Flight for Life responds to T. Scott crash



four people were injured Monday evening following a two-vehicle crash at the intersection of County Road D and state Highway 28/144 in the Town of Scott, just north of Boltonville. Batavia First Responders and Firefighters were joined by Random Lake Fire Department and EMS after the crash happened at 6:40 p.m. The above SUV driver collided with the minivan shown to the right that was carrying a mother and her three children. Scoring beast Boegel bests Falcons

Brad Boegel cracked a smirk that widened into a colossal, teeth-showing smile when asked about his offense against the Falcons on Dec. 21.

"We all played pretty good," he said.

Well, yes, the Indians looked good in their 63-54 victory on the road. Kewaskum's defense held toptier conference player Nick Roelse to nine points and the Indians used their newfound sixth man, the free throw line, to again salt the game away.

Boegel just looked better than everyone else on the court. The junior forward scored 32 points, nearly all of them at point-blank range.

It wasn't that Boegel was a ball hog; his teammates kept passing him ball. the Falcons used a trapping defense that left Boegel one-on-one down low. Whether it was an easy layup or difficult reverse, Boegel kept pouring in the points, 16 in each half.

"That's a game," said Coach Quinn Heintz of Boegel's performance, "and a lot of credit to his teammates for getting him the ball."

"Whenever they came to my side posted up," Boegel said. "If I get the ball, I get the ball."

Down 38-37 entering the fourth quarter, the teams exchanged leads a couple of times before Boegel hit a shot inside to give the Indians a 45-43 lead with 5:34 to play, his third bucket rebounding of sophomore Hunter of the quarter.

From there, the Indians never let

Guard Tony Gonring off the bench and starting forward Lucas Kopeschka each followed with three-pointers and Kewaskum went up 51-43 with 4:04 to play, busting open what always had been a tight game.

In the meantime, the Falcons were missing a handful of shots and not getting second chances as the Indians' rebounding did a 180 from a lousy performance in Waupun the game before. The Falcons also went 0-for-5 at the free throw line to start the quarter.

The Falcons battled back to 51-48 before point guard Eric Perkins, scoreless through three quarters, went on a free-throw binge. The junior hit six in a row on three straight possessions and was 8-for-8 in the quarter.

As a team, Kewaskum was 10-14 from the line in the final eight minutes and 15-for-20 in the game. The Falcons went 3-for-10 in the quarter and 6-for-20 in the game.

Heintz praised the defense of Gonring and Kopeschka on Roelse, a first-team all-conference senior who Heintz said

had averaged 21 points and 10 boards per game. He calls him the toughest man to guard in conference.

Almost lost in the story was the Flanders, who had struggled against Waupun. The athletic, 6-foot-4 lanky beast pulled down six defensive rebounds in the fourth quarter alone.

The Falcons had taken a 25-22 lead into halftime on the strength of four second-quarter three-pointers. They began the third quarter on a 6-0 run to go up 31-22. Kewaskum called timeout and Heintz said he told his players not to let the run faze them.

The Indians responded and began to chip away at the lead before the fourth quarter charge when they outscored the Falcons, 26-16.

Kewaskum moved to 5-2 on the season, 3-1 in conference, already their most conference wins since 2007 and the season hasn't even hit January.

Falls went to 2-5 and 0-4. Winning a game like that moves the program another step forward.

The Indians were scheduled to play in a tournament in Hustisford on Tuesday and Wednesday before hosting a conference favorite Kiel on Jan. 6.

Assemblyman proposes bill to repeal mascot law

While the Kewaskum School District is in the process of forming a committee to oversee actions the district is taking to maintain their beloved Indians mascot, a Whitewater Republican is reported to be working on a bill to undo the new state law aimed at eliminating Indian mascots and other race-based team names and logos in Wisconsin public schools.

According to The Wisconsin State Journal, Assemblyman Steve Nass, R-Whitewater, has drafted legislation to repeal the law, which allows any school district resident to file a complaint with the local school board over the use of offensive nicknames, logos or mascots. The state school superintendent can then order districts to stop using such symbols if they promote discrimination, harassment or stereotyping.

The bill also aims to void all orders issued by State Superintendent Tony Evers under the new law, which was signed by Gov. Jim Doyle in May.

While Kewaskum has not yet received a complaint, the district has taken steps to "fly under the radar," according to a November statement by District Superintendent Mike Krumm. One such action was the removal of a depiction of an Indian Chief in the High School field house that was not well received by the community.


Board of Education President, John Kenworthy agreed to form a committee of concerned residents and board members to assist the district in maintaining the use of the Indian mascot and to research the heritage of Chief Kewaskum so the district may correctly honor the village's namesake. That committee is set to meet in the new year.

So far, the state Department of Public Instruction has ordered the Osseo-Fairchild School District to stop using its Chieftans logo. The Kewaunee School District volunteered to drop its Indian name and logo. Most recently, Mukwonago High School was ordered to drop its team name — the Indians — and its logo, a man wearing a feather headdress.

