhere."

As an enforcement officer, Heitman must pass mandatory qualifications firearms course requiring shooting a minimum of 720 handgun rounds annual. Range training with M16s, shotguns, and other service firearms is also mandatory.

During a trip August 19-22 to northern Wisconsin that also included kayaking secluded rivers and backwa-

ters and bear baiting, three sets of moms and dads piped into Heitman's expertise to introduce our 16-year old daughters to proper handgun use. Charlie and Val Koch and their daughter Mackenzie, Heitman, his wife, Robin and their daughter Savannah, and Lori, Taylor and I shot Heitman's 9mm semiautomatic, Robin Heitman's .357 magnum revolver, and the 9mm semiautomatic handgun that had admittedly remained in its case since I purchased it, romantic that I am, for Lori's present at Christmas in 2005.

Heitman's unofficial "students" watched as he and Charlie Koch set targets at 20 yards on private property with a steep ridge as a backdrop and listened as the avid Wisconsin outdoorsman with family hunting property in Adams-Friendship delivered

primary rules of firearm safety: we would always maintain muzzle control and point the barrel in a safe direction; we would keep our fingers off the

trigger until ready to fire; we would handle every gun as if it was loaded; and we would know our target and what was beyond.

With our daughters first taking turns with the semi-automatic 9mms allowing the shooter to fire one round with each pull of the trigger until a 15-round clip was empty, and then a 6-shot .357 revolver, we watched as their shooting proficiency increased with their comfort level. Our daughters previous firearms experience, in particular handgun experience, ranged from very moderate to none. Ear protection and individualized instruction helped that comfort level increase quickly over the hour-long session until hundreds of spent casings littered the ground in need of gathering and the targets were riddled with ammunition holes.

"No one should be afraid of a gun," Heitman said. "The more familiar you are with a firearm and the higher the comfort level, the more relaxed and safe you'll be. It's when you are not familiar with the gun that accidents happen."

Handgun rounds echoed across the northland as one by one young women and parents took turns challenging the targets with all three handguns. Another sound also rose into the air, in particular as the session carried on. The cheers of celebration as each of the youngest shooters began with more frequency to actually hit the plastic soda bottles and cardboard targets that they were aiming at. Like so many other activities that challenge us mentally or physically, success with a

firearm lays the foundation to build more confidence overall.

"There are some preconceived notions about guns that make people afraid," Heitman said. "Once people shoot guns and become familiar with how they work, it's fun and safe. My wife (Robin) is a very good shot with her .357 and it's because she was introduced to the right technique and developed good habits. Savannah, Taylor and Mack were hitting what they were aiming at after they understood what they were being taught. They were learning their site-picture and how to line up the sites. They were introduced to the basics and they had a great time. Now, it's a matter of shooting practice, while practicing the rules of safety."

Heitman recommends that any Wisconsin resident seeking to learn how to shoot or to properly introduce their children to firearms safety contact a local gun club or hunters safety course for assistance.
