\$1,000,000 Awarded to the Village of Campbellsport for the Reconstruction of Cherry and Martin Streets

The Village of Campbellsport is excited to announce that our community has been awarded a \$1,000,000 grant towards the 2025 and 2026 Cherry Street and Martin Street total reconstruction projects through the State of Wisconsin's Community Development Block Grant program.

Cherry Street and Martin Street, installed as part of the original plat of Village of Campbellsport, were last resurfaced in the late 1970's and still have their original water and sewer utilities from the 1930's.

From a road condition standpoint, both roadways and utility systems are in dire need of replacement, due to pavement age, alligator cracking, surface separation from the binder course, sub-grade failure, along with water and sewer utilities that are over 85 years old.

Cherry Street and Martin Street were identified for total reconstruction and replacement as part of the Village of Campbellsport 2023-2032 Roadway Improvement Plan, approved by the Village Board in September of 2022. In May 2024, the Village Board approved the application to be submitted by Administrator Kudy and MSA Professional Services to the Community Development Block Grant program and requested funds to help the village tackle this \$1.7 million project.

This grant will pay for 56.87% of the roadway, reducing the potential tax burden by \$1 million in required debt. Cherry Street and Martin Street will receive all new municipal utilities, pavement, along with replaced and enhanced curbs, gutters and sidewalks.

I have been involved in coaching high school sports since 1971: mostly wrestling and football and volunteer track coach since 1973. I still try to help when needed and have fought for a few unusual situations involving the WIAA and such through the years. Track coach, Derek Toshner, said the WIAA needed some paperwork "proof." I really didn't know just what was needed until after the conference tournament, May 13, after I asked a few people why Josh didn't run in the conference tournament, and, with the privacy laws, no one volunteered too much, just what was needed.

So, I contacted the WIAA and they needed a document to prove why Josh's dad could not come back to their home in Eden to fulfill the WIAA condition of "Athlete needs to live in house in school district of participation with two parents." With having 13 years of experience as Court Expert with the State Patrol, and having coached high school since 1971, I had a question on that. I have taught athletes who competed with only one parent, and even a former inmate had a son that was playing high school basketball. But, I know rules and sought to provide this "paper proof" that the WIAA needed.

I went to see Glenn Grothman in his Fond du Lac office, May 15 at 1:30 p.m. Glenn was in Washington but his staffer would let Glenn know that Josh needed this document sent to the WIAA office ASAP as track Coach Toshner needed to have his roster into the Kiel Regional roster by 8 a.m. Friday, May 17. I got home at 5 that afternoon and Glenn's staffer said to call her in the morning for an update.

The next morning, I called and the secretary said that Glenn had provided the necessary paperwork to the WIAA and they are approving Josh's request to be allowed to participate in the State Track competition.

As most of you remember, Josh went on to win his Regional, Sectional and State 100 meter and 200 meter races; in fact, he had the fastest times of all three classes at State.

If you see Glenn, tell him thanks for representing us "little folks" and getting the job done for us. As Paul Harvey would sign off, "And that is the



All-terrain vehicles are not just for off-road excursions anymore in some area towns and villages. ATVs are allowed on designated roads in the Town of Scott, the Town of Osceola, the Town of Forest, and the Village of Campbellsport. Town boards in Farmington, Wayne, Kewaskum, Auburn, and Ashford all have approved ordinances that allow ATVs on their roads. However, the ordinances will not go into effect until signs are posted in those towns. The new ordinances are coming to area roadways thanks to the efforts of four ATV enthusiasts: Tom Thompson, Tim Rohrer, Rich Welch, and Tom Kempke. AN OUTDOORSMAN'S JOURNAL Young Biologists

Hello friends,

One of the bonuses about my daughter Selina going to UW-Stevens Point is that she introduced me to several future biologists, and this week I will have the pleasure of introducing you to one that is seeking his Master's degree on a project that is both very interesting and important. With the help of the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources and UWSP, Dylan Undlin is working on a project to determine native and non-native trout movement in Lake Superior tributaries, specifically the Knife and Steward Rivers which are both in the Two Harbors area. The base for Dylan's work is the French River Fisheries office just south of Knife River. This research is meant to determine the effects of warm water on trout, which is a known stressor to these fish. Due to space concerns, I can only go into detail of how they are doing this work.

Dylan Undlin is probably the perfect description of a future Fisheries and Aquatic Sciences Biologist. Since graduating from UWSP, he has worked in remote areas of Alaska, such as the Yukon River, as a fish technician for the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. Dylan is an avid outdoorsman who spent much of his younger life in Miles City, Montana and has more hunting and fishing stories than most 23 year olds that I know.

Since March, Dylan has been living in a remote cabin with no TV or Wi-Fi.

