
On November 21, Campbellsport girls' basketball beat Kewaskum 48-45 in their non-conference, rivalry matchup.

Kewaskum (0-1) jumped out to an early 9-3 lead, thanks, in part, to Cameron Boelte scoring six points in the first three minutes for the Indians.

Campbellsport responded with a 7-0 run highlighted by back-to-back baskets from Ava Sabish to take a 10-9 lead at the 12 minute mark in the first half.

The Indians went on their own scoring run of 10-3 to take a 19-13 lead with five minutes left in the first half.


Applicants are encouraged to apply for the 2025 Eden Lions Club \$1,000 scholarships to further their academic goals.

The Great Game: Humanity, AI, And The Battle For Control

Dear Reader,

As we venture further into the age of AI, there's a prevailing narrative that suggests humanity, with all its flaws and frailties, is destined to be overtaken by the cold, calculating logic of our creations. But to assume that AI will inevi-



Jagler Statement on Department of Public Instruction School Report Cards

On November 19, State Sen. John Jager (R-Watertown) responded to the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction (DPI) release of school report cards for the state. The report cards come after controversial decision this summer to adjust the scores for the State Forward Exam and reconfigure how schools are graded by the state.

"The state report cards have been rendered useless by the actions of DPI and State Superintendent Jill Underly, a move even panned by Governor Evers." said Jagler. "There is no doubt we have great schools in Wisconsin but when 94 percent of school districts are graded as met expectations or above, there is little to no useful information to be gathered from these. With literacy rates falling, absenteeism rising and violence in our schools, any rational person would be hard pressed to say 94 percent of our schools are meeting expectations. Once again, the adults in charge are failing our kids."

The school report cards were created to give parents a transparent view of their schools to make the best decisions for their kids. Legislators and state agencies rely on the report cards to make informed decisions about allocation of resources and management of our schools.

"They have changed the dials behind closed doors with the goal, I believe, of giving the illusion of student achievement while our kids continue to suffer." Jagler continued, "we will need to take a hard look at the report cards this session and how DPI is managing them. They have clearly lost a connection to the parents who want to see what's best for their kids."

Sen. Jagler serves as Chair of the Senate Committee on Education and represents the 13th Senate District covering all or parts of Adams, Columbia, Dodge, Fond du Lac, Green Lake, Jefferson, Marquette, Waushara and Winnebago Counties.

On Tuesday, November 12, the Friends of the Kettle Moraine held its Annual Meeting/Volunteer Appreciation event at the Roadhouse in Dundee. At this event, the Friends board of directors and the Kettle Moraine State Forest – Northern Unit's superintendents, Samantha Lindquist and Joe Giesfeldt, shared their gratitude and thanks for the dedicated volunteers who gave of their time, talents, and efforts to make the Northern Unit shine.

Ten couples and three individuals stepped into the role of Camp Hosts at either the Long Lake, Mauthe Lake, or Horse Riders campground where they greeted campers, performed light maintenance, and served as extra eyes and ears for the Forest staff. They received praise for the 1,778 hours of service they logged over this past camping season.

Several workday events happened over the year including the Work Play Earth Day and inaugural Invasive Species Awareness Day both sponsored by the Friends of the Kettle Moraine. The forest rangers conducted numerous Trail Stewardship Workdays at the Lizard Mound State Park and on the New Fane Bike Trails.

Bob Blackburn, and Joanna and Randy Parlee received thanks for the 110 hours they gave as Trail Stewards. They traversed "their trails" sharing information with the Northern Unit staff about maintenance needs and seasonal occurrences on the trail.

The Forest Superintendents expressed their gratitude to the Friends of the Kettle Moraine for their financial support of the newly completed

accessible kayak launch at Mauthe Lake, the improvements to the Tamarack Trail, and bird window deterrents at the Ice Age Visitor Center.

They also expressed their appreciation for the group's on-going work on the Ice Age Visitor Center Vegetation Rehabilitation Project and invasive species control throughout the Forest.

