Trinity Lutheran - Campbellsport Dedicates New Church Building

Trinity Lutheran Church, formerly located at W494 Elm St., Campbellsport (located in Dundee) dedicated a brand-new facility which is located on the same site as Trinity Lutheran School W2011 County Road F, Campbellsport (located in Waucousta). Dedication took place on Saturday, November 2, 2024.

According to Building Committee Chairman Clay Hardenburger, "There were many reasons to build. The church is experiencing growth, the current building was 120 years old and not handicap accessible and having the church and school on the same campus was ideal." He also added, "Having more visibility for the church on the new site allows our ministry to be more visible to our surrounding community."

The 10,000 square foot building project started in October of 2023 with completion in October of 2024. Excel Engineering of Fond du Lac provided the architect and engineering services with Catalyst Construction of Milwaukee and the Fox Cities/Green Bay having served as the construction manager.

Trinity is a part of the Wisconsin Evangelical Lutheran Synod (WELS), which is the third largest Lutheran Church body with 1250 churches worldwide. Trinity's congregation was formed in 1878 with the present-day church structure in Dundee being built in 1903. Valuing Christian Education, Trinity added a Lutheran School for grades K4 - 8 th grade in 1981 and completed a school addition in 1987. The school is under-

going the WELS School Accreditation process (WELSSA) which is recognized by the National Council for Private School Accreditation (NCP-SA) in association with their acceptance into the school choice program which started in the 2023-24 school year. The school added 3k at the start of this school year.

"The mission of Trinity is to glorify God by continually growing in the Word whereby we preach, teach, and reach others with Christ's saving truth," states Pastor Bobby Oberg. "When you come to Trinity, you will experience country church charm as you gather with others just like you who need to hear God's encouraging message of love and salvation."

Indians Have Week of Close Games

On Tuesday, Dec. 10, the Kewaskum boys' basketball team (3-1, 1-1) hosted Winneconne (1-4, 0-2).

It was a memorable night for senior Zach Behn who was recognized as Kewaskum High School's all-time scoring leader. On the night, he scored 41 points alone, and not one basket came from beyond the arc. He made 10 baskets for 20 points and added 21 more points at the free throw line.

"We were obviously really excited for and proud of Zach for becoming our all-time leading scorer on Tuesday," said Head Coach Tyler Enright. "That kind of stuff does not happen very often and deserves a lot of recognition. He still somehow manages to be incredibly underrated, and he needs to be talked about more as one of the best and most dominant players in the state. He has earned that and continues to improve every day."

While Winneconne pulled ahead after the first half on Tuesday, 41-38, Kewaskum fought back for the close 91-88 win.

Also contributing big numbers on offense were Charlie Gambino with 23 points and Landon Daniel with 13.

"So far, I have been really proud of our ability to stay the course and respond when other teams make a run. We have faced some early adversity and have fought through some tight games, which I think will pay off over the course of the year," commented Enright. "We have thrown a lot at the guys and we have asked them to learn a lot in a short amount of time; they are doing a great job of staying focused on getting 1% better every day."

Vs Plymouth

The Kewaskum boys' basketball team ended the week with another home game against Plymouth (2-3, 1-1), after the girls faced them on Thursday night, on Friday, Dec. 13.

It was another close game, but, unfortunately, the Indians did not come out on top this time, losing 71-68. Had two players not got injured in the first half, the game might have went the other way.

"Friday against Plymouth we collectively agreed that we beat ourselves more than anything. We were not the best version of ourselves... and still

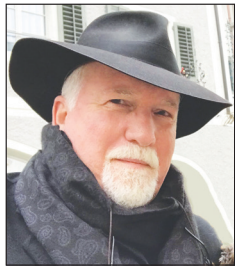

Bradley Petersen Announces Re-election Bid to Kewaskum School Board

Kewaskum native and current member of the Kewaskum School District Board of Education, Bradley Petersen, is excited to announce his re-election bid and has officially filed the necessary paperwork to run for a second term in the upcoming April election.

During his tenure on the board, Petersen has proven himself to be a dedicated leader who consistently prioritizes the needs of students and the community. He has worked diligently to ensure district policies reflect the best interests of both students and taxpayers, standing firm on the idea of responsible fiscal management. As Chair of the Policy and Legislative Committee, he has played a crucial role in advancing policies that empower academic achievement and the long-term sustainability of the district.

"I am proud of the work we have accomplished during my time on the board, but we cannot stop here. Our work is far from finished," Petersen stated. "If re-elected, I will continue to focus on driving academic excellence, strengthening parental involvement, improving student behavior, and advocating for the hard-working taxpayers who support our schools."

Petersen looks forward to continuing his service to the Kewaskum community and earning voters' trust in the upcoming election. Below are just a few of the many accomplishments that have occurred under Petersen's leadership on the school board:

For our students:

- Attendance rates for the 2023-24 school year were at the highest level in the past eight years (96.1% vs. the

Wisconsin average of 92.3%).

- During the 2023-24 school year, 70% of high school students were involved in at least one extracurricular activity.

- Kewaskum School District ranked in the top 10% of school districts in the state for student achievement. Students scored above the state average in ELA by 18.5% and in math by 16.5%.

