City of West Bend and Village of Kewaskum Agree to Pursue Consolidation of Emergency Medical Services

Implementation Planned for January 1, 2025

The Village of Kewaskum Board and City of West Bend Common Council approved a Memorandum of Understanding to pursue the consolidation of Emergency Medical Services (EMS) between the Kewaskum Fire Department and West Bend Fire Department, with a target date for implementation of January 1, 2025.

Throughout Wisconsin, EMS providers are facing a crisis due to a shortage of volunteer and paid personnel, insufficient financial resources, and increasing demands for services. This crisis is resulting in critical stress on local EMS providers. Recognizing the paramount importance of efficient, timely, and high-quality emergency medical care, the Village of Kewaskum and City of West Bend agree that the consolidation presents a strategic opportunity to enhance the effectiveness and sustainability of EMS in our jurisdictions.

"We are confident that we can create a more robust, integrated, and responsive emergency medical system that prioritizes the well-being and safety of all community members," said West Bend Mayor Joel Ongert. "We are committed to engaging in collaborative discussions, consulting with stakeholders, and working closely with relevant authorities to develop and implement a comprehensive plan for the consolidation of EMS."

The consolidation will allow the departments to share resources, standardize protocols and practices, and leverage economies of scale, thereby maximizing the efficiency and effectiveness of resource allocation in emergency medical response. This model will build a more sustainable emergency response system capable of effectively managing diverse and evolving challenges, including staffing concerns, natural disasters, public health emergencies, and other crises.

"Like many communities, Kewaskum is suffering from a severe shortage of volunteer emergency medical technicians. This collaboration will allow our departments [to] optimize resources while increasing levels of care and helping keep our residents safe," said Village Board President Fuzz Martin. "We are grateful to all of





Rate Increases

Dear Reader,

The United States Postal Service recently announced another 10% increase in their rates effective July 14, 2024.

Since 2021, there have been five previous rate increases; this is the sixth. This announcement coincides with severe deterioration in the USPS's performance; simply put, the mail is often late. These rate increases affect individuals sending mail as well as newspapers delivering the news. The rate increases have



Consider the following:

First Class Mail Stamps

24 percent increase since 2022; another 7.8 percent increase scheduled for July 14, 2024.

Periodical Mail (Paid Newspapers)

Periodical postage increase for July 2024 will be about 5-7 percent increase since January 2024.

EDDM (Free Newspapers)

11 percent increase for community newspapers; the rate increase means newspapers are paying about

33 percent more for postage than three years ago.

Many newspapers rely on the mail to deliver local news to big, medium-sized and small communities alike. We depend on the Post Office and need it to succeed, but not at the cost of our ability to continue serving our readers.

For easy reference, following is contact information for your Senate and Congressional representatives, as well as State Senate and Assembly members.



Is it any wonder then, we slide a smile into place, say we're okay but really aren't? It's called masking. We outwardly appear fully functional.

There are exceptions of course. Last year a fellow I'd ridden on the bus to school with confessed he had schizophrenia. Sadly, the chances to talk openly about our health, be fully understood, are still too few and far between.



Yellowstone Trail Day Scheduled for Saturday, June 1

The Byron Historical Society, along with historical societies at Lomira, Theresa and Slinger, is hosting a Yellowstone Trail Day on Saturday, June 1, from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. The event is open to travelers journeying on the historic Yellowstone Trail route from Slinger to Byron with stops at each historical society.

The Yellowstone Trail was an important automobile route begun in 1912 spanning Boston to Seattle and directing early automobile tourists to yellowstone Park. Many businesses catering to the influx of automobile tourists duirng the 1920s sprung up along the trail.

This day on the road, for adventurers with vehicles old or new, is designed as a hop-on, hop-off event. Visitors can begin their journey at any of the historical societies for free Yellowstone Trail tour guides to landmarks along the route. Historical exhibits from this bygone era of road travel will also be featured. Event locations are Byron Town Hall, located

at N3097 Hwy 175 in Byron; Silver Leaf School at Sterr Park, Pleasant Hill Ave. in Lomira; Solomon Juneau House, 201 S. Milwaukee St. in Theresa; and Slinger Historical Museum, 414 Kettle Moraine Drive South in Slinger.