It not only takes individual volunteers, but many partner groups working with the Forest staff to keep the Northern Unit in great shape. The Forest superintendents highlighted with gratefulness several of these partner groups and their projects.

- The Northern Kettle Moraine Horse Trail Association completed a variety ofimprovements to the Horse Riders Camp including purchasing and installing premier corrals, 22 fire rings, and a horse washing station. The group also completed pre- and post-season clean up of the campground and facilitated a 15-mile Mauthe Lake Loop trail extension.
- The Northern Kettle Moraine Nordic Ski Club efforts for maintaining and grooming the Greenbush cross-country ski trails received thanks as well as the group's donation of an overhead door on the grooming shed.
- Sheboygan County Cycling conducted many workdays to improve the mountain biking trails at Greenbush along with grooming the trails for winter cycling.
- A new group, New Fane Biking Association, is in the process of becoming a 501(c)3 organization with a purpose of maintaining and improving the New Fane mountain bike trails. The Forest staff

Connie Ramthun led a crew of 46 folks who pulled, cut, and sprayed invasive species in the Haskell Noyes and Spruce Lake Bog State Natural Areas, Greenbush prairie, and at the Ice Age Visitor Center.

DNR Seeking Public Comment on the Draft Statewide Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan

Written Comments Accepted Through Dec. 15

WIS. DEPT. OF NATURAL RESOURCES

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) is seeking public input on the draft Statewide Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan (SCORP).

The SCORP describes the supply and demand for outdoor recreation in Wisconsin. The draft Wisconsin SCORP includes an analysis of the motivations for recreating and the barriers Wisconsin residents may experience preventing them from participating in outdoor recreation.

States are required to complete SCORPs every five years to be eligible for participation in the Land and Water Conservation Fund State Assistance Program.

The Land and Water Conservation Fund was enacted by Congress in 1965 "to strength the health and vitality of the United States" through the acquisition and development of outdoor recreation resources and facilities. States are allocated funds as matching (50%) grants for the acquisition and development of public outdoor recreation sites and facilities.

2024 Bear Season Results Show Rebound in Harvest and Hunter Success

WIS. DEPT. OF NATURAL RESOURCES

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) announced preliminary results for the 2024 bear season. This fall, bear hunters harvested 4,285 bears during the five-week season, a rebound from the below-average harvest of 2,922 bears taken during last fall's bear season.

"Several factors likely led to this season's increase in harvest," said Randy Johnson, DNR large carnivore specialist. "In 2023, we saw an incredible amount of acorns and other natural food production. This reduced the effectiveness of baits and translated to a historically low harvest. This year, anecdotes from bear hunters and harvest data suggest less natural food availability than last year. Additionally, last year's low harvest, coupled with bears entering dens in excellent body condition last fall, likely contributed to an increase in the number of bears on the landscape this fall."

The 2024 bear season ran from Sept. 4 to Oct. 8. A total of 11,501 bear hunting licenses were awarded to hunters through the license lottery system.

Although the number of licenses was reduced slightly this year, hunter success rates were generally higher than expected, leading to meeting or exceeding harvest targets in most management zones. Statewide, hunter success was about 37%, up from the five-year average of 31%. Hunter success rates in individual zones varied from a high of 71% in Zone A to less than 10% in Zones E and F.

"On average, we expect to see about half of the total bear harvest within the first five days of the season," Johnson said. "This year, nearly 57% of the total harvest occurred in those first five days, with over 1,000 bears taken on opening day alone. Although the harvest rate returned closer to average during the rest of the season, this strong first week set the stage to meet or exceed harvest targets by season's end."

Harvest targets are set to manage the bear population in Wisconsin and are readjusted

each year to increase, decrease or stabilize population trends. This means that even when harvest targets are exceeded in a given year, there is little long-term biological risk to bear populations. Population and harvest data are evaluated annually and can be adjusted to meet long-term population management objectives.

