

Campbellsport Baseball Continues Their Winning Ways with Four Wins

On May 8, Campbellsport baseball beat Mayville 4-2 at home after the game was rescheduled due to rain on May 7.

Mayville (8-12, 3-9) scored two runs in the first inning to take a 2-0 lead over Campbellsport.

Brody Nolan got the Cougars on the board with a RBI base hit to tie up the game in the third inning

Campbellsport (14-6, 8-4) got the biggest hit when Tyler Sachen hit a three-run home run to put the Cougars ahead 4-2 over the Cardinals.

"Tyler provided a huge boost with his home run blast to left center," said Head Coach Jim Krug

Riley Kohlmann finished off the 4-2 victory on the mound with a complete game performance with six strikeouts.

"Riley cruised to a complete game victory win after getting the 4-2 lead from his teammates," said Krug.

At Mayville

On May 9, Campbellsport baseball beat May-

ville 5-4 on the road in the conference matchup.

Campbellsport got a RBI double from Tyler Sachen in the second inning and RBI single from Sachen in the fourth inning to give the Cougars 2-0 lead.

The Cougars added a run in the fifth for 3-0 lead before the Cardinals responded with two runs to make the score 3-2.

Campbellsport tacked on two more runs in the sixth inning for 5-2 lead over Mayville.

The Cougars were able to hold off the rival Cardinals the rest of the way for a 5-4 victory.

"Two great high school games against Mayville with credit to both teams with great pitching, good defense, and just enough offense," said Head Coach Jim Krug. "We have played so many games this year, and I think it gave our guys the edge against Mayville."


Tyler Stray got the call from the bullpen and went 1-2-3 getting a strikeout and a pair of ground outs to finish the game.



Thrifty Travel Tips

Summer vacation time is rapidly approaching, and many are thinking about where to go to get away from it all. Unfortunately, travel can be expensive, but if you want to save some money and be a thrifty traveler, this column is for you!

My first tip is, if at all possible, don't travel between the second week in June through the third week in August. Why? Because everyone with children is trying to vacation during those times. If you can, schedule your vacation for as soon as the kids get out of school or the very last week before school starts, and you'll find less expensive flights and hotels. Those without kids in school can save even more by traveling off season. For example, a trip to Yellowstone National Park in either May or September will be less expensive and less crowded than during the summer. However, when traveling during the off season, some services might not be available and you need to keep an eye on the weather.

If you are flying on vacation, the least expensive days to fly are usually Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays, so if you can arrange your travel time around those dates, you'll save some money. According to travel industry experts, the best time to book a flight is 21-112 days before departure. If you have a good credit rating, applying for a credit card that gives you travel miles can be an easy way to score an inexpensive va-

cation. Delta airlines offers a credit card with bonus points ranging from 40,000-70,000 points, which is the equivalent of \$400-\$700, after charging \$2,000 on the card. This card has no fee for the first year and then an annual fee of \$150. Each spring, Southwest airlines offers an even better deal for frequent travelers. A new card holder, after spending \$4,000, can earn a companion pass, which means for an entire year, you can bring along a designated companion for free. There is an annual fee of \$65.00.

Pack lightly and save on luggage fees. Most airlines charge extra for checked luggage and some even charge for carry-ons. These costs can quickly add up, so when comparing total airfare prices, take that into account. Southwest allows two free checked bags, one carry-on and one personal bag per person. Spirit and Frontier charge around \$40 for a carry-on and between \$55-\$99 for checked baggage, depending on the route.

When selecting a flight, consider more than just the cost of the seat. Comfort is important, especially if it is a longer flight. Budget airlines like Spirit have notoriously uncomfortable seats and only 28 inches of leg room in comparison to Southwest, Delta and American who have more comfortable padding and 31-32 inches of leg room. Also, pay attention to layover times. Unless your idea of fun is running through an airport, drag-

While researching the one room school houses, there were many teachers who came in to perspective. One was May Braun, whose story sheds some light on the options for young women in the 1920s. It also filled in gaps with the history of Fond du Lac Normal School, and provided context for salary of our rural teachers.

The Braun-Koenig Farm

May descended from John and Annie Lynch Braun. The Lynch family lived over by K but in the town of Eden. They were Irish. Today they would be north of Hundertmarks, but south of the Murphy farm. The old Lynch farm had a long driveway, way back running east/west.

Mary "May" Braun was born March 27, 1905 in the Town of Eden. She grew up on the farm between Eagle Road and County W, but on the south side of F. May Braun graduated from high school in the spring of 1923, then went to Normal School for a one year education in the 1923-1924 school year. May's daughter Elaine documented that the County Rural Normal School was held at a room in the Fond du Lac County Courthouse. The certification took only a year in those days. Understand obituaries typically call this post high school education the Normal School, but May's family typically referenced it as a "rural normal school," as the education provided really was for those one room school districts out in the countryside.

