Campbellsport Loses Flyway Feud in Mayville on Friday the 13th

In a "nail biter" Game of the Week, the Mayville Cardinals (2-0, 4-0) would turn the tables on the Campbellsport Cougars (1-1, 3-1) in the second half, after a scoreless first half for the home team, and win the game 15-9.

The kickoff went about as well as it could for the Cougars because Luke Pendowski returned the ball 85 yards for an immediate touchdown. The extra point attempt was blocked by the Cardinals leading to an early 6-0 lead for Campbellsport.

"To start the game with a kickoff return for a touchdown was big for us," said Campbellsport Head Coach Todd Wondra. "Those are the type of things you hope set a tone for the game."

The Cougars doubled down and performed a successful onside kick after the initial kickoff

"[I] Give Mayville kids huge props because that is enough to sink most kids but they stood in there and fought," said Wondra. "We saw some stuff on film that looked favorable for an onside so I went for it after that huge kick return, but, unfortunately, we weren't able to punch it in after the recovery."

The Cougars did get close enough for a field goal, however, and all credit goes to Pendowski again for the 32-yard kick. Campbellsport bumped their lead to 9-0 midway through the first quarter.

Mayville was forced to punt on their first possession, forced a Campbellsport turnover on the

Cougars' possession, and punted once more to close out the first quarter.

The Cougars had another field goal opportunity in the second quarter, but the ball seemed to be tipped causing it to fall short of the goal post.

Following the unsuccessful field goal, the Cardinals were able to work their way down to the 10-yard line with less than a minute in the half.

A whistle was blown on the next play causing some confusion on whether Mayville had driven it in for a touchdown. The referees decided the Cardinals hadn't scored and they turned it over on downs to end their drive giving the Cougars little time to make a move before halftime.

Mayville came back out in the third quarter ready to receive.

The Cardinals were third and three when the ball was handed to Sawyer Hardesty who broke through the Cougars' strong defensive line for Mayville's first touchdown of the night. Elijah Mlsna's kick was good. The Cardinals were now down by two, 9-7.

"Our defense played well most of the night, but, unfortunately, a couple missed tackles and a missed assignment gave them three big pass plays to set them up to find the endzone," commented Wondra.

With three minutes to go in the third quarter, the Cougars were forced to punt it away.

The Cardinals kept things going into the fourth quarter where Joren Schlender had a seven-yard rushing touchdown. Mayville added



A Time for Gratitude and Heartfelt Change

The Bridget Center of Kewaskum Plans to Host a Fundraiser to Support Expansion

The Bridget Center of Kewaskum will be hosting a fall equinox fundraising event on Saturday, Sept. 21, from 2-7 p.m., to help support their plans to build a nourishing, retreat center and community space.

"Many are creating this community space in nature. We want people to come experience our location and land," stated Peggy Kober, visionary and foundress of the Bridget Center. "This shall be common ground to grow on!"

The Center plans to have live music, food, dancing, yoga, speakers, presentations, vendors and a silent auction throughout the day.

The Bridget Center is a nonprofit organization that is here to celebrate our interrelationships with nature and nurturing connection to one's self, each other, and the Earth. The educational and event programming will explore ways for us to improve our mind, body and spirit to better serve our greater communities.

"We want this to be a place for all people and traditions as we discover our common ground," stated Koher

The center has a big vision for the spaces that they plan to renovate. The property consists of two historic buildings created by those who gathered as a community for 144 years to celebrate the seasons of life.

"We have an old school building and a chapel on the property. We plan to make both of these spaces into areas that can be used for many purposes," explained Kober.

The nonprofit group plans to use the school building as a location for overnight stays, meditation, yoga, cooking and more.

"We envision the second and third floors of the school building to serve as the quiet part of the space providing room to sleep eight to 12 people," mentioned Kober.

She also explained that the second floor will have a meditation area with a big window facing east. The third floor is described to be smaller, with one extra bedroom and possibly an area for yoga.

"On the main level, we plan to have a large open gathering space with a kitchen, fireplace and glass doors that go out to a patio," added the visionary.

As for the chapel on the acquired land, the Bridget Center plans to use it as a venue for live performances, educational programs and more.

The community intends to utilize the renovated Center in many ways. A few of the possibilities include family reunions, weddings and celebrations of life and death. Additionally, it is a space to reconnect with nature as the Center grows plants historically appreciated for their medicinal purpose to humans.

"We also want to continue to serve as a destination for those to come visit from other areas, either for the day, or as a retreat venue," said Kober.

The nonprofit has experience hosting groups from outside of the community. Dennis Humphrey, lead therapist of The Sparta Project utilizes Bridget's outdoor landscape and labyrinth for their program when in Wisconsin.

"The Sparta Project works with veterans, police and first responders to help process trauma,"

The celebration was set to take place in St. Ignace, Michigan—one of the ports to Mackinac Island, where we had spent many summers working and where our family reunited every year for 25 years at the Grand Hotel. We stayed at the hotel that weekend and reflected on those indescribably fun and magical memories that have lingered long after the summers ended.

It was nice to renew—or perhaps begin anew—our bonds with the rest of the family, even if a funeral wasn't the ideal occasion. There simply aren't going to be many other opportunities to do so. After paying our respects at the graveside

In a fast-paced world, doing this daily, weekly, or monthly is a challenge. But why not annually? Who knows, maybe next year we'll gather there again, not in mourning, but in celebration of life and family.

