"We were out of real estate due to continuous growth," stated Jodi, the office manager of the local dentist.

The Dentistry has been serving local patients for the past 45 years and was established by Doctor Dennis Conner.

"Doctor Sara is the current owner of the practice after purchasing the business in the fall of 2019," mentioned Jodi.

The relocation process has been underway since spring and the process is almost complete.

"The new location broke ground April 15, 2024, and we will start seeing patients on Dec. 2," explained the office manager.

The new building will provide the dental team with more space and opportunities for advancement.

"With this new state of the art practice, we will be able to provide our patients with more space,

comfort, technology and appointment availability," said Jodi.

The Dentistry explained that they chose the location because it is next to the Kewaskum Health Center and there is room for continuous growth.

Kewaskum Family Dentistry plans to hold an open house for community members to see the new building. The event will take place on Saturday, Dec. 6 from 2-4 p.m.

These championships come in addition to the 2025 U.S. Women's Open Presented by Ally, which will be held May 28-June 1. Added to the slate of upcoming championships are the:

- 2027 U.S. Amateur Four-Ball
- 2030 U.S. Women's Amateur Four-Ball
- 2033 U.S. Women's Amateur
- 2035 U.S. Amateur
- 2039 U.S. Junior Amateur

"Erin Hills has proven itself as an exceptional venue for USGA championships, and we are thrilled to bring these five events to this iconic course," said Mark Hill, managing director, Championships. "The natural beauty and challenging layout of Erin Hills make it the perfect stage for golfers to showcase their talent and determination."

Erin Hills joins a list of 13 other courses that have hosted or will host the U.S. Open, U.S. Wom-

en's Open, U.S. Amateur and U.S. Women's Amateur. The course played host to the first U.S. Open in the state of Wisconsin in 2017 when Brooks Koepka won the first of his two consecutive titles. Erin Hills also was the site of the 2011 U.S. Amateur, where Kelly Kraft defeated Patrick Cantlay, 2 up, in the 36-hole final.

"We're excited to continue our partnership with the USGA by hosting these five championships," said Andy Ziegler, owner of Erin Hills. "We strongly believe in supporting and celebrating amateur golf, and these championships do exactly that."

Next May's U.S. Women's Open will be the fifth USGA championship conducted at Erin Hills. 



design to another. People can buy a license plate at any time, and there is no need to wait for registration renewal.



Tall Pines Conservancy Announces Executive Director Retirement, Names Successor

Statewide leader in land preservation plans for the future as it marks 25th anniversary

Tall Pines Conservancy, one of the state's leading non-profit land trusts, announced that its long-time executive director Susan Buchanan will retire yearend and has named Rebecca (Becky) Fedak to succeed Buchanan. Tall Pines, which marks its 25th anniversary this year, focuses on preserving farmlands, water resources. and natural spaces in Waukesha. Dodge, and Washington Counties. The land trust currently has nearly 3,000 acres under protection. Land trusts are private, community-based, non-profit organizations established to protect land and water resources for public benefit and from future development.

Buchanan was First Executive Director

Buchanan was hired in 2008 as the organization's first executive director. Under her leadership, Tall Pines achieved national Land Trust Accreditation, the highest national mark of distinction, and increased the number of acres under its protection from about 200 to more than 2,700 today with another 1,600 acres forthcoming. Buchanan also formed a number of critical partnerships and programs at the state and regional level including the Oconomowoc Watershed Protection Program, Lake Country Clean Waters, and Farmers for Lake Country. Additionally, she has secured more than \$11 million in private, state, and federal funding for farmland protection and developed the annual Ride to the Barns bicycling fundraiser that brings hundreds of riders each year to area farms.

"With Susan at the helm, Tall Pines has evolved into one of Wisconsin's most well respected and successful land trusts and has garnered both a national and statewide reputation as a leader in land protection," said Tall Pines Board of Directors Chair Kyle Zwieg. He is the co-owner of Zwieg's Maple Acres, a sixth-generation familv farm.

Outside of Tall Pines. Buchanan has served on Boards and in other important roles for a number of organizations including the National Agricultural Land Network/American Farmland Trust, Gathering Waters -- Wisconsin's Alliance of Land Trusts, and Lake Country Clean Wa ters. She and her husband own two farms, one in Wisconsin and the other in Connecticut.

Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) Office of Great Waters where she managed dozens of environmental restoration projects in partnership with agencies, nonprofits, and private entities at the federal, state, and local level. Additionally, Fedak is a farm owner. She and her husband, together with her parents, steward a nearly 100-acre farm where they are actively restoring wetlands, meadows, and prairie while also working with Tall Pines to preserve the property.

"Becky's professional expertise, preservation experience, and personal background make her extremely well-suited to lead Tall Pines going forward and intuitively connect her to our mission to protect land and water." Buchanan said.