Currently known as Hwy 175, the Yellowstone Trail dates back to 1912, with the promotion of a route from Boston to Seattle for early automobile tourists to travel cross country

to Yellowstone National Park. The road was marked along the way with yellow stones to guide travelers. Known as "A Good Road from Plymouth Rock to Puget Sound," the route through Byron was completed in 1915.

After June 1, 2024, hard copy records will be destroyed

The Washington County Natural Resources Department has completed the transfer of its public permit records to electronic format pursuant to Section 4.33 of the Washington County Code. Residents can now find copies of permits online.

This includes all permit applications and associated plans related to the County's Shoreland, Wetland and Floodplain Ordinance including Shoreland Zoning/Rezoning, Administrative Permits, Conditional Use Permits and Board of Adjustment Hearings/Variances and Erosion Control Permits for all unincorporated areas of Washington County (including some parcels that are now annexed to a Village or City) from 1969 to current and in perpetuity as they are scanned and plan to be destroyed.

After June 1, 2024, hard copy records will be destroyed. Any resident interested in obtaining the original hard copy permit files for their property can pick them up during business hours by visiting 333 E. Washington St. or by emailing *landres@washcowisco.gov* through June 1. An appointment or email is appreciated so that the files can be located and prepared for pickup.

As part of the consolidation, both organizations intend to commit to work collaboratively on EMS oversight, standard practices and training, and EMS system evaluation and improvement.

With Memorial Day weekend so close, I am sure you have thoughts of summer break and summer plans. For me, I hope to spend as much time at our camper house enjoying the outdoors. We will have the grandkids some of those times and I look forward to days of swimming, fishing, playing, and reading with them. If you have been a follower of my column, you may perceive this is a lead-in to my annual writing about summer slide.

Summer slide is quite an old trend, dating back more than 100 years. This is when school-aged children are said to have lost some of the learning and skills they gained during the school year. It has been previously noted that during the sum-

mer months, students are at risk of losing twothree months of reading and math skills if they are not engaged in learning activities. Some studies have shown that it is more prevalent among those in lower-income households.

However, more recent studies have mixed results. Some have shown no loss during the summer while other research provides information that kids forget much of what they've learned, up to three months' worth, during the summer. When the studies point to summer slide, both reading and math are affected, with a surprisingly larger amount of loss in math skills. So, is summer slide real? Most teachers say it is, especially when they spend weeks reintroducing skills taught before summer break. As a former teacher and parent, I do believe there is an increased learning deficit if children are not engaged in educational activities for a few months. School may stop over the summer but learning never should.

What can you do to help your child retain the skills learned throughout the year? Visiting the library is one way. Libraries are critical in preventing summer slide. Summer learning programs are

offered at libraries and provide motivation to keep vour students' educational skills refined. Is there a better season in which to foster lifelong learning and the love of reading? I used to "hold school" in the summer with my kids and their neighbor friends. Much of it included story time and quiet reading time with books checked out from our library.

Besides reading, there are other ways to advance your child's literacy and critical thinking. My daughter who is a teacher, calls it providing experiences. Whether you are touring outside of the state or just in your own backyard, the goal is to learn about new things, which in turn assists in critical thinking skills. Besides the reading incentive program we will offer this summer, look for your kids to earn challenge badges for activities through our summer learning platform.

Next week, I will discuss what will be included in our 2024 program which has a goal of increasing literacy and learning. So, whether or not you consider summer slide real, there is real value in educational activities during children's summer breaks.

to honor those who have helped make Columbus PARC the valuable asset it is today, from those involved back in 1986 to now.

The project is in the planning stages and fundraising will begin this summer. The goal is to break ground beginning in the fall.

