This summer, 46 middle school students are participating in Kewaskum's Junior Police Academy summer school course.

"The program's overall goal is to get young people excited about law enforcement and understand the how and the why behind law enforcement activities," stated Police Chief Tom Bishop.

Since 2016, Officer Bishop and retired Officer Kevin Kohn have been teaching local students about the public service field. The two work together to teach four, one hour long classes each morning from June 10 to July 3. Topics ranging from law enforcement, the military, and fire rescue are covered.

"Our class lessons include police radio com-

munications, traffic stop procedures, use of force discussion and a review of ALICE procedures (active shooter response in school)," stated Bishop. "We get a lot of help from outside agencies to successfully put this class on," he added.

The Wait was Worth It

Veteran's Grandson Serves as Honor Flight Guardian GAYLE RYDSTROM

"I decided many years ago that I wanted to go on the Honor Flight, but I had to wait until Ethan could join me," said Ken Gauger.

The Kewaskum man is referring to his grandson. Ethan Engel turned 18 recently, which allowed him to be Ken's guardian for the Stars & Stripes Honor Flight that occurred on June 15.

"Ethan is really big in history, so I wanted him to be able to experience this special trip with me," said Ken. "He had a great time, seeing the memorials and listening to the stories everyone was telling."

Earlier this year, Ken found out he would be going to Washington, D.C., and was informed he had three dates to choose from for his Honor Flight. Since Ethan's family lives in Chetek and Ethan was in still in high school for the April and May flights, Ken chose the June 15 option so there wouldn't be any school conflicts for Ethan.

The day began for Ken's family around 3 a.m., as they awoke to be ready to leave approximately an hour later. Ken's son-in-law drove Ken and Ethan to Milwaukee Mitchell International Airport so they'd be there by the 5:30 a.m. check-in time. Ethan's mom rode along, with Ken's wife and granddaughter staying home that morning. All of

Grow Some Pain Relief in Gardens and Containers

Ease your way through the busy summer season with the help of some pain-relieving and anti-inflammatory garden produce. Add them to your garden or containers or purchase the produce at your local farmer's market.

Refresh and rejuvenate yourself with a cup of mint-infused tea or ice water. Mint also helps relieve headaches and general aches and pain. Contain this vigorous perennial herb by growing it in a container to prevent it from overtaking your garden beds. Take advantage of these benefits year-round by starting a few plants at the end of the growing season. Root a few cuttings to plant and grow in a sunny window.

Add sage tea to your list of favorite brews. Just harvest a few leaves, add hot water, and brew a bit of sore throat relief. Sage tea has long been used to soothe scratchy and irritated throats and showed positive results in a 2006 clinical trial. Grow this herb in the garden or a container. It thrives in a sunny spot with well-drained soil. Harvest leaves as needed throughout the season. Regular harvesting encourages more growth for future harvests. Harvest as much as one-third of the plant, to preserve and enjoy the benefits year-round.

You may have used a topical pain relief cream that contained capsaicin. This is the spicy element in chili, jalapeno, habanero, and cayenne peppers and is a natural pain-fighting tool often used to help treat backaches, arthritis, and muscle pain. Hot peppers are ready to har-

vest when they are fully colored. Ask friends to share their harvest or purchase hot peppers at a farmer's market if your garden lacks this plant

Grow and use ginger to help reduce inflammation and combat migraines, muscle pain, arthritis and post-workout or post-gardening soreness. Plus, it helps fight nausea so common during a summer filled with barbeques and celebrations. Grow it in a pot outdoors or sunny window alongside your other indoor plants. Ginger is a tropical plant, but you can find plants or rhizomes, the part you eat, at many garden centers or online plant retailers. Or try rooting the rhizomes you purchase at the grocery store to start new plants.

Sour cherries are credited with managing muscle pain and inflammation. They are loaded with disease-fighting chemicals and antioxidants and help fight inflammation and relieve pain. Growing a cherry tree may not be practical or possible but purchase plenty when they are in season. Juice, dry, and preserve them to enjoy their health benefits all year. If space allows, consider planting a sour cherry tree in vour backvard. Sour cherries do need a cold period with air temperatures between 34-45 degrees to initiate flowering for fruit development. Consult your local extension service for help selecting the best variety for your region. It takes several years for cherry plants to start producing fruit, but watching your tree grow into maturity and bear its first crop is part of the joy of gardening. Just be sure to protect the harvest from hungry birds.