May married Joseph Koenig at St. Mary's Catholic Church in Eden on Sept. 15, 1931, and they had two children, Elaine and Mark. Mark married Anne Koenig, the source for this story. Joseph and May farmed until their retirement in 1960. Anne married Mark in October of 1957, and lived in a mobile home on the farm with Joseph and May. "But that didn't last very long." However, all of 1958 to 1960 was in the farmhouse with Mark's parents until they moved to Fond du Lac.

"In March of 1960, we had two little girls, and when I announced I was pregnant again," Anne laughed, "They were gone. They found a home in town — quite quickly." It wasn't that Anne had to ask the in-laws? "Nooooo," she continued to laugh, clearly pointing out that May was ready to leave the farmstead for a quieter house. "I mean, I just remember coming in, and saying, 'You know? I think I'm pregnant.' — And unbeknownst to me, they found this place in Fond du Lac."

Dan McCarty's (1893-1964) daughter Geraldine (1917-2010) married Irving Gauthier (1920-2006), who worked as a Fond du Lac County cop. They had a home for sale on 13th S treet in Fond du Lac and because it was right across the street from Elizabeth Waters School, it couldn't have worked any better. It was just a very unique chain of events, where Geraldine's dad lived close to the

old Lynch farm in Eden, so the timing and place of the house deal couldn't have been more perfect.

Describing May

Anne said, "May wasn't as big a lady as Magdeline Braun, but she was very big on love." Magdeline is the powerful matriarch on the Braun side who settled the family in Eden in the 1850s. She had a very big frame, and was known for her strenuous work establishing the Braun homestead. Anne said, "One way to describe May was love – to her husband, her children, me and her grandchildren. She went so far above and beyond what it would have called for." May filled more than obligatory roles as a matriarch in the family.

Then when May and Joseph moved away to Fond du Lac, she was a babysitter for all the neighbors who would call upon May for help. May babysat for at least a decade, and continued to watch children. They lived right across from Elizabeth Waters School and got to see the kids coming and going to school.

When asked for other examples to describe May, Anne said, "She really loved Christmas." She was also a great cook. And as an in-law, Anne was fortunate to take her family to May and Joe's house in Fond du Lac, where May cooked a huge spread on a Sunday. "They would make this big dinner for us — I mean, that's eight people, when we had our six kids." May loved to cook, and she really loved her brothers and sisters. "I think that was a little Irishy," Anne said, bringing it back to the Lynch's from who May descended from. Another example of May's focus on the family was Annie Braun at the end of her life, when she chose to stay with May. "They were like two peas in a pod - Annie and May." Before she married, Anne got to meet Annie Lynch Braun, who May welcomed in to take care of her aging mother.

John Braun and Education

John Braun was May's father, who married Annie Lynch and farmed on the land Anne Koenig is on today. John and Annie had six children – Oscar, Francis, May (Koenig, of this piece), Gert (McCarty), Loretta (Sterr) and Jerome. May's daughter Elaine's book shed some context on education within the family. It was a struggle to find where exactly Fond du Lac Normal School was,

and Elaine Koenig's work was the first source I found that indicated the school was actually in the courthouse. Elaine's book *Family Stories* also elaborated on her mother's career options in the 1920s. "May felt at the time that the only choices (fields) open to her were nursing and teaching. She thought she couldn't be a nurse, so teaching was the best choice for her," (p.63). John Braun helped his boys by getting them started in farming, so he thought he would give his girls some independence through education. Elaine said May thought her mom probably favored May getting an education, "but it would have been Pa's decision." Still, Fond du Lac Normal School serves a significant role in elevating women in the 1920s.

Third, May's father allowed the Normal School to last longer in Fond du Lac County. Elaine wrote that in 1926, after May was finished with her Normal School, John had a role in an important education decision for the county. John chaired the Town of Eden board, but in that year was in the midst of a two-year term on the County Board. The issue at the time was whether to add an addition on the courthouse to house the Normal School. "John favored the addition because he wanted the area girls to be able to obtain teacher training without having to go outside the community. Some of the other men [on the board] felt the girls could go to Oshkosh or Milwaukee for teacher training. When the vote was taken the President of the County Board, Dr. Hardgrove who was a good friend of John's, began calling the names alphabetically.....John Braun cast the first 'aye vote, and then other men began voting 'aye." (p.64). However, John only served two years because he had a lot of work to do with farming and he did not like driving at night—"But during his time on the County Board, John Braun had cast an important vote for education," (p. 64).

Without this vote, it would have been interesting what the 1930s options for local teaching pros-

pects would have been. For example, Leo Murphy attended Fond du Lac Normal School after this Braun vote. Had it not been for John Braun, someone like Mr. Murphy might have had to attend someplace like Oshkosh.

