Village of Campbellsport Approves 2025 Proposed Budget

On Monday, Nov. 11, the Village of Campbellsport held a 2025 budget hearing and regular

Charlie Kudy, village administrator, discussed a few highlights of the budget during the hearing. The total revenues budget is 7,475,623.09, which takes into account the general, library, capitol projects, debt service, fire and ambulance, TID #1, and TID #2 funds. He also shared the mill rate will be \$9.80 per one thousand.

More information was provided on the budget during the regular meeting that followed the hearing, and Kudy encouraged citizens to contact village hall if they wanted more information than what was provided, as well.

Since it was Veterans Day, two members of the Campbellsport Memorial American Legion Auxiliary Unit 222 came to lead the Pledge of Allegiance at the start of the meeting.

During department reports, Chief Andrea Dowland shared the police department is looking for a family to adopt for Christmas.

There were several citizens comments throughout the evening regarding planters downtown, speed limit/school zone signage going eastbound by St. Matthew, questions on UTV/ATV rules, Ladwig St., open for business signs during construction, and parking concerns.

There were four presentations planned for the evening. The first was from Fond du Lac Couning the amount of \$224.693.

ty Executive Sam Kaufmann who spoke on the county's budget and other news. The other three came from Strand Associates, USG Water Solutions, and Ehlers on the village's water plan and system capitol improvement plan. Strand Associates presented the water system evaluation they performed to determine the needs of the village's system now and in the future. USG talked about their water tower asset management program. Ehlers discussed the financial side of things.

Board Matters:

- The board approved resolution 24-24, allowing Kudy to reapply for the 2025 Vibrant Spaces Grant that would be used for Firemen's Park.
- The board approved a 2025 proposed sewer rate of \$17.80 per thousand gallons, a nine percent increase from last year.
- The board approved the 2025 general fund operating budget in the amount of 1.319 million dollars.
- The board approved the 2024 capital budget in the amount of 4.191 million dollars.
- The board approved the 2025 utility operating budget. Kudy said the sewer budget for next year is 949,000 and the water budget is 816,000.
- The board approved the 2025 TID #1 budget in the amount of \$102,082.86 and the TID #2 budget in the amount of \$152,396.
- The board approved the 2025 library budget

The Wisconsin Department of Instruction has released the 2032-24 District Report Cards, and once again the Kewaskum School District achieved the Exceeds Expectations category.

"It's fantastic to see how well students are doing in our district. We are focused on preparing our students for their next step in life, whether that be continuing their education at a four-year university, technical school, the military, or entering the workforce. Our vision is to make the Kewaskum School District an exceptional place to learn and work, and this is just one more example of how we are making that happen," said Dr. Mark Bazata, Superintendent of the Kewaskum School District.

The Department of Public Instruction (DPI) generates a School Report Card and District Report Card for every publicly funded school and district in the state. The Report Cards are intended to help schools and districts utilize performance data to target their improvement efforts so that students are ready for their next educational step.

"The Kewaskum School District is thrilled to celebrate the ongoing achievements of our students. We extend our gratitude to the students, educators, parents, school board, and community members whose dedication and hard work make it possible to offer exceptional educational experiences for the children in our district," said the Director of Student Learning and Services, Jody Heipp.

The report cards have four priority areas including student achievement and student growth in English Language Arts and mathematics. These reports also score districts and schools in how well they are closing achievement gaps in specific student groups and the postsecondary readiness predictors of how many students are on-track to

As a district, the Kewaskum School District performed above the state average in the areas of Student Achievement and On-Track and Postsecondary Readiness.

The priority area scores are aggregated into an overall accountability score, from 0 to 100. This score is displayed in the top left corner of the School or District Report Cards. Based on its score, a school or district receives one of five rating categories, from Significantly Exceeds Expectations to Fails to Meet Expectations, as well as corresponding one to five stars.



What Would You Do With 31 Million Dollars?

For the last several months, we have been inundated with almost constant political advertising. Whether in the form of fear mongering and often misleading television ads, mail flyers that all ended up in the garbage, or the never-ending phone calls, emails and texts, we have been under constant attack by political advertisers. But do you know how much money was spent trying to woo you to one candidate or another? According to U.S. News, as of one week before the election, over 16 billion dollars was spent on political campaigns throughout the U.S. In Wisconsin, 31 million was spent on the presidential campaign alone. As astronomical as 31 million is, the senate race in Wisconsin cost even more, with a whopping 76 million dollars spent to try to sway our opinions.