When growing these you'll soon discover it's not just the plants that provide relief. Just the simple act of tending your garden and harvesting can elevate your mood, lower your blood pressure, and start you on the road to feeling better.



Wisconsinites Urged Not to Eat Diamond **Shruumz-brand Products**

Chocolate bars, cones, and gummies containing psychoactive compounds may cause serious illness

The Wisconsin Department of Health Services (DHS) and federal partners at the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) and Food and Drug Administration (FDA) are investigating reports of severe illnesses associated with Diamond Shruumz-brand chocolate bars, cones, and gummies. These products contain a proprietary blend of mushrooms and are available for purchase online and at retailers nationwide.

"Products containing psychoactive compounds such as cannabinoids or mushroom extracts are increasing in availability," said DHS Chief Medical Officer and State Epidemiologist for the Bureau of Environmental and Occupational Health Sheryl Bedno. "The Diamond Shruumz-brand products may contain harmful and undisclosed ingredients that can cause serious illness when eaten, and we ask Wisconsinites who have purchased these products not to consume them."

On June 12, the CDC released a Health Advisory reporting severe illnesses associated with Diamond Shruumz-brand products. As of June 25, a total of 39 illnesses have been reported in 20 different states. To date, Wisconsin has no reported cases. Of the 39 people who became ill after eating these products, more than half were hospitalized. People who became ill from Diamond Shruumz-brand edibles reported a variety of severe symptoms including seizures, loss of consciousness, confusion, sleepiness, abnormal heart rates, high or low blood pressure, nausea, and vomiting.

Retailers should not sell or distribute any of these products and should hold them until further direction is given by the FDA.

People who became ill after eating these products should talk to their health care provider or seek medical care. Wisconsinites can also call the Wisconsin Poison Center at 800-222-1222 to report symptoms. Anyone who has purchased these items should throw them away.

Health care providers who suspect someone is ill as a result of these edibles can consult with a toxicologist at the Wisconsin Poison Center and are asked to report illnesses to the Wisconsin Poison Center or directly to the FDA by completing an online MedWatch Voluntary Reporting form.

The investigation into these illnesses is still ongoing by the FDA. DHS and the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection will continue to monitor the situation and will give updates when available. Learn more and get updates on the FDA website.

them were at the airport when the plane returned that night.

"I couldn't believe the tons of people at the airport at that time of the morning; and they were there to see us off," said Ken. "There were just as many people at Dulles Airport when we got to D.C. It was unbelievable."

With four Korean War veterans and 56 veterans from the Vietnam era, the Alpha flight left Milwaukee at 6:30 a.m., and landed at Dulles 90 minutes later. Ages for the veterans ranged from 66 to 91. Once they deplaned at Dulles, veterans and guardians found seats on a bus that took them to see the memorials, Arlington Cemetery, and more.

This wasn't the first time that Ken has been to the nation's Capitol. Ready to be shipped to Germany after basic training, the destination for Ken and others was changed to Washington, D.C. due to the riots that occurred.

"We were to be the replacement soldiers for those who were back to process out of Vietnam, but the riots that broke out because of the assassination of Martin Luther King Jr. changed our orders," said Ken.

He and the other members of the 503rd Military Police Battalion made sure the Pentagon stayed safe. Ken's 82nd Airborne was one of the first units called to Washington, D.C. There were 14,000 federal troops brought into the nation's Capitol to help control the riots. They lived in schools until settling in at Fort Belvoir. One day when they weren't on duty, Ken's unit attended a Washington Senators baseball game. He took a few pictures and sent them back home to his mom so she could add them to a scrapbook, which he still treasures.

Ken entered the service in the fall of 1967.

"You could sign up on your own or be drafted, so I went to Hartford and signed up," said the graduate of West Bend High School.

While in service to our country, Ken returned home twice; each occurred before he was stationed overseas. The first time was for Christmas 1967. In September of 1968, Ken was home for 37 days before heading to Germany.

As a member of the military police on duty in southwest Germany, Ken's unit was responsible for town patrol, post patrol, artillery patrol, and more.

"We stood guard every day," remembers Ken.
"We had an image to protect, too. We kept everything clean, spit and polished so everything looked good. That really didn't matter to some of the guys, but that image was important to me."

The training never stopped.

"We would go on alert about once a month," said Ken. "Around 2 or 3 one morning, we'd be put on alert and have to get everything ready as if there was an attack. We were timed. Luckily, we never had to use the weapons on anybody."