Envision Greater Fond du Lac launched the Public Office Preparation 101 (POP101) program in 2023. The 2024 cohort will take place on Wednesday, October 2, and Wednesday, October 9 – both sessions are from 4-7 p.m. Registrants are required to attend both sessions.

POP101 engages community members in local nonpartisan political processes by providing essential information and skills needed for success in public office. Participants will explore basic competencies, including how to navigate the paperwork process; fundraising and spending; campaigning; and building public persona.

POP101 is two evening sessions and features former state representatives and other experienced presenters on topics relevant to running for office in Fond du Lac County. The program extends upon the curriculum of Leadership Fond du Lac County, which explores boardsmanship and how to run for local office within its curriculum. Completion of Leadership Fond du Lac County is not a requirement for attendance in POP101.

"Having business-friendly policy makers is a priority for us as a chamber of commerce and economic development organization," Sadie Howell, president/CEO, Envision Greater Fond du Lac, said. "The Public Office Preparation program provides the tools necessary to help candidates take a step toward starting a campaign in Fond du Lac County, whether it's for a city or town council position or school board."

Participants in POP101 will learn about best practices in building a public persona; putting a campaign team together and developing a campaign platform; finding out more about the paperwork and process requirements of Fond du Lac County; developing campaign fundraising and spending strategies; gain perspective on what happens once being elected to public office; and more.

Banned Books Week 2024 runs this year from September 22-28. The theme is "Freed Between the Lines." Please read the article below from the American Library Association shared below from their website at *www.ala.org/bbooks/banned*.

"Banned Books Week was launched in 1982 in response to a sudden surge in the number of challenges to books in libraries, bookstores, and schools. By focusing on efforts to remove or restrict access to books, Banned Books Week draws national attention to the harms of censorship. Typically (but not always) held during the last week of September, the annual event highlights the value of free and open access to information and brings together the entire book community — librarians, educators, authors, publishers, booksellers, and readers of all types — in shared support of the freedom to seek and to express ideas.

"In a time of intense political polarization, li-



brary staff in every state are facing an unprecedented number of attempts to ban books. ALA's Office for Intellectual Freedom documented 1,247 demands to censor library books and resources in 2023. The number of titles targeted for censorship surged 65% in 2023 compared to 2022, reaching the highest levels ever documented by OIF in more than 20 years of tracking –4,240 unique book titles were targeted for removal from schools and libraries. This tops the previous high from 2022, when 2,571 unique titles were targeted for censorship. Titles representing the voices and lived experiences of LGBTQIA+ and BIPOC individuals made up 47% of those targeted in censorship attempts.

"The theme for Banned Books Week 2024 (September 22-28) is 'Freed Between the Lines.' We can find freedom in the pages of a book — but book bans and censorship threaten that freedom, along with many other rights and institutions. During Banned Books Week 2024 and beyond, let's share our love of the right to read and the freedom found in books. Let's be Freed Between the Lines!"

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tory of censorship at *americanlibrariesmagazine*. org/2024/09/03/censorship-throughout-the-centuries/. This is not something new and librarians, educators, parents and readers have been fighting the good fight for centuries.

In my mission to promote lifelong learning, this week is so valuable to me. Taking away someone's freedom to read what they choose based on someone else's agenda is horrific and should be stopped. At Kewaskum Public Library, we do our best to have a balanced collection and have a wellthought out and approved collection development policy to support it. During this week, we will have displays of banned and challenged books to be checked out. I have found that the best part of Banned Books week is to have discussions with people who are unfamiliar with the concept and enlighten them. I encourage anyone with questions about challenges, our collection or anything to do with intellectual freedom to seek me out and I would be happy to sit down and talk with you.

stated Humphrey. "We have used the Bridget Center twice now and really appreciate the calmness of the Center as it provides a place of peace and comfort for our members."



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

Adventures at Flater's Resort

Hello friends,

I have been friends with "Musky Joe" Flater, who is a fifth generation owner of Flater's Resort, for a good 20 years. Joe is hard to describe in less than a million words. Old school, hardcore, fun, disorganized, one of the few in the Fresh Water Fishing Hall of Fame, fond of beer, a Packer and Brewer die hard, trapper, smells like an old bear just coming out of the den etc.. etc..

I told Joe a while back I could help him, along with our very good buddy Dave Schmitt, with the seven bear hunters that Joe was guiding this fall. Flater's Resort has been owned by the Flater's for 86 years and is located where the Chippewa and Flambeau Rivers meet. If you have ever been in their very outdoor-oriented tavern, you are well aware that it is a fun place to enjoy a beverage.

Friday, September 6 High 61, Low 42

I have been here since Wednesday when the season opened and am staying in a cabin with Dave Schmitt who lives near Adams and Hartland. Of the seven hunters sitting over a bait, not a bear has been harvested but let me tell you, a lot of bear are being observed and there are some interesting stories. The first two nights, one hunter saw 11 and then eight bears, every hunter but one has had bear experiences, but the bear were either with cubs or just too small for the hunters to take this early in the hunt.

There are five guys from the Jefferson area, John Hauser and his 26-year-old son Alex, Mike Henningsen, Tom Ames and Brian Happ. These guys are rigged with the best of everything, very into the hunt, and when day becomes night, are a blast as we create a strategy in Flater's pub for the next hunt.