Benefits of Bear Hunting

Wisconsin has a thriving bear population, estimated at around 23,000 bears, with a range covering more than half the state. While bears have tremendous cultural and ecological value, they can also conflict with human interests, such as damaging agricultural crops or raiding residential trash and bird feeders.

"Regulated bear harvest is the primary tool we use to manage bear populations and ensure bear numbers remain balanced with their habitat and public preferences," said Johnson. "It also provides wonderful opportunities to experience nature with the company of family and friends and source sustainable protein."

Hunters provide critical data from every harvested bear, which informs population monitoring efforts to ensure a healthy and sustainable bear population. Bear hunter license fees also supply key funding for bear management and research activities.

Reminders for Next Year

Hunters wishing to obtain a license or preference point for the 2025 season must apply in Go Wild before the Dec. 10 deadline. State law requires bear permit applicants to apply at least once during any period of three consecutive years to retain their accumulated preference points; otherwise, all accumulated preference points will be lost.

Nearly 135,000 people applied for a bear hunting license or preference point for the 2024 season. To help hunters make hunting plans, a full breakdown of the 2024 bear license drawing results and license wait times is available online.

A Place Called Fall Camp

Hello friends,

The next four week's, I will be writing to you about what you could call my hunting camp. My camp is located in The Meadow Valley Wildlife area in northern Juneau County, and this area, with all of the land combined, makes up at least 200 square miles of forest, marsh and paradise. This fall will be the 53rd year in a row that I have watched night become day on opening day of Wisconsin's deer gun season. I have spent many nights camped here, with all of the experiences combined adding up to well over three years of my life.

Saturday, November 9 High 55, Low 37

Today is the day that The Red Brush Gang comes together and

Brush Gang comes together and builds our camp, cuts our firewood and after the work is done, has one heck of a fun "we built it party." My buddy, Jeff Moll, will be celebrating his 50th year in a row at camp, and today, I ran the splitter, Jeff ran the

chainsaw and we made one heck of a lot of firewood. All told, there were 22 of us in camp ranging in age from five to 86.

This week and next, I will write to you about spending time alone at camp with my pups, Ruby and Red, while hunting and simply enjoying camp. I will also touch on some of the experiences that I had over the last 53 years.

Tuesday, November 12 High 48, Low 26

I start every day sitting in a tree hoping a buck will come by and that I would make some meat. This morning, I had a doe come from one direction, and at the same time, a sixpointer, that had no idea the doe was around, was coming right at me from another, as I was hunting near a very hot scrape. As soon as the buck saw the doe, it was chase on and that doe may have saved his life.

This may sound crazy but due to the fact that there are so many wolf in this area, it is pretty cool when you see a buck. I learned a long time ago to just enjoy the view and forced relaxation of sitting in a tree.

I started writing this column when I was 27 and was coming here long before that. Back in the late 80's and early 90's, I would set up shop here in Meadow Valley as soon as our traditional Mississippi River duck hunt was complete, and I would stay at camp until mid-January. I was making \$10.00 a week as a writer at first and by '93 was up to \$90.00 a week. To keep expenses down, which I still have to watch, I would only go to town once a week and that was to get pictures developed and mail my hand written column to my publisher.

In the winter of '93, I trained at camp to hike The Appalachain Trail and before my backpack arrived in the mail, I carried a seven-foot, 100-pound oak log on my shoulders, through the bush and was in excellent condition. Sometimes I would have female company and in the winter, because the path to my camp is not plowed, I would hook that oak log to my Jeep Eagle and pull it behind the Eagle to level out the trail. To set up a date, I would drive to Babcock and use the pay phone that was on the curve on Hwy 80 for about a

billion years.

Think about this, in my time at Meadow Valley, I have watched the return of the wolf, black bear, fisher, turkey and now elk.

At night, at camp, I cook good meals and hangout with the pups, I go to bed early because I get up long before daylight and either sit in a tree or a canoe.