A Comparable Price

It is hard sometimes to compare different eras to validate if in fact someone was over or underpaid. However, there is one story that is helpful when judging the compensation of Leo Murphy as a one room school house teacher. When Mr. Murphy's story was shared, it was quite evident to Carol Murphy that Leo loved to teach, but could not make a living to which he could raise a family on

Luckily, Elaine Koenig wrote about one room school house teachers in her 1992 book, *Family Stories*.

This included a story of Elaine's mother Mary "May" Braun Koenig. "One year when May went to the Teacher's Convention in Milwaukee she saw a raccoon coat in the store window. Probably Eileen [Elaine likely meant Eileen Meade, who was the teacher mentioned on the same page] was with her. She thought it was a nice coat and went in and tried it on. She liked the coat and even though it cost \$300, May bought it. She enjoyed wearing the coat and was happy when Frank Smith told her, "That's the cutest fur coat I ever saw." Elaine concluded, "In later years she thought perhaps she shouldn't have spent so much on the coat as she was making just \$100 a month at the time," (p.65).

May Braun started teaching in the fall of 1924 at Homiston School west of Fond du Lac, at age 19. According to Ruth Shaw Worthing's book, *The History of Fond du Lac County AS TOLD BY ITS PLACE-NAMES*, (p.113), Homiston was in Section 29, basically between the City of Fond du Lac and village of Oakfield, but closer to Fond du Lac. May's raccoon coat story is likely in the mid-to late-1920s, and before the 1929 economic crash.

More importantly, her story provides a price point. The CPI Calculator from the Department of Labor and Statistic argues \$100 in 1924 is similar value to about \$1.800 in 2023. If we assume a

teacher made \$1,200 a year in 1924, it would be the around \$21,000 annually in modern day, which is substantially lower than the new starting pay of Wisconsin public school teachers. In that math, one can see why Leo Murphy couldn't raise a family off a teacher's salary.

Besides adjusting for the price, a second question is whether teachers were paid 12 months out of the year. Most one-room school houses were done by the month of May, and prepping was necessary starting sometime in August. However, with teachers switching districts in the 1920s and 1930s, it seems likely that teachers were paid during the year, and not pro-rated throughout the calendar year.

Another question was the status of the coat? Anne Koenig married May's son Mark. Did she ever find May's coat? She laughed, "I never did. I heard about it. And I just wonder where it ever was." Thankfully Anne has preserved the picture illustrating how proud May was to have it at the time.



Election Integrity Resolution Passes

County Clerk Outlined \$150,000 Election Integrity Plan

Josh Schoemann, Washington County executive, praised the County Board's approval of an Election Integrity resolution to be implemented ahead of the November 2024 General Election.

Schoemann said, "I commend [Washington] County Clerk Ashley Reichert for bringing these bold and innovative initiatives forward and thank the County Board for unanimously supporting this Election Integrity package. Residents of Washington County expect elections to be run fairly and these initiatives address concerns that have emerged in recent elections. Our goal is to bolster public confidence in the process. I'm proud that we are the first county to fund additional election integrity measures for November's crucial election. I look forward to local municipalities cooperating to effectuate these initiatives and encourage other counties to follow suit."

Reichert said, "These measures can significantly reinforce the electoral process's integrity and assist in enhancing public confidence in our democratic system." She outlined the elections initiatives to provide \$150,000 in county funding to local municipalities, noting that compensating the municipalities at 150% of actual costs will offset funds needed for additional poll workers, election inspectors, and additional hours for the clerks:

- Provide enhanced in-person absentee hours on a voluntary basis, that will allow our communities to provide extended voting hours currently only available to larger cities.
- Election audits on the night of the election (voluntary municipal participation).
 - · County-wide election audit.
- Discontinue Central Count through buying back machines previously bought by some municipalities and return to the standard precinct-based process, upon municipal approval. This will allow for the count of absentee ballots at polling locations rather than transfer to another location.
- Replace cloth voting machine cases with hard cases to better protect the expensive equipment.





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
AN OUTDOORSMAN'S JOURNAL

Thirty-Five Years an Outdoor Writer

If you think that life doesn't go by in a blink of an eye, I am about to show why I feel it does. Thirty-five years ago, this Friday night, I wrote my first column. I was living in the Canadian bush and called my column "North of the Border", and it was about living in fly-in only locations as a camp manager for Chimo Lodge and Outposts and working for a man that is like a father to me, Pete Hagedorn. I was 27. Now, I am 62 and still feel like I am 27.

I wrote for Richard and Molly Emerson, and when I say "wrote", I mean it; I hand wrote this column from '89 until '97 and the process never failed. Eventually, my days in the Canadian bush "kind of" came to an end, and I named my column "An Outdoorsman's Journal", as before I was in the newspaper business, I kept a journal on many

of my outings.