Resolution 24-09 Honoring Columbus PARC Donators was approved by the board. A copy of the resolution was presented to Heisler, Campbellsport Athletic Association board member Kevin Soyk, and the CSVM kids following their presentation.

Board Matters:

• Representatives from MSA went over two proposals for facilities study of all village facilities. The first proposals purpose is to analyze the physical conditions and functionality of the village hall and police department, fire station, and public works building. That would cost around \$15,000 and be split between seven departments. The second proposal would be specifically focused on the the village hall and police department to address security issues and rethink the lobby and building as a whole. This proposal will cost \$9,500. A mo-

tion was approved to put the all village facilities study in the 2025 budget, which is being planned now. A second motion was approved to go forward with the village hall interior design proposal, as well.

- The MSA Clean Water Fund and Safe Drinking Water fund application contract was approved. Resolution 24-14 to reimburse for two funds was approved.
- Resolution 24-10 authorizing matching funds for the 2024 Community Development Block Grant was approved. The village needs to have the matching funds for Cherry and Martin Streets which totals to 20% of the entire project. The following resolution 24-11 authorizing MSA to submit an application for Cherry and Martin was approved. The cost to rebuild both is around three million dollars.
- The MSA construction observation agreement for Fireman's Park construction project was approved.
- A motion was passed five to two to review a document outlining the creation of a Public Safety Committee. Some members of the board felt more details were needed.
 - Resolution 24-13 detailing responsibility of a

Public Works Committee was approved.

- A Barton Road lift station change order, where a wall with footings will be added, was approved.
- Alfson Excavating was awarded the Ladwig, North Railroad and South Poplar Streets construction project upon recommendation from MSA. Their bid came in at \$2.4 million. The sewer lateral and sidewalk agreements for these streets was also approved. It will allow property owners to accept money from the village to pay for 50% up to \$3,000 for the laterals.
- Northeast Asphalt was awarded the 2024 resurfacing contract for Paul Avenue, Skyhawk Avenue and Court, and Redwing Court. The project came in at around \$341,000.
- The village has received \$508,000, \$158,000 from National Exchange Bank for the parks and \$350,000 from the local road improvement grant, in grant money, so far, this year.
- The police department is looking to hire a parttime officer, have not replaced the 2015 squad yet, and joined the narcan vendor program. The firehouse apron will be done after the fourth of July.
- Tom Dornbrook acknowledged National Police Week.


Volunteer firemen met at the village hall last Thursday for their monthly meeting and voted to back the Park Board on its summer playground program and other activity planned for the park.





On May 8, the Campbellsport Art Department celebrated their annual art show to share the achievements and the artwork of the Campbellsport Middle and High School students.





Big Trout/Trout Trip

Each May, I go trout fishing somewhere in Wisconsin. This week, I headed down to Columbia County to fish Rowan Creek. I grew up in Poynette and fished Rowan Creek hundreds of times as a kid, and I have to admit, those getaways were my escape from a drawn out divorce that my parents went through when I was a young boy. Instead of fishing the easy to get to waters. I chose to put my canoe in on the Wisconsin river and go to an area that is remote and to be perfectly honest, very dangerous to get to.

Sunday, May 12 High 73, Low 44

So, here is the plan, with my 8-year-old golden retriever, Ruby, as my partner, I was going to canoe through very challenging shallow water that will soon become wild rice, and if you get stuck, it seems like there is no bottom, as in muck. Then it is at least a mile up Rowan Creek, and the last mile of this journey is one deadfall after the other crossing the creek. The shoreline is all marsh, and I honestly feel that zero people fish here as it is simply too difficult and dangerous. My twohour trip was finalized with a decision, I will never do this again.

cluding one nine-day trip, and once I trout fished and caught a 19-inch brown trout. The wild rice is creating and trapping sediment and where I ice fished as a boy, it is no longer fishable. The hole I planned on fishing was choked with deadfalls, so I traveled further upstream and found an L-shaped hole that was maybe 40-yards long and deep. This


is where I would spend my next 24

As soon as I started to become comfortable, a powerful storm smacked the heck out of Ruby and I, and I pulled a tarp over us and weathered it out. About 4:00, I became serious as far as catching trout and went with my usual small gold hook, a current appropriate split shot and a half a crawler.