Levi Miller is also a very impressive young man. Levi will be entering his senior year at UWSP and is pursuing the same degree as Dylan and Selina did. He is a fish technician on this project who is originally from Jordan, Montana and is also into hunting and fishing and like Dylan and is tough as nails.

Today would be spent in the bush in the water on the Steward River and we would be stream electrofishing (shocking) for brook trout. To describe this job, I would have to say, physical, hot/humid, millions of mosquitoes that you simply cannot let bother you, precise, and technological. Dylan and Levi would be in front of me with backpack shockers that temporarily shock the trout, allowing them to net to catch them. I would be behind them and be the backup man with a net and a bucket to transport the fish.

During the next two days, one of my personal thoughts was don't trip and lose the fish before

these guys could do their work; I did not fail. We would do 560-foot sections of stream at a time and then it was time to work up the fish.

Each trout is measured, weighed, fin clipped with a section of the fin saved and scale samples are taken from each fish for aging as well as genetic testing, and given either a PIT (passive integrated transponder) tag or in some cases, a small radio transmitter is surgically implanted into the trout's abdomen for future work with telemetry and drones.

My friends, what I witnessed over the two days I spent on the Knife and Steward Rivers was a thing of beauty. The PIT tag is the size of a piece of rice and implanted with a syringe. The radio transmitter is literally implanted by surgery into the abdomen of the

fish.

The process for implanting the radio transmitter goes like this: water is slowly flushed into the fishes mouth, a TENS (Transcutaneous Electrical Nerve Stimulation) keeps the trout calm during surgery, and Dylan uses a scalpel to make the incision, inserts the transmitter and then sews the incision shut. You have to see this to believe it, and in every case the surgery worked.

The reason for this study is because northeast Minnesota does not have enough cold water which is what trout need to survive. In many cases, that is due to either logging which reduces the forest canopy, so streams receive a lot more sunlight, or another cause of warming trout streams is beaver dams. Probably the biggest reason is climate change which is creating irregular moisture (rain/snow) and warming temperatures. So, here is how this process works. Cables across both rivers are attached to solar panels that charge deep cycle batteries that power transponders. When a fish swims under the cable

with a PIT tag in it, this movement is registered and recorded for the researchers. The trout with transmitters implanted in them are followed by telemetry that can be completed on foot or with drones.

The goal behind this research is to find cold water which in almost all cases comes from underground springs and learn about how it attracts trout and affects their life.

I was given the opportunity to bushwhack with an antenna and look for trout #615.

The work is physical and you have to be careful or you could do damage to your antenna. The telemetry will pick up the fish within 800 feet, and though this fish was found a few weeks ago, it was not today, and it is amazing how far they can travel.

Later in the day, we were on the Knife River and Dylan found brookie #555. It was in 36 inches of water on a sharp oxbow and hanging out under a deadfall.

Without present and future research biologists like Dylan Undlin and Levi Miller, this world would be in tougher shape than it already is. *Sunset*

Josh Bocher, a 2020 Kewaskum High School graduate, recently received a full-ride basketball scholarship to Quincy University in Illinois and is currently working for the Village of Kewaskum in the Public Works Department for the summer.

Rather than relaxing this summer, Bocher is making the most of his days by working full time with the Village and preparing for the upcoming basketball season when he's off the clock.

"When I was on spring break, I met with Dennis Aupperle, the head of Kewaskum's Public Works Department. He seemed like he would be very flexible with my basketball schedule so that is how I decided to do this job for the summer," stated Bocher.

The basketball player admitted he was a little nervous about managing such a busy schedule but feels he was able to get the hang of it pretty quickly.

"I started around the end of May when I got back from college. These days, I do a basketball workout in the morning before I start work at 7:30 a.m. When I get off at 3:30 p.m., I go home, eat, and then head to the gym for another workout," said Bocher. "T'll do this until about mid August when I have to go back to school."

The athlete is preparing to transfer from a junior college (Juco) in Northern Illinois to Quincy University. Quincy is also located in Illinois but it is further southwest, about six hours from Kewaskum.

"I will be a transfer junior this year," stated Bocher.

He explained that he is excited to transition from a junior college to a four-year school because it will feel more like the real "college experience."

"At Juco, we stayed in the same building all day and then went to practice right after classes. It was very similar to high school," noted Bocher.

Although he is excited to move to

"I would say that I learned how to be a good student-athlete there. I learned how to manage my time and to focus on being a student first. I also gained skills to become a better basketball player," he stated.

Last season, Bocher's team took on John Wood Community College, a two-year school located in Quincy, Ill. Bocher had a great game against the team and really stood out as a player.

"I think I had roughly 24 points and 10 rebounds against them," he recalled.

After the season ended, Quincy University ended up hiring the basketball coach from John Wood Community College as their new head coach.

"Quincy has been on the bottom of the division two conference for a while now and the incoming coach is really trying to build up the team," said Bocher.