- The graduating class of 2023 achieved a graduation rate of 97.1% (Wisconsin average: 90.7%), and 49.6% of students completed at least one dual credit course, which is 26.4% above the state average.

- In the 2023-2024 school year, 61.1% of advanced placement exams taken received a passing score, saving families tens of thousands of dollars in tuition costs.

- For the graduating class of 2023, 54% of students participated in a work-based learning program.

- The district had 88 students participate in the youth apprenticeship

program, one of the highest participation rates in the state.

For our finances and facilities:

- The district has built a strong fund balance to eliminate short-term borrowing, saving taxpayers \$30,000 to \$40,000 annually.

- The district paid off \$1.4 million in non-referendum debt last year, saving taxpayers over \$120,000 a year in interest payments.

- Over the past two years, the district has invested over \$2 million in capital improvements without the need for a capital referendum.

- 100% of families surveyed expressed satisfaction with the maintenance and cleanliness of their students' school.

- The district is on pace with building maintenance, equipment, and technology replacement to ensure a strong financial future.

- The district has avoided the need for an operating referendum, unlike many other districts across the state.

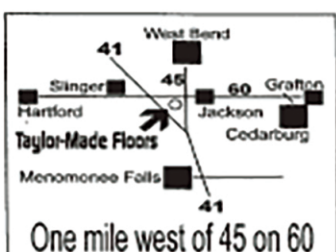





The Second Week of Deer Camp and All My Friends are Here

Hello friends,

Wisconsin's nine-day deer gun season was so fun for the 53rd year in a row that I have no choice but to return for a 54th. The following column is some highlights from Tuesday through Sunday and about all I can say is, thank God it's not a 16-day season.

Tuesday, November 26

High 33, Low 17

This morning, I woke up at camp, and there were only five of us left until Friday when the flood gates open and there would be 17. Today's plan was to hike 1.5 miles into the Necedah National Wildlife Refuge where no one had hunted so far this year. I was going to have Jeff and Ross Moll as well as Doug Cibulka be standers, and I was going to do a two hour, slow walk in an oak forest that is intermingled with hundreds of acres of marsh.

Two very cool experiences happened, one, Ross Moll had four times that deer came by him and on the fourth, he shot a forkhorn which would give this gang its second buck for the 16 hunters that were here opening weekend. As soon as Ross shot his buck, a wolf started a long and wailing howling spree, and it was literally only a hundred yards from me.

Thursday, November 28

High 27, Low 16

This buck does not count on The Red Brush Gangs total, but it was important. When Michelle Chiaro passed away 26-months ago, I abandoned the food plot behind my house. Simply put, I could not go back there as it was just too emotional for me. I came home for Thanksgiving and this afternoon hiked through a beautiful oak forest to the food plot. I worked my grunt call, and a beautiful six-pointer came in and thus, perhaps I can start spending time at the food plot again. That buck was cut up with the help of my daughter, Selina, who came home for deer camp and was sent to Montana when she went home.

Friday, November 29

High 29, Low 17

Today, the whole gang returns to camp, and we do deer drives the next two days. There were some shots fired, and one buck was harvested by Tim Rittmeyer. Last year, our group only harvested one, this year, we whacked three. The days of our gang killing 10 is over as there is simply too many wolves and I have to admit, we do a bit of missing at running deer.

Another interesting story involved my neph-

ew, Riley Schuster. We do one-mile-long drives that are just about as wide. Today, part of one of our drives went through an area where a tornado passed the same day Michele passed away. Riley was a driver and trying to sneak through a dead-fall when he came face to face with a wolf that was bedded down. The wolf was not budging and just stared at him. Riley gave us all a heads up on his walkie talkie and retreated.

One funny story is that every night we have a heck of a dart tournament. I am the worst dart thrower since the creation of man. I have crushed my throwing hand in a wood splitter and caught it in a 330-beaver trap, plus I only play once a year and am drinking beer when I play.

Tonight in round one, I was paired with the al-

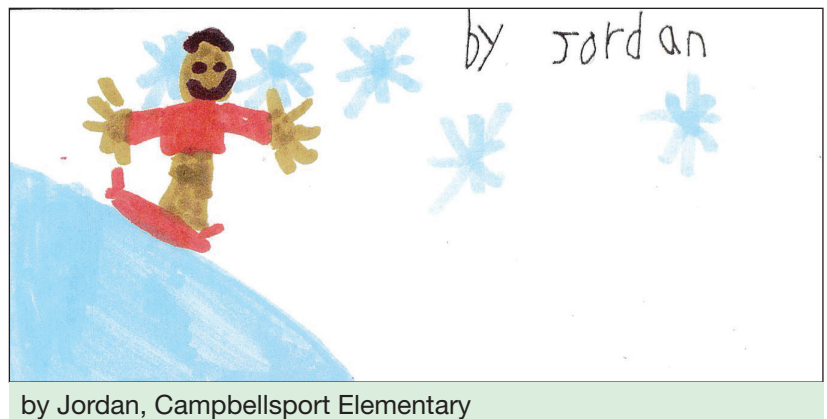