For two hours nothing happened. but I knew I had to be patient. Good luck came my way when something big hit the crawler and fought like a bull in a China shop, using the current and its muscle, I landed what was a 17-inch brown trout, and as far as I was concerned the trip was a success.

Another two hours went by, I was in my glory watching ducks and geese, and one time a hen wood duck just about took my head off before it spotted me, and just like that, I had another big fish on.

Anyone that stream fishes for trout knows how insane it is keeping a big fish out of deadfalls and that was the case today, in what for me seemed quite rare, my second trout was ex-

actly 17-inches as well.

Day became night, I only had the two bites, I switched to minnows after dark and fished for two hours with no action. In what was a last night for a while that you could do this, I slept on a tarp on the ground. As soon as I laid down, it started raining. I covered up and made the best of it and had zero mosquito action.

Monday, May 13 High 77, Low 40

I was fishing by 4:30 and confident. By six, I had not had a bite. At 6:15, Moby Dick hit my crawler, and when I first saw Moby, I thought she was a carp. Then, I realized Moby was a sumo brown trout. My third and last bite of this trip turned out to be a 22-inch brown trout, the biggest of my life. I was careful on the handling and release, fished another six hours without anything significant happening, packed up and made the decision, possibly, I will return someday.

Wisconsin's WWII Lost Sons and Daughters Will Not Be Forgotten

A project to write a story about the lives of more than 8,300 Wisconsin WWII fallen service persons has been underway for the past two years. More than 1,500 stories have been successfully completed by 20-plus dedicated volunteers. Volunteers come from all walks of life and not only live in Wisconsin but other states as well. All are connected to Wisconsin in some way and are driven to make sure that Wisconsin's fallen heroes are remembered. You can help tell these stories. The stories will be posted on Fold3.com and can be accessed through a Find A Grave App so that anyone can read the stories of our Wisconsin WWII fallen heroes.

The project is part of a national non-profit organization called Stories Behind the Stars. SBTS was founded by Don Milne who started writing stories about the WWII fallen. Milne says, "The daily writings have always been fascinating and well worth the effort. It never got old to find another story about World War II fallen – as a group, they are a microcosm of the America of the mid-20th century. Highly representative of rural and blue-collar America, coming from large families, and usually with less than 12 years of education. They also reflected the vast, diverse melting pot that is America. Barely a few days went by without one of the fallen being an immigrant, a child of an immigrant, or a grandchild of immigrants. They came from dozens and dozens of countries to live the American Dream and tens of thousands from these immigrant families gave their lives for their adopted land."



Stories such as 2nd Lieutenant Julia Hermina Schmid Barnes, who was the valedictorian of her high school class in Plymouth in 1932, she went on to attain her nursing degree and served with the Army Nurse Corp. She was declared missing in action on March 4, 1945, when the plane on which she was a passenger crashed killing 27 on board including 15 Army nurses (www.fold3.com/memorial/657825954/barnes-julia-hermina-schmid-2lt/stories).

Or the story of Seaman First Class Earl Lloyd Merchant, a farm hand from Monroe County. He joined the Navy and was assigned on the USS Hancock. In April 1945 he was killed when a Japanese kamikaze pilot crashed the plane into the Hancock causing a bomb that the ship was carrying to explode killing 62 men and wounding 71 more (www. fold3.com/memorial/529998554/earl-l-merchant/stories).