In '92, I self-syndicated and that is when crazy became real crazy. Some examples would be, I was not just going to write about shooting and catching, so in the winter I became a hardcore winter camper. My first trek back in '93 was 135 miles on The North Country Trail. Pure insanity and a sharp learning curve would best describe my first winter adventure or should I say "I had no clue." I spent 17 days in the Penokee Mountains lived off food stashes, did not have a tent and taught my golden retrievers, Ben and Star, to pull sleds. Those were the days of cold winters and deep snow, I loved that trip and have done it four

My education basically ended at third grade when I fell in love with looking out the window at school. Back in the day, the newspaper industry was king, and my lack of education never slowed me down as I personally got to know my contact at every paper I wrote for and what I wrote about was so unusual, as was my writing style, that it helped sell newspapers. By '95 I was in 12 papers and making \$150.00 a week. In my younger days, I was a steel fabricator and always had money. I always had a simple rule: if I can't pay for my beer, I shouldn't drink it.

Back in '94 I met a very wise man who had been a career game warden out of Solon Springs. Tony told me that I should hike, paddle, and ski around the entire state. Thus began the first of many trips and it was to hike on the ice-the entire Wisconsin shoreline of Lake Superior. I spent 17 nights doing this and used 35 of my 100 lives jumping open water while pulling a sled.

To date, all of Wisconsin is behind me but the southern border.

What was really cool is that I taught my golden

retriever, Star, to do the same, crazy things. Star would do this after me as I was the official ice tester and Star always had Pearl in her sled.

I became a stepfather to Joey, Travis, and Kevin Dushek in the mid to late '90s and the father to Selina in 2001, and this was a ride that was so crazy only the boys and Selina can validate it. We had like zero money, their mom was a stay-at-home mom, and we all loved that, but we lived on a writer's salary and that was very cool. Fear was not in our vocabulary and becoming very good at harvesting and existing in wet, cold conditions was the norm. One example, leave on Thursday night for Lake Waubay in South Dakota, back when it was always cold. Driving my Jeep Eagle with just as much stuff strapped to the rack as in the trailer. I was the only adult. Build a camp on the ice, stay until the following Sunday, "10 days", fish that day and then drive home and get home just in time to get the kids to school.

I hate to say it, but I am running out of space. The newspaper industry is very honor bound, I write for 60 papers. I might retire if I die or hit \$500,000.00 in my retirement.

This journey has been so incredible it is almost surreal. If I had the finances, I would not retire for a long time.

Fast forward 32 years, I have used 94 of my 100 lives. Long time readers know that. Do not cry for me if I croak on the job, it has been a good run!














Cale Heinonen celebrates after hitting a double.

ging your carry-on luggage behind you, make sure you have at least one hour of layover time. In some of the larger airports, it can take over 45 minutes to get from one terminal to another. While some of the larger airlines have designated terminals and gates that are clustered together, others use multiple terminals.

For ease of getting through TSA (Transportation Security Administration), wear easy to remove and replace shoes, no belts and have liquids/gels in a quart size bag with containers no more than 3.5 ounces each. TSA's definition of a liquid or gel can be a little wonky. For example, peanut butter and cheese spread are both banned if more than 3.5 oz. If you travel frequently, or just don't like being caught in long TSA lines, you can sign up for TSA precheck which costs \$78 for five years. With TSA precheck, you have a designated, faster security check point, and you don't need to remove your shoes, belts, light jackets, liquids or laptop.

Bring a reusable, empty water bottle to the airport. Once you are through TSA, fill it with water to sip while waiting for your flight and while on board. High altitudes are very drying, and it's important for you to stay hydrated to avoid headaches and blood clots. Some areas have strange tasting water, so bringing along some flavor packets would be a good idea. It's also a good idea to bring along your own snacks or even a meal to eat while waiting for your flight. Food purchased at the airport is usually more expensive and choices may be limited.

When packing your suitcase, consider using storage cubes, especially if you aren't staying in one location. You can place one day's clothing per cube and then instead of having to totally unpack or rummage through your case, you can just remove one cube per day.

If travelling where it is cold, rather than bringing heavy, winter clothes, consider packing layers which you can add or delete according to the weather. Many hotels and other lodging have washing machines and dryers available, or you can always hand wash clothes, which cuts down on how much you need to pack.

With short turnover times, most airlines do not clean the planes between flights. To help keep you healthy, bring along a disposable cleaning wipe to clean off your seat arm rests, seat belt, table and vent/light knobs before take-off.

While vacations are fun, planning can be stressful. Knowing what to expect and how to find the best deals can make it less of a chore. Next time, we'll look at ways of saving on lodging and rental cars. Until then, happy and safe travels!