You might wonder, where on earth did the campaigns come up with such ridiculously large sums of money. Just 10 families alone donated almost one billion dollars to political campaigns nationwide this year. Elon Musk personally donated 133 million and the Wisconsin based Uihlein family donated 132 million (opensecrets.org).

When the extremely wealthy contribute so much money to a campaign, it doesn't just translate into more annoying TV ads. When huge donations occur, it opens the door to a quid pro quo or "I give you money, you owe me some favors" type of situation.

It wasn't always like this. Prior to 2010, there were some limits on political contributions. The Supreme Court ruling in the case of Citizens United v. the Federal Elections Committee changed all that. In a 5-4 decision, the justices decided that corporations and individuals could spend unlimited funds in elections by creating political action committees or PACS. The only requirement was that the PACs couldn't coordinate directly with the political campaign (*brennancenter.org*).



Most people believe spending such huge amounts on a political campaign is not good for our democracy. A poll conducted by the not-forprofit Brennan Center for Justice found that 94% of Americans agreed that wealthy political donors made our government more dysfunctional.

With each new campaign cycle, the amount of money spent continues to increase. What can voters do if you are tired of having your voice drowned out by a few very wealthy families? You can contact your elected representatives and demand campaign reform. The Freedom to Vote Bill is a bipartisan piece of legislation which passed in the House of Representatives but has been stalled in the Senate. If you have not been to the new Kewaskum Public Library, I recommend you check it out.

The library moved into the old PNC Bank building last year. The new, larger space provides access to the library's collection, with dedicated spaces for computers and seating.

It also offers new areas the old library did not have. A community room is used for a wide array of activities and events for people of all ages. A conference room is available for meetings. The Kewaskum Historical Society is setting up a history room in the old bank vault. And three small, quiet study rooms are available.


One of those small work areas recently was a lifesaver for me. Over the summer, I had been gathering information as town clerk to apply for a \$3 million grant to redo one of the area's greatest treasures: a town road.

The Kewaskum town roads go through what is arguably some of the most beautiful countryside in the nation. People like to take leisurely rides on these roads through the Kettle Moraine area. Many villagers became familiar with the town's country roads as construction took place on Hwy 45 this summer.

Local farmers know firsthand about the views the roads offer. They also know that some of the roads need improvements, especially when it is planting and harvest time.

On Sept. 30, I was all set to apply for a \$3 million grant to help improve an agricultural road in the Town of Kewaskum. I took out all my handwritten notes and sat in front of my computer to fill out the online application.

Unfortunately, when I clicked the button to



connect to the internet, I was not able to connect. There was an outage throughout the area.

Kewaskum Schools were without internet. Homes and businesses in the area were without internet. I was without the internet.

The grant application was due at 5 p.m.

Panic started to set in, but then I remembered I have a hotspot on my phone. I turned that on and was able to connect to the Wisconsin Department of Transportation website!

However, about 30 minutes later, my hotspot stopped working. Verizon, which happens to be my cell carrier, was having a nationwide outage.

After trying desperately (and unsuccessfully) to fill out the long application over the next several hours, I was able to call the grant coordinator and explain my predicament. I told her I would try to somehow find an internet connection so I could submit my grant application.

I contacted the Kewaskum Public Library, and the internet there was working!

I packed up my laptop, gathered all my papers and notes, and headed to the library.

When I got there, I walked quickly past the other patrons. Even though I was tempted to stop and talk, I walked straight into one of the study cubicles and shut the door.

It was completely silent inside the cubby. I needed that silence to concentrate. I plugged in my laptop and got to work. I was able to complete and submit the grant application!

I won't know until the end of December if the Town of Kewaskum will be awarded the \$3 million grant. I am just so grateful that the town had the chance to apply, thanks to the Kewaskum Public Library.

It is now budget season in Washington County. One of the items on the county's annual budget is public libraries.

In 2024, the Kewaskum Public Library received \$97,671.79 from Washington County. The funds paid for various services, programs and capital expenses, as well as reimbursed the library for items checked out by patrons who do not have a library in their municipality or who live in a neighboring county.