Ken's enlistment with the Army Military Police ended in October 1969.

"We flew into Frankfurt Rhine-Main when we arrived in Germany and we flew out of there to go home," remembers Ken. "We got out 20 days early, which they did to make sure everyone got home in time. We flew, but those who sailed were on a boat for almost that long to get home. I was processed out in two days, then flew to Chicago and my parents met me there."

Before enlisting, Ken had been working second shift at the Gehl Company. He went back to work there and stayed for a total of 16 years. After two-and-one-half years at Maysteel, Ken was employed for 35 years at MBW in Slinger.

Not long after returning home from Germany, Ken met his future wife, Sharon.

"I went to a local watering hole called Steve & Mary's between Kewaskum and Campbellsport,"

Ken said with a smile. "I saw this one girl and went over there, started talking to her. That was in October 1969. In July, we'll be married 53 years."

Ken and Sharon have two married daughters, two grandsons, and two granddaughters. Gretchen and her family live in Chetek. Pam and her family live in Melbourne, Australia.

June 15 is a day Ken won't forget and he's so happy that Ethan got to experience everything with him; visiting the sites, listening to memories, and meeting other veterans. It was an emotional day.

"I'm an emotional guy," admitted Ken. "My tears flowed more than once. Those tears were happy and sorrowful. The sorrowful ones flowed when I saw all of those white headstones at Arlington Cemetery and the names on the Vietnam Wall."

One of the names on the Vietnam Veterans' Memorial Wall is that of his classmate at West Bend High School. Glenn Dean was killed on August 22, 1968.

"So many of us were 19-years-old when we were over there," said Ken. "Glenn was 19 when he was killed. Seeing his name on the Wall was difficult, but it's great to see the names of those who lost their lives. My main goal for going was to see the Wall, to see Glenn's name. That was very important to me; without a doubt, the favorite thing I saw that day."

Ken also really enjoyed the visit to the Martin Luther King Jr. Memorial.

"I spent time reading all of his quotes," said Ken. "He was such a smart man."

Not only do those on the Honor Flights get to see the sites and remember their time in service without paying so much as a penny, all of the food they eat is also donated.


"They fed us before we left Milwaukee, we ate while we were in D.C., had ice cream...nobody went hungry, that's for sure," Ken said with a laugh.

One of the times Ken's tears were happy was when mail call happened. Someone in the veteran's life is in charge of contacting people to ask for cards and letters or other small items for the veterans. On the flight from Dulles to Milwaukee, the veteran receives his or her envelope of items.

"My wife made so many calls to get people to send letters for the mail call," said Ken. He laughed and added, "Everything has to be sent to the Guardian. My name was the third last name called for mail call. 

Wisconsin Requires Influenza A Testing Prior to Movement of Lactating Dairy Cattle to Fairs and Exhibitions

WIS. DEPT OF AGRICULTURE, TRADE AND CONSUMER PROTECTION

In an effort to prevent the spread of highly pathogenic avian influenza (HPAI) (H5N1) in dairy cattle, the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP) is requiring Influenza A testing prior to movement of lactating dairy cattle to fairs or exhibitions effective beginning June 19, 2024. The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) has recommended that measures be taken to minimize the potential spread of influenza.

HPAI (H5N1) has been detected in dairy cattle in 12 states including Iowa, Michigan, and Minnesota. In addition to the USDA Federal Order that requires Influenza A testing for interstate movement of dairy cattle, today's announcement will limit the risk of commingling infected animals.

In order to move lactating dairy cattle to fairs or exhibitions within the state, producers must receive a negative test for Influenza A virus at an approved National Animal Health Laboratory Network (NAHLN) laboratory with samples collected no more than 7 days prior to movement to the fair or exhibition. This testing is available to producers at no cost through USDA APHIS at NAHLN laboratories. Producers may also apply for reimbursement of shipping and veterinary fees for collection of samples. This intrastate order requiring a negative Influenza A test prior to travelling to a show or exhibition will remain in effect until 60 days after the last detection of H5N1 in cattle herds in the United States

Dairy producers and those working with dairy are strongly encouraged to continue practicing strict biosecurity to protect their herds. DATCP is closely monitoring HPAI (H5N1) in dairy cattle and continues to encourage producers that notice unusual clinical signs in their cattle to work with their herd veterinarian. To report herds with unexplained symptoms, veterinarians should contact DATCP at (608) 224-4872 (business hours) or (800) 943-0003 (after hours and weekends). Reports can also be emailed to datcpanimalimports@wisconsin.gov.