Or Captain Benjamin Louis Salomon Jr. of the Milwaukee area who served with the Army Dental Corp. He was working in an aid station as a surgeon in Saipan in the Marianas Islands when it was overrun with Japanese soldiers. Captain Saloman jumped into action protecting the wounded American soldiers by engaging in hand-to-hand combat with the enemy. He fought his way to the outside of the tent where he took control of a machine gun and fought bravely until his life was taken. He was found draped over the machine gun with 98 dead enemy soldiers piled up in front of his position (www.fold3.com/memorial/664255511/salomon-benjamin-lewis-jr-cpt/stories).

These are just a sample of the thousands of brave Wisconsin sons and daughters who fought for our freedom in World War II. You'll be telling stories for those who never could.

Jean Cookle, Wisconsin WWII Fallen Project director, is asking for your help in joining the mission of writing all the Wisconsin WWII fallen stories. Those that gave the ultimate sacrifice in serving their Country deserve to be remembered, wouldn't you want your loved one to be remembered in such a way? 









Gov. Evers Signs Novelty Lighter Bill in Pittsville

Legislation was 16 years in the making

The family and the home are gone now, but the images of a tragic spring day in 2008 never did leave the memories of those in Pittsville who knew Mason Stasheck. That's why the events of April 5 were bittersweet for many who were in attendance, as Gov. Tony Evers signed a piece of legislation first mentioned just a handful of months after Mason's death

"We had a fatality fire earlier that year that was a classmate of the second graders in the fall," Pittsville Fire Chief Jerry Minor told us during our April 3 interview. "In October, my granddaughter came home and there was an article in the Weekly Reader that said, 'Lighters are not toys,' and she handed it to me and she said, 'Grandpa, you need to make a law,' and that's where it started."

Mason Stasheck was the younger brother of a classmate of Kaitlyn Potts, Minor's granddaughter who went to him with the idea of banning toy-like lighters, like the one that Mason used to set the fire that led to his death from smoke inhalation.

"I thought that it was crazy that there were toy lighters, so I went and I told my grandpa we needed to do something about it," said Kaitlyn Potts, now 23, after the bill had been signed.

Gov. Tony Evers signed the bill in the gymnasium at Pittsville Elementary School where Mason was just getting a start on his education.

"It was definitely a tragedy in the community," said elementary teacher Londa Kuehn, who guided that second-grade class through those tough life lessons all those years ago now. "We needed to meet their emotions and talk about that, and their compassion for the family, for the community and that yearning to want to make a difference. So the facilitation of that yearning is what brought about this bill."

Assembly Bill 917, now 2023 Wisconsin Act 271, prohibits the sale of counterfeit and unsafe lighters to help combat the dangerous rise in knock-off lighters that fail American Society for Testing and Materials (ASTM) Standards.

"Unfortunately, counterfeit and unsafe lighters are unknowingly being purchased every day by consumers and retailers," Gov. Evers said in prepared remarks prior to signing the bill. "These unsafe lighters are a threat to the safety of our communities, our families and our kids," Evers continued. "Kids are especially vulnerable to the dangers of unsafe lighters and fire-play, and unfortunately the folks here in Pittsville know that tragedy firsthand. Not only do these unsafe lighters endanger the lives of kids and our families, but they also place a burden on our emergency response personnel, who – with great courage - combat these preventable disas-

ters. This law prioritizes the safety of our communities by taking these harmful lighters off the market and providing resources to customers, store owners and distributors to ensure they're making informed decisions when making a purchase."

Legislation aiming to prohibit the display and sale of certain lighters to minors had been introduced during almost every legislative session since 2009 but had failed to pass both the Assembly and the Senate until now. Evers, a former teacher and state school superintendent, was elated to be the one to sign the bill into law.

"It's something you just can't predict," Gov. Evers told us after the bill-signing ceremony. "It started here. The fire chief and others worked really hard to make it happen here in Pittsville, and now here I am signing it into law sixteen years later. It's amazing."

Gov. Evers had heard of the legislation, but did not realize its path to signage had taken nearly two decades, nor did he realize the bill was the result of a fire-related death in the community.

"It's also a good learning lesson for the students here, certainly about the safety issue, but also how government works," Evers added.