Overall, in 2024, the county covered 40 percent of the Kewaskum Public Library's total budget of \$244,450.49, while the Village of Kewaskum covered 43 percent. The remainder was provided by donations, grants, cross-county reimbursement and payment for services.

I look forward to Washington County continuing to support the Kewaskum Public Library in 2025.

15 Years Ago

November 26, 2009

Kewaskum High School is one of several county high schools taking advantage of a \$400,000 federal grant to help teens find jobs. Nova Services, a non-profit organization in West Bend serving troubled youth and mentally challenged adults, has received a three-year delinquency prevention grant from the Office of Justice Assistance. The grant targets county residents age 14-25 to help prevent delinquency and land jobs.

Kewaskum's public hearing on its budget is set for Monday, Nov. 30. The village's mill rate is slated to be \$7.15, a 53-cent increase (8 percent) over last year's \$6.62. The tax levy is projected to be \$1,787,651. Of that, \$90,635 is from the new fire truck purchase which was not budgeted for but deemed a need by the Village Board.

New, 95-gallon, green garbage and recycling carts will be distributed to village residents starting Monday, Nov. 30. Garbage carts will have green covers and recycle carts yellow ones. Public Works Director Jerry Gilles told the Village Board on Monday that Veolia Environmental Services said distribution could take three to five days.

The village is sending a letter to the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources objecting to a possible new mandate that would require municipalities to treat water supplies with chlorine. Public Works Director Jerry Gilles explained in the letter that requiring Kewaskum to treat its water with chlorine "would endanger the quality of its water and impose fiscal hardships on the utility and its customers."

Mike and Shelly Marx have opened Players Sports Bar in the former John's on Main Tavern last month. The couple took over the bar on Monday, Oct. 26, quickly renovated for a sportier atmosphere, and reopened that following Wednesday.

Boltonville has a new sign in front of its Union Cemetery. The tree of life, pounded and forged into the sign is a metaphor for the cycle stages of life itself. Mark Mondloch, the ironwork artist of the Silver Creek Pottery and Forge, designed and built the sign.

With a few minor tweaks, the Barton Town Board on November 17 unvieled its final operating budget for 2010. The budget was approved unanimously, with electors and supervisors approving a tax levy totaling \$204,668.05. For the second straight year, town employees and board members will not receive a raise.

Holiday Cacti Add Weeks of Color and Enjoyment

Add weeks of colorful flowers and decades of enjoyment to your indoor plant collection with holiday cacti. Dress one up with a decorative basket, container, or foil wrap and give it to a favorite gardener or holiday hostess. You'll find a variety for sale at your local garden center or florist.

The plant sold as a Christmas cactus may in fact be a Thanksgiving cactus. The true Christmas cactus blooms later and has small segments with rounded edges. The Thanksgiving cactus, though often sold as the Christmas cactus, has toothed or jagged segments and typically blooms earlier. To add to the confusion, there are hybrids of the two that bloom in between these.

Fortunately, their growing requirements and care are essentially the same so the plants will do fine no matter the name on the label. Keep your flowering holiday cactus in a cool bright location to extend its bloom time for as long as four to eight weeks. Avoid hot and cold air drafts, moisture stress, and other environmental changes to reduce the risk of bud and flower drop.

These holiday cacti are epiphytes that naturally grow on trees in the rainforests of Brazil. They all prefer bright indirect light, high humidity, and thorough watering when the top few inches of soil begin to dry. Don't overwater but don't let the soil dry

completely. Water a bit more often when the plant is in bloom.

Grow them in an organic well-drained potting mix for best results. Water thoroughly and pour off any excess water that collects in the saucer to avoid root rot. Reduce maintenance and improve the growing conditions with the help of gravel trays. Place a layer of pebbles, decorative stones, or marbles in the saucer or bottom of the foil wrap or basket. The pot will be elevated above any excess water collecting in

the pebbles. As this water evaporates it increases the humidity around the plant.

Fertilize with a dilute solution of flowering houseplant fertilizer once it finishes blooming and throughout spring and summer as needed. Grow your cactus in a north-facing window or back from an east- or westfacing window where it receives bright indirect light throughout the year. Too much sun turns the leaf segments dark red.