"Having grown up in Hartland and through my work professionally and as a farm owner, I've seen firsthand the accelerating loss of open spaces in our region and how our landscape has transformed," Fedak added. "I'm deeply committed to Tall Pines' mission and working with our board. staff, volunteers, and partners to support our property owners and communities while also preserving the natural areas that define Lake Country."

Before joining the DNR in 2019. Fedak was a Partner and Senior Engineer for Brendle Group, a Colorado sustainability consulting firm where she led the water and climate practice areas. Prior to that she was Co-Founder and Technical Director for Running Water International, a social enterprise that brings open source water and sanitation technologies to developing countries. Fedak began her career as a Water **Resources Engineer for MWH Global** (now Stantec). She earned her MBA in Global Social and Sustainable Enterprise from Colorado State University and her undergraduate degree in Environmental Engineering from University of Wisconsin-Platteville.

"Becky is the ideal individual to help Tall Pines 'Keep the country in Lake Country," Zwieg said. "We have the highest project load ever in our 25-year history because communities believe in our mission and see the benefits of our work. Becky will help us expand our capacity to



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AN OUTDOORSMAN'S JOURNAL

Montana Elk Hunt, the Journey

Hello friends,

This week, and next, I will write about my most anticipated, expensive and, in some ways, challenging trip of my life. I would head west with my golden retrievers to southwest Montana, pulling a 7,000-pound, 14-foot enclosed trailer rigged for camping that would hold my atv and enough gear for two camps. After two days, my daughter, Selina Walters, who is a biologist with the USFWS out of Missoula, would join us for a week of elk and mule deer hunting.

This week's column is on the journey west and the days before the elk/ mule deer season opened.

Tuesday, October 22 High 63, Low 42

With gear, propane and the atv, I am sure my 2017 GMC was pulling 9,000 pounds when I left home at 1:00 this morning. I can honestly say that I have never been so excited about an adventure in my life. Not only would I be hunting and living in the mountains but my daughter, Selina, who just nine months ago moved to Montana, would be my partner. I miss Selina a ton and this would be my third trip west in 2024, the last one to scout the area we would be calling home this week with her and, of course,



From our base camp to our camp at the top of the mountain was a five-mile atv journey that was quite challenging.

Ruby and Red.

Today, I drove 1,005 miles before pulling over for a nap in The GMC Hotel in northeastern Wyoming. At one point, I hit a 25-mph head wind that knocked my gas mileage down to 4.5 miles per gallon. After the wind, if I was willing to drive 65 or under, I averaged 10. I literally had enough cash for 10 not 4.5 mpg.

Wednesday, October 23

High 58, Low 32

Pure joy over took me as I made it to my U.S. Forest Service campground where my truck and trailer would be the only one for the next 11 days.

As soon as I got out of the truck, I started unloading the trailer and loading the atv and its trailer for the

five-mile journey up a forest service road that, at least in my mind, was a constant concern. Sharp rocks that can tear tires apart, over worked machine and going off the edge of the mountain kept me on top of my game as any one would have spelled disaster for the rest of the trip and potentially beyond.

I would stay at my lower camp the first two nights, haul gear, build the upper camp and scout for elk. This, my friends, is the life I was created for. I have put every dime and piece of thought into this journey and everything seemed perfect. On the drive up, which I averaged a speed of 5 mph, the trail areas with dirt/mud instead of rock had ample elk sign.

My first load consisted of one of my Eskimo pop ice shacks and a lot of camping gear. The Eskimo ice shack, when tarped, creates an impressive camp and it stays warm.

Next, I went scouting to the spot Selina and I found in August, and the number of elk and deer sign was almost unbelievable. I made it back to my base camp at dark and could not have been in a better mood.

Thursday, October 24

High 55, Low 30

Another trip up the mountain with a load, put up another Eskimo shack away from the sleeper shack and more scouting, lots of animal sign, new sign made where I scouted yesterday.

Selina worked a full day in Missoula, drove 180-miles and made it to camp at 9:00 tonight. Until this year, everything to do with Selina was either raising her or being a part of her college experience. Now she lives

1,500 miles away and is truly becoming a young woman of the outdoors both in her career and her hobbies: fly fishing, kayaking, hiking and lots of hunting this fall.

We sat up and she played with her pups, we talked and the mood was perfect.


Friday, October 25

High 60, Low 29

With the pups and last load of gear, we headed up the mountain, for Selina it would be five days. We had Ruby hike the first two miles then she got to ride with Selina and I on our 570-Polaris "Sportsman." I have to give a plug for this machine, 100-percent flawless and it uses very little fuel.

Selina and I went into where we would hunt the following morning. We followed all grizzly bear protocol which I will get into next week and had several hours at camp to prepare for plenty of hard days of hunting but on this afternoon and early evening, we simply had fun.