Evers said he had asked Chief Minor the same question we asked the governor. This seems like a nobrainer, so why did this take so long?

"You know, he (Minor) would get pushback about Nanny State and is this really the role for government and that sort of thing," Evers told us. "Well, something that causes kids to have a fire in their house and somebody died, that's a big deal and we needed to respond and [it] took sixteen years, but we did."

What Minor thought was going to be "a slam dunk" took multiple hearings over numerous legislative sessions.

"We wrote letters to the current senators and assembly people and to Governor Doyle at the time," Minor said. "Amy Sue Vruwink was our lead in the Assembly and Julie Lassa was our lead in the Senate and they

had the bill written and we started going to hearings and I can't even begin to tell you how many hearings we went to," Minor recalled. "The kids came along on some of them. I think we tried everything we could come up with for all those years."

Minor said there were several years when nothing happened, not even a hearing. Then he said the COVID-related pandemic derailed the bill yet again. And that's when an unlikely ally came along.

"We were approached by BIC Lighter on this, and they didn't know that we already had been trying this," said Minor. "And they came onboard hot and heavy and they had a lot of contacts within the Capital from previous issues."

Before Minor knew it, the bill had cleared both the Assembly and the Senate with very little opposition, and was ready for the governor's signature.

"It actually took me a couple days to realize that it's done," said Minor. "Sometimes it doesn't feel like it's real yet.

"I don't recall the number of states that have banned them. It's quite a few and we wanted to be part of that," Minor added. "BIC came on board with us as a huge partner, and we've always had the support of the lighter association."

Following the bill-signing ceremony, Chief Minor demonstrated some

novelty lighters for Evers, who had not seen them prior to his Pittsville visit

"No I haven't and I'll tell ya, that is one scary thing," the governor said during our conversation. "To think that something that doesn't look like a lighter is a lighter, that's a bad start. It minimizes the fact that what's inside and what you use it for is really dangerous."

The lighter Mason used in 2008 is not known. Minor said all but the metal components melted and were destroyed in the fire.

Assembly Bill 917 passed with bipartisan support and support from the Professional Fire Fighters of Wisconsin, Wisconsin Sheriffs and Deputy Sheriffs Association, Wisconsin State Fire Chiefs Association, and the Wisconsin State Firefighters Association.

Assembly Bill 917, now 2023 Wisconsin Act 271:

Provides that no person may offer for sale or sell, or offer a free sample of, a counterfeit lighter or unsafe lighter; Provides that the prohibition would not apply to any of the following: The interstate transportation of counterfeit or unsafe lighters that pass through Wisconsin; or The storage of counterfeit or unsafe lighters in a warehouse or distribution center if the warehouse or distribution center is not open to the public for the purposes of retail sale or distribution. Defines lighter as any electrical or mechanical device that operates using any type of fuel and that is intended for use in igniting cigarettes, cigars, pipes, charcoal or gas grills, or fireplaces; Defines counterfeit lighter as a lighter that infringes on an intellectual property right of a citizen of the United States or a person that is protected by federal or state intellectual property law; and Defines unsafe lighter as:

A disposable or refillable cigarette, cigar, or pipe lighter that does not comply with ASTM International standard F400-20. A utility, grill, or fireplace lighter, a lighting rod, or a gas match that does not comply with ASTM International standard F2201-20.

Prior to Gov. Evers signing the bill, Minor had a special message to all members of the Pittsville student body who had gathered to witness the historic occasion.

"When you get an idea about making something safer for others, when you get or are asked to pursue an idea that others feel is a good thing, when you know your idea is a good one, don't let go of it. Keep working to get it accomplished. Keep telling your story. Keep looking for support to make it happen. You can realize your dreams and ideas, but nothing comes easy. Don't give up when you know it's the right thing."

"I think that this journey and the way that I got to see my grandpa really take control and make it a reality was really awesome," Potts told us. "So proud of him."