Don't be anxious to move these

plants to a bigger container. They prefer to be somewhat pot-bound and can remain in the same pot for years.

Encourage a new flush of flowers with cooler night temperatures around 55 to 60 degrees and slightly drier soil. An uninterrupted dark period will also help promote flowering.

Next fall, start the dark treatment in early October to get holiday flowers. Cover the plants or move them to a location free of artificial light, indoors or outside, each night for 14 hours and provide bright, indirect sunlight each day. Any interruption in the dark period from outdoor, street, or reading lights can delay or prevent flowering.

Make this the year you add holiday cacti to your indoor plant collection and consider purchasing a few for friends and family. These easy-care flowering beauties will brighten indoor holiday décor and everyone's mood

AN OUTDOORSMAN'S JOURNAL

Hardcore Elk Hunt

Hello friends,

This week, I am going to write about a very challenging and fun Montana elk and mule deer hunt that I recently returned home from. For myself, the entire trip with travel lasted 13-days, six of those days I was fortunate to have my 23-year-old daughter Selina Walters join me. Selina is a biologist for USFWS based out of Missoula. This is one of those stories where I have to be brief as there is so much to write about.

Saturday, October 26 High 62, Low 29

Today was opening day of Montana's elk and deer season with a gun. I left home five days ago and have been building camps, scouting and enjoying life in the mountains. Selina joined me two days ago.

Both of us were confident that we would harvest something today as there were plenty of elk in the area and an August scouting trip was really looking like it was going to pay off.

Long story short, we left camp in the dark at 5:00 this morning and got back to camp in the dark at 7:30 tonight, one small mule deer buck and one doe is all that was spotted and both were passed up. Both of us figured it was the warm weather that kept the elk from moving as neither of us heard a shot the entire day.

A huge part of this trip was our camp life, which for me was 10 nights. In Montana, anything to do with camping involves grizzly bear precautions. Here are some examples, carrying bear spray is basically mandatory. Many Montanans carry a pistol and bear spray, but bear spray is proven to be a safer bear deterrent than pistols. In the area we were hunting, there have been four grizzly, hunter/camper attacks this summer/fall. The last two were with bowhunters who were injured but killed the grizzly with pistols. In no way is it cool to kill a grizzly, they are protected, and so, caution is protocol unless a pistol is your last option. In most cases, bear spray saves the day as it did with one of Selina's coworkers.

We had two tents, both Eskimos, one for cooking and hanging out, the other was for sleeping. Not a bit of food or trash was left in the cook tent, and that required Selina and I to hike from camp before our morning hunt, after our days hunt and

before we went to bed to our stash. This was always in the dark. I bought Red and Ruby and had them chained on two sides of camp, they were excellent prevention and toughed out some rough weather

There was not snow the first five days of this adventure and it seemed like there were a gazzilion snowshoe hare. The snowshoes, like the local weasel population, had turned white and would try to hide but really stuck out, which I am confident makes them easy prey.

It snowed on Monday, which was the third day of hunting, we were confident this would turn our luck around. We saw wolf tracks and some deer tracks and were starting to realize that despite hunting over a large area with snow on the ground, something had changed.

Nighttime for Selina and I at camp was incredible, we cooked great meals, listened to music (her playlist is the best), and had a drink or a beer. For me to listen to her stories as a young biologist were interesting and eye opening. I think if people could just hear what a biologist with a degree in fisheries and another in water resources sees and experiences it would be very good for the world.

On Wednesday, I took Selina down the mountain to her vehicle and we said goodbye. For me, it was very difficult, but a part of life for every parent. I hunted hard for three more days and covered many miles on foot with snow on the ground. Over that entire period of time, I only saw one set of elk tracks, where just one week earlier there were tracks, beds and droppings everywhere.

I had the pleasure of speaking with Montana hunters on two separate occasions and both told me the same thing. The season started late this year, where we were hunting is an area where the elk either migrate south or north. Both told me of numerous road kill experiences happening this week near Bozeman and Big Sky.

For myself and Selina, we had a blast. Our relationship is very unique in that we are fun and never run out of things to talk about. The elk migrating literally just before the season opened was a very bitter pill to swallow, and at first, we just thought they were bedded down because of warm weather.

Life sometimes throws you a curve ball, we shall adjust!