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


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CUB SCOUT CORNER



Putting together the junior course requires a lot of work from the officers. Many outside hours are needed to organize and execute the program. It was stated that a few other communities offer a similar course but none are known to incorporate the class into the summer school program.

"I spend four hours each morning teaching the class and the second half of my day doing all

After seeing the continued success of the youth program, it is the Officer's goal to extend the course into a Citizen's Police Academy for adults in the future.

This will not only include our online databases, but also what we have in print at the library. 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

Return of the Canada Gang

Hello friends,

Back in 1982, I was 21 and my brother Mike was 25. Along with my dad, the late Robert Walters, and a family friend, we flew by float plane to Shultz Lake which is 55 air miles northwest of Red Lake and absolutely kicked butt on walleye and northern pike. Fortytwo years later, Chimo Lodge and Outposts, formally owned by my good friends Pete and Elizabeth Hagedorn, is owned by Chris and Tammy Leblanc, and I am happy to say there is not a flaw in the way this business is run. Mike and I. along with my brother Tom Walbrother-in-law ters, Dick Schuster, nephew Trent Schuster, high school and lifelong friends Jeff Moll and Roger Frank, and family friend Steve Mellone just returned from seven days in the promised land.

Saturday, June 15 High 69, Low 47

The theme for the first six days of this trip would be cold and windy. Not chilling cold, but because of constant winds, it wore on a person. We arrived yesterday, camped in Pete and Elizabeth's backyard, and flew to Shultz today, and fish catching was very good and the mood was even better. Jeff Moll who is entering his 50th year as a Red Brush Hunter "our deer camp" would be my partner for the day, and we did well as Jeff won the "big walleye" for the day with the group. Trent Schuster's first fish of the trip was caught on a night crawler harness and it was a 39-inch northern pike. Tonight, it was our usual antics of fresh walleye and playing crap on your neighbor. Moll and I saw daylight before calling it a day.

Sunday, June 16 High 65, Low 45

Steve Mellone is the new guy in the group and Steve would have an incredible trip. Today, he was fishing with my brother Tom and caught a 40-inch gator which knocked Trent out of the picture by an inch. Steve would see moose and bear on this trip, could stay up till the cows come home, and is a lot of fun. I mentioned the chill in the air, it was the wind, and it would make boat handling, especially

while fighting a good fish, a very large challenge and every day but the last I wore knee boots and pants instead of sandals and shorts. Monday, June 17


High 72, Low 51 About five years ago, much of the bush around Shultz Lake burned and we were here in '95 when it burned. People often speak poorly about forest fires, but let me tell you, the new growth of aspen, birch and jack pine is beautiful and a smorgasbord for the local moose. Today, I would be fishing with my 32-year-old nephew Trent Schuster, and we would take a boat from camp, travel to a portage "trail" and then hike to another lake

where there is a boat.

There are lake trout in this lake as well as northern pike and walleye. Over 42 years, we have only caught five trout, and Trent wanted to make it six. Instead of just going after walleye that average 19-20 inches in this lake, we rigged up with 4-ounce weights and Trent used a 2-ounce jig with a 4-inch twister tail. We trolled in 60feet of water, and Trent had a hard hit and then an excellent fight by what would be a beautiful 29-inch laker. We had a day to fish and put it on a long stringer in deep water so the eagles would not get it, and within one minute, two arrived and failed as the trout was too

deep to reach.

Next on the Trent Schuster Show was walleye. Numbers wise, things were a bit slow, especially when compared to his uncle, but in this gang, size matters, and while I was catching numerous walleyes between 20 and 24 inches and while Trent was still living in the glory of his trout, he was basically just an observer. The size game

worked out very nicely when he hooked into a good fish and we were being pushed hard by the wind. Trent caught a beautiful 27.25-inch walleve, and what is really cool is that no more than five minutes after releasing it, he caught another 27-incher.

We fished hard all day and had a blast and then headed back to camp and baked one of the trout fillets for a

snack for the group to go with our supper. On this nigh, crap on your neighbor and lots of laughs kept most of the gang up until there was daylight on the eastern horizon, and in all of our minds we were splendidly aware that we had five more days of living large.