Kewaskum's State Senator Glenn Grothman (R-West Bend) was reviewing the proposal from Nass.


In addition to his wife and parents, Allen was preceded in death by a brother, James.



The state could still use it as a park and yet furnish protection to the graves."

Day, together with three others had a narrow escape from serious injury if not death, when their auto went into a ditch and tipped over. Ben Day and son Ben, John and Francis Day, children of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Day of West Bend, were in the car. The damage done was a broken windshield and the top being slightly broken. Mr. Day states that this was the worst accident that ever happened to him.

Bentz leads Indians to seventh in Loy test

FOND DU LAC- With all five seniors placing and one of them, Brad Bentz, winning a title, Kewaskum's wrestling team placed seventh out of 25 teams in the rugged Marty Loy Invitational Saturday, Dec. 18.

The battle for the championship went right down to the wire, with Wausau West eventually beating out Muskego, 235 points to 225.

Port Washington, which had a pair of champions, placed third at 174, followed by Burlington and Sauk Prairie, rounding out the top five at 154 and 144.

The Indians earned 128.5 points and did so with just 12 athletes as they still forfeit at 103 pounds and was missing another, who was ill.

For Bentz, who dominated all four of his opponents at 160 pounds, the title was his second in as many years and the third time he has placed in the event.

"Brad really had a nice tournament. He really rolled through the day without a close match," KHS coach Dennis Aupperle said. "He really did great job."

In his first match, he pinned Ryan McCartney of Westfield in a mere :37, and followed that up with a pin over Austin Cornelis of Wrightstown in 3:08.

In the semifinals, Bentz posted an 8-3 decision over Austin Nottestad of Westby, putting him in the finals against Hudson's Nick Larson. While he didn't get a pin, Bentz rolled to a 10-4 victory, his 12th in a row for the season.

Bo Seibel suffered his first loss of the year at 189 pounds, a controversial 3-2 decision to Fond du Lac's Justin Birschbach in the semifinals, but he bounced back to take third place.

Birschbach managed a takedown with :12 left in the first period, then he protected that lead the rest of the way.

Seibel (11-1) escaped in the second period and continued stalking Birschbach in an effort to get a takedown but to no avail. The Fondy athlete was warned for stalling near the end of the period and didn't do a whole lot in the third, when Seibel finally let him go, thinking he had a better chance at a takedown than getting a nearfall.

With: 14 remaining, the official awarded Seibel a penalty point for Birschbach's stalling but that is where the scoring ended.

"Bo had a tough one in the semis but bounded back to take third," Aupperle said, referring to Seibel's 6-2 decision over Zac Verbunke of Burlington in the battle for

third and fourth.

Rob Maertz, another of the Indians' veterans, had an interesting day, falling behind Mosinee's Patrick Bauer 2-0 in the early going of the opening round and then suffering an ankle injury. After a time out, Maertz rallied for a 6-2 win, with an escape and takedown in Period 2 and a cradle nearfall in the third.

Maertz, now 8-4, came back with a little more comfortable 5-2 decision in sec-

ond round, then in the semis, he drew Alex Dieringer of Port Washington, a two-time state champion who just signed a letter of intent to wrestle for Oklahoma State.

Maertz lasted 3:02 with Dieringer before getting pinned, and in the consolation finals, he lost to Jackson Fox of Wrightstown.

Sophomore Brett Scoles (8-4) also placed fourth. He is wrestling at 125 this season. In his first two matches,

Scoles had a 2:35 pin and an 8-3 win, but then he drew Jus. tin Schirkenback of Muskego, a junior and the top seed.

Schirkenback dominated, piling up nearfalls for a 17-2 tech fall.

And senior Jared Koffke placed fifth at 130, his only loss a tough one in overtime against Thomas Hettinga of Wausau, a match which he led 6-5 with seconds remaining. The official called a clasp on Koffke, who went on to get pinned in the extra period.

Koffke (10-3) started off with a pin, and in the wrestledback won by default, by an 8-2 margin, by 13-2 and then 3-0 over Logan Ballering of Oconomowoc in his final match.


Two others, sophomore Logan Dreher (5-3) took seventh at 119 and senior Cole Roberts, placed eighth 215.

Dreher finished at 3-2, with a forfeit win in the match for seventh and eighth. His most exciting match came in the second round when he was behind 7-4 against Port's Robbie Anheir, then came flaying back to pin him in 3:09.

Roberts' two wins came via pin and decision.

"Austin (Goeden) and Joey (Seitz) were one match away from placing, and Derek (Aupperle) injury defaulted (after the first match). His ankle is a little swollen," the coach said, praising junior Brandon Ehn, who lost his first match, then won by pin, 10-0 decision, pin and pin to take the consolation title at 275. "He is improving in every match."
